

Sunday, November 7 – The 23rd Sunday after Pentecost – ALL SAINTS' SUNDAY – HOLY COMMUNION – Pastor Larry's sermon will be entitled *Attention Grabbers*, based on Ephesians 1:18, *with the eyes of your heart enlightened, you may know what is the hope to which he* (God) *has called you.*

Sunday, November 14 – The 24th Sunday after Pentecost – The sermon will be entitled *The End?* based on Luke 21:9, *When you hear of wars and insurrections, do not be terrified; for these things must take place first, but the end will not follow immediately.*

hile on a short-term mission trip, a pastor was leading worship at a leper colony on the island of Tobago. A woman who had been facing away from the pulpit turned around.

It was the most hideous face I had ever seen, the pastor said. The woman's nose and ears were entirely gone. She lifted a fingerless hand in the air and asked, "Can we sing 'Count Your Many Blessings?'"

Overcome with emotion, the pastor left the service. He was followed by a team member who said, *I guess you'll never be able to sing that song again*.

Yes I will, the pastor replied, but I'll never sing it the same way.

It is amazing how some experiences along our life's journey have such a profound life-altering impact on us.

> Count your blessings, name them one by one, Count your blessings,

see what God hath done! Count your blessings, name them one by one, And it will surprise you what the Lord hath done.


November is the month in which we celebrate Thanksgiving. Thanksgiving is that time when we are to count our many blessings. Yet, all too few of us stop to think of the blessings that we enjoy, that ought to be counted. And even if we do think of our blessings, all too few of us think that they ought to find expression in our lives.

In one African tribe

when a member wants to express gratitude to another, he or she sits for a long time in front of the hut of the person who did the favor and literally says, *I sit on the ground before you*.

As people of faith, what makes us feel blessed and how does this blessedness find expression in our lives?

This year the first Sunday in Advent falls on Thanksgiving weekend. Advent is



that season when we prepare for the coming of the Christ into the world. That event has had a profound historyaltering impact on our world. The world has never been the same since the birth of that child so long ago. And, even more, the lives of those who have opened their hearts to receive this child have never been the same.

My hunch is that Tobago woman had found the peace and joy of the Christ present with her and so, despite her affliction and suffering, she was able to count her blessings. That experience had a profound life-altering impact on her. It should have such an impact on all of us.

It has been my experience that many of us are quick to grumble about what we don't have instead of seeing what we do have. But most of us have so much! And the promise of Advent is that God will give us more than we could ever imagine, perhaps not in material blessings but rather in the kind of blessings that woman experienced: joy and peace in believing.

We may not *sit on the ground before* God, but our lives should express our gratitude for God's blessings and for the promise of the Christ's presence with us. Often, around Thanksgiving, I speak of *thanks-living*, by which I mean that we ought to live out our gratitude to God each and every day for all that God has done, is doing, and will do for us. May we all be found faithful in doing so!

For over 300 years one of the favorite Thanksgiving hymns has been Martin Rinkart's *Now Thank We All Our God*, the first line of which reads: *Now thank we all our God, with hearts and hands and voices*. . . Written at the end of the Thirty Years War for the people of his native Saxony, the hymn comes out of a background of personal suffering, tragedy, and horrible pri-

vation. With it, Rinkart called the people of his parish and community to renewal and rebuilding, thanking God that their lives had been spared.

True gratitude, as the hymn expresses, begins with an inner state of appreciation which evidences itself through deeds and words. In November we give special thanks to God for our abundant blessings as individuals, as Christians, and as a nation. Out of the background of our abundance we have an opportunity to profess and proclaim our inner awareness

Our commitment to the church of time, talent, and treasure is a sacramental experience by which inner gratitude is tangibly demonstrated. On Thanksgiving Day we bless God for all our gifts. Thanksgiving, along with our financial commitments to the church, enable us to acknowledge *with heart and hands and voices* our gratitude, God's ownership, humanity's indebtedness, and our response to God's love expressed in Christ our Lord.




blood drive. We provided a total of 13 units of blood. Although we did not meet our goal, the blood bank was indeed thankful for our efforts.

LP's Sunday morning learning schedule for children includes a mini-lesson, scripturally-based activity for 3-year olds through 3rd graders following the Children's Message at the Contemporary Service. This mini-session uses Group's KIDSOWN Worship curriculum resources for hands-on, exciting learning, provided by six rotating teachers. Children return to join their parents upon completion of the activity. Upper elementary (grades 4, 5, 6) children are encouraged to remain in worship with their families throughout this service (some serve as youth helpers on a rotating basis).

An Adult Lectionary Bible Study Class uses Cokesbury's *Keeping Holy Time* to focus discussion on the Scriptures upon which all Sunday morning
