LP Member Plans Medical Mission Trip

A 35-member team of doctors, nurses, pharmacists, and evangelists will travel to Chalchuapa, El Salvador from March 12 - 20. **Betty Frederickson** feels privileged to travel as a member of this team. With the help of the Oasis Ministries Church, the team will reach out to the underprivileged of the city of Chalchaupa (population 100,000). The types of diseases they expect to treat include parasites, skin fungus, gastrointestinal problems, infections, flu, colds, and respiratory problems.

Over the counter medicinal items such

as Ibuprofen (200 mg) and multi-vitamins with iron for adults and children are in great need. Boxes have been placed in the Wagner Room and Multi-Purpose

Social Room for your donations. The team is asked to label and pre-package all items; Betty's deadline for accepting your gifts must be **February 28**.

Especially needed are your prayers for the team's success in serving as our Lord's workers to bring His message of hope and spiritual healing as well as medical healings.

- At **9:30 am** during the Contemporary Service sermon, a mini-lesson and activity are available for children ages 3 through 3rd grade in Room 101, while older elementary ages worship with their families in the Multi-purpose Room
- At 9:30 am for adults, the Adult Lectionary Bible Study explores the morning's worship scriptures under the tutelage of Norm and Nancy Dettra in the Church Library.
- At **10:45** am Church School uses Group's Faith Weaver curriculum resources and includes graded classes for all children:
 - Room 101 for 3, 4 & 5 year olds
 - Room 102 for 4th, 5th & 6th graders
 - Room 104 for 1st, 2nd & 3rd graders

Youth meet and discuss contemporary films searching for Christian meaning in Room 103.

Adults are deep into a 24-week lecture/video series on a historical/cultural introduction and exploration of the 27 books of the New Testament, facilitated by **Earl Hope** in the Church Library.

he Rev. Harold Kohn wrote, Everyday God can be found somewhere, getting a fresh start in unexpected stable-like places. ligaments. Surgery took place on Wednesday to repair the ligament and tendon damage and to place a plate and eight screws on the broken bone.

On Tuesday, December 7, I began to learn the truth of Rev. Kohn's words in a very personal way. I had been at an early meeting at the Highlands, and as I was pulling out of the parking lot, I realized I

From the time I entered the emergency room at the Reading Hospital to the time I was discharged from the Rehabilitation unit 10 days later, I met God anew in many different ways.

had left something at the house that I needed at the office. It was raining heavily but I decided to return to the house to pick up the item I had forgotten.

I have been privileged so to see God at work in my life...

I pulled into the driveway as close to the garage door as possible so that I could

dash into the house without an umbrella. I took about three steps from the car when, for some reason, my right leg slipped as though I stepped on ice, and I fell with my left leg under me. As the weight of my body came to rest on my left leg I heard a strange "popping" sound that I interpreted as not a very good sign.

After I was able to get into the house, I called Brenda and she came home and took me to the emergency room. After a basic examination and x-rays it was determined I had broken the fibula, displaced the tibia, and tore a number of tendons and

In the doctors, nurses, therapists, and support staff God was present as the healer to bring wholeness and health. My heartfelt gratitude goes to all the staff at the Reading Hospital, all of whom were truly caring and courteous

In visits, prayers (I was deeply touched to have lay people pray for me), telephone calls, gifts of chocolate, fruit, and books, God was present as the source of consolation and encouragement. My deepest appreciation goes to all of you who sent a card, called, stopped by, brought a gift, or brought food. Words seem inadequate to express my gratitude for your thoughtfulness and caring.

In the quick action of Dorris and Kathy to assure coverage in the pulpit and coverage for other pastoral matters during







UMYF Coordinator Search

LPCUMC is currently searching for a UM Youth Fellowship Coordinator to organize youth activities and to build a stronger youth-oriented program at LP. The creation of this position arose because the church was unable to recruit a volunteer from within the congregation and from the concern of current active youth and parents during a meeting with Pastor Larry and Dorris McCoy last fall.

It was felt that in order for the youth program to grow and strengthen, the group needed to have someone who could focus on the youth and be a role model and mentor. A job de-

scription was created to describe the function, responsibilities and qualifications for this position (20 hours/month) and was presented with a proposal to the SPRC and Finance Committee for hiring and funding approval. The position was included in the approved 2005 budget.

A Task Force from SPRC and parents of youth was established, and advertising for this position will begin after the holidays. Parents of youth will continue to host monthly gatherings for the youth until the position can be filled. For more information, please contact the church office.


