

Sunday, September 19 – The Sixteenth Sunday after Pentecost – The sermon will be entitled Now That You've Got It, What Are You Going to Do with It? based on Luke 16:10, Whoever is faithful in a very little is faithful also in much; and whoever is dishonest in a very little is dishonest also in much.

Sunday, September 26 – The Seventeenth Sunday after Pentecost – ANNIVERSARY SUNDAY – STEWARDSHIP SUNDAY – The sermon will be entitled You Did What? based on Luke 16:25, But Abraham said, 'Child, remember that during your lifetime you received your good things, and Lazarus in like manner evil things; but now he is comforted here, and you are in agony.'

Beginning with this issue, we will list the complete lectionary lessons for each Sunday so that, if you choose, you may read them in preparation for Sunday's service. We follow the Revised Common Lectionary, used by many mainline Protestant denominations. The lectionary consists of readings from the Old Testament, New Testament, the Gospels, and the Psalms. The readings for September are:

Sunday, September 5 – Jeremiah 18:1-11; Philemon 1-21; Luke 14:25-33 The Psalter is Psalm 139:1-6, 13-18.

Sunday, September 12 – Jeremiah 4:11-12, 22-28; I Timothy 1:12-17; Luke 15:1-10 The Psalter is Psalm 14.

Sunday, September 19 – Jeremiah 8:18-9:1; I Timothy 2:1-7; Luke 16:1-13 The Psalter is Psalm 79:1-9.

Sunday, September 26 – Jeremiah 32:1-3a, 6-15; I Timothy 6:6-19; Luke 16:19-31 The Psalter is Psalm 91:1-6, 14-16.

everal weeks ago Brenda and I were invited to spend a Sunday with a group from a church we had served years ago. Our hosts wanted us to arrive early so we could spend some time with them and see a recent addition to the church.

As we walked through the new addition housing offices, classrooms, restrooms and a large space for
fellowship and contemporary worship, our host, Dr.
Bailey, kept pointing out
the problems with the new
addition. I, however, was
awed by the transformation and enhancement of their facility.

As we concluded the "tour," Dr. Bailey remarked that he had a new perspective on the addition; that my amazement at what they had done made him appreciate the wonderful changes. He noted that this was a great addition to the church's life despite the difficulties they had encountered during construction and the problems that remained.

From time to time we need a different perspective. We need to "step back" and take in the "bigger picture." We need to be able to see things through someone else's eyes.

Years ago, when Brenda and I were moving to Effort to serve the church there, I was driving a U-Haul truck up Interstate Route 81. In the seat next to

nine- year-old brother. As we came over a rise near Hazleton, Jeff looked out the window at the vista before us and simply said, "WOW!" I probably would have passed by it as more highway scenery, but he helped me see it from a different perspective.

If only we could always see the positive, the wonder, the possibility in life. If only we could see these qualities in the life of the church. As we begin the new program year at LP Church, I hope and pray that we will all look at the positives and the possibilities. Dr. Robert Schuller, pastor of the Crystal Cathedral, is fond of saying that anyone can count the seeds in an apple, but only God can count the apples in a seed. For me, that means God sees infinite possibilities where our vision is narrow and limited.

There are challenges to be faced. But rather than focusing on the problems and

shortcomings, as our friend did with his church's new addition, let's focus on the positives and possibilities. Let's help each other look at those qualities in our community life, to see the "WOW" that we might otherwise miss.

Lincoln Park Church has a special place in our hearts; it is where we nurture our love for God and our love for one another. Sir Walter Scott wrote in his poem, *The Maid of Neidpath, "O lovers' eyes are sharp to see"*. So, with vision sharpened by our love for God and one another, let us see the good, the positive, and all the possibilities that exist within our community of faith.

In the thirteenth chapter of the Gospel of Matthew the disciples ask Jesus why he speaks in parables. Jesus tells the disciples that they have been given to know the secret of the kingdom of heaven. George Buttrick says the "secret" is an "open secret": God so loved the world...that whosoever... The "secret" of the kingdom grows in those who hold it in prayer and life! Buttrick goes on to note that the secret of Christ is to be like a seed: multiplied to harvest. May we be "seers" and "sowers"!

God has blessed you, because your eyes can see and your ears can hear! Many prophets and good people were eager to see what you see and to hear what you hear. But I tell you that they did not see or hear! (Matthew 13:16-17, CEV)

Together, we can be an effective community of fellowship, service and witness for the cause of the Gospel of Jesus Christ because we too are blessed to know the "secret": God so loved the world . . .that whosoever . . .

VALLEY FORGE, PA (July 22) - The Rev. Marcus Matthews, a newly-elected bishop of The United Methodist Church, has been assigned to The Philadelphia Area. Matthews will begin his new assignment on September 1 to lead the nearly 1000 churches in the Eastern Pennsylvania and Peninsula-Delaware Conferences.

Matthews, superintendent of the Washington West District in the Baltimore-Washington Annual Conference, was elected a bishop by the Northeastern Jurisdictional Conference of the UMC on Wednesday, July 14.

Bishop Matthew's Installation Service and welcome will be Sunday, September 26, at Tindley Temple United Methodist Church in Philadelphia, PA. A reception will begin at 3:00 pm with the services beginning at 5:00 pm.

Strategic Planning Committee Seeks to Build Community

hange and growth happen everyday all around us. It is healthy, but sometimes scary. This was brought home to us after our church's recent survey. Our membership saw the Contemporary Service as an important means of growth - to bring the unchurched to Christ. But it also brought about changes we

brought about changes we sometimes are having difficulty dealing with.

Thus, our Strategic Planning Committee has been meeting with the purpose of finding ways to remove the roadblocks to again become "one in the spirit."

The following message came out of the United Methodist Association of Annual Conference

Lay Leaders: United Methodists will forever be involved in unchristian action toward one another if each person does not let go of concern about "I" and make efforts to become "we." When we are doing the work of the church, we are the body of Christ in action. Ministry becomes our number one concern, making disciples our number one priority.

The Strategic Planning Committee asks you, our membership, to prayerfully con-

sider our *roadblocks* and then, in one body and spirit, help make growth-related changes. Lack of communication is at the top of our list. There is misinformation regarding attitudes, actions, events, monetary matters, etc. We have a tendency to *think the worst* first

based on fragmentary or incorrect knowledge. We have an inordinate focus on budget, not ideas or purpose. We rely on hearsay rather than getting the facts from the pastor, lay leader, or committee member. We need to know that we all are invited to our church meetings (except Staff-Parish). We need to be positive rather than negative in con-

versations. Our God is a God of change. God gave us the church that must be ever-changing to meet today's world. God expects us to have an innovative and evolving ministry based on God's unchanging WORD.

As the Strategic Planning Committee works to help facilitate change for LPCUMC, some ideas have begun to emerge to build relationships and unify

Religious writer Charles R. Swindoll claims, Two major mistakes are commonly found in the family of God. One is giving lost people too much theology; two is giving saved people too much of the gospel. He contends, Saved people don't grow if all they're told is the cross and tomb. Lost people won't understand if what they are told is the deep subjects of theology. To Swindoll's two "mistakes" I would add a third: failing to clothe the ageless story of Jesus in relevant, contemporary attire. Without a remedy, the most regular church-goers can become numb, strayed sheep remain unclaimed and those inbetween cannot be awakened from their spiritual doldrums.
