onfirmation is on my mind. I have had a delightful time working with the young people in the confirmation class this year. I am happy to have had this time with them and proud of their accomplishments and achievements

But I am also concerned for them. It is a real challenge to live a committed Christian life these days. They will need support and encouragement as they develop in their Christian faith. And I fear that all too often the church fails its young people in this regard. We are often apathetic to the needs and struggles of our young

people or even, sadly, hostile to their interests and needs.

Years ago, when our children were toddlers, we had a plaque on the wall entitled Children Learn What They Live. Some of the text on that plaque reads, If children live with criticism, they learn to condemn. If children live with hostility, they learn to fight. If children live with jealousy, they learn what envy is. . . If

children live with encouragement, they learn to be confident. If children live with acceptance, they learn to find love in the world. . .If children live with honesty and fairness, they learn what truth and justice are.

We would do well to appropriate these insights into the way we model for our

young people what Christian faith is all about. Sadly, all too often we lose our young people to the realization that people in the church do not sailing toward live life any differently than those outside the church

> They are disappointed and turned off by what they witness and experience in the church.

> > Nurturing young people in the faith is an awesome responsibility for

the church. And yet, unfortunately, all too often it is a responsibility that we do not take seriously. Our young people are left to wonder whether there is a place for them in the church and whether their needs and/or interests as developing Christians are given credence. Confirmation is only the begin-

ning of their relationship with the church as members. As we wrestle with issues of assimilating adult members, we ought also give attention to the importance of assimilating our young members into the life and fellowship of the church.

Yes, Confirmation is on my mind. And with thoughts of Confirmation come thoughts of church membership. As we concern ourselves with assimilating members into the life and fellowship of our church, we must also concern ourselves with those who have joined the church but have not fulfilled their membership vows. When we join the church, we promise to remain active and to support it with our prayers, our presence, our gifts, and our service. Undoubtedly, there are some who cannot fulfill all these vows for a variety of reasons. But most who take these vows are quite capable of fulfilling them.

I am often perplexed and troubled by the number of people on our church membership rolls who do not take an active part in the church's life and ministry. To be sure, there are times when the church is at fault for their inactivity. But it is also evident that many who join the church never take their vows as seriously as they should. Often it seems as though there are ulterior motives for seeking church membership, rather than an earnest desire to find a place to live out one's commitment to Christ.

I have frequently – though mostly in jest – suggested annual renewal of church membership. Of course, our United Methodist polity and order would not allow for such an approach to membership. But it seems to me we would do well to examine on some kind of regular basis our desire and/or intent to maintain an active relationship with the church.

That desire and/or intent should be reflective of our commitment to be faithful disciples of Jesus Christ, of our desire to grow in our faith, and our willingness to be of service to God's kingdom. In the book, *A is for*

Abductive: The Language of the Emerging Church, the authors write, The main space in church is called 'nave,' a word that comes from the Latin word for 'ship.' Disci-



ples are on a journey, sailing toward home. But we don't sail alone. Our highly personalized journeys of faith need co-journers. Believing, becoming, and behaving all require belonging.

PRAYER: Loving God, restore in us a desire to do more. Keep us from making lame excuses for not being generous. Help us to say, *I will!* In Jesus' name. Amen

Although designed primarily for non-churchgoers and new Christians, the challenging talks by Nikki Gumbel, vicar at Holy Trinity Brompton Church in London, refresh and refuel all. The talks and small group discussions provide opportunities for people of all backgrounds and beliefs to explore the meaning of life in a safe, fun and non-threatening atmosphere.

The ALPHA course began at Holy Trinity Brompton more than 25 years ago and is now running successfully all over the world, in virtually all denominations and settings that range from campuses to prisons. The next beginning ALPHA with additional options for past participants will be offered in September---stay tuned!



A sincere word of appreciation goes to **Drs. Michael Avedissian** and Earl Hope for their contribution to the church of a portable defibrillator. This de-



vice will make it possible to provide appropriate assistance in the event a cardiac emergency warrants its use.

As Dr. Avedissian said, *I hope it never has to be used*. But it is available in the church should it ever be needed. (The device is located in the alcove next to the Music Director's office.)

Our Parish Nurse, **Tina Goshert**, has arranged for the training of a number of individuals who have been certified in Cardio-Pulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) and the use of the defibrillator. She hopes to have additional individuals go through the training in the near future. Since many different groups and people use our facility it is reassuring to know that this device is in place

and that we have individuals trained to provide appropriate aid.

Again, our thanks to **Drs. Avedissian** and **Hope** for their generous contribution in donating this potentially lifesaving device to our church.

WHERE ARE YOU ON THE LIST?

It may be helpful in considering your estimate or your family's estimate of giving for 2005 to know the pattern of regular giving of our members during 2004. Wayne Barrett in his book "The Church Finance Idea Book" suggests that givers should know how their contribution compares to others.

Remember the parable about the good and faithful servant (Matt 25:14-30)? The servants were not all given the same amount of money and the same amount was not expected back from each. However, they were expected to give back in proportion to what they received.

If every individual or family would move up to the next level by increasing their weekly giving by \$5, (less than the cost of a video or a pizza), our church's income would increase by over \$35,000. Think what our church could accomplish with this extra income!

Our News-Linc Makes the News

Our *News-Linc* was recognized in the May issue of *The Newsletter Newsletter*, a publication from Communication Resources, which includes monthly a how-to section, clip art and content pages.
