velopment and church library books are examples. Some fund-raisers have been for specific items such as multivitamins, ibuprofen, or children's gifts.

> Hopefully the time will come when members will pledge enough to cover all our expenses and we can expand our mission giving. As one staff leader said, Fund-raising takes a lot of time and energy that I would rather spend with people or

on programs. However, that time has not vet arrived.

After the September Stewardship Campaign, there was a deficit of \$10,000 in the 2005 budget of income minus expenses. The Finance Committee was able to reduce the amount, but the 2005 budget still has a \$4,733 deficit, and the only new item was for a staff Youth Leader

Sunday, March 6 – THE FOURTH SUNDAY IN LENT – ONE GREAT HOUR OF SHARING – HOLY COMMUNION – Pastor Larry's sermon will be entitled, What Do You Know? based on John 9:25, I do not know whether he is a sinner. One thing I do know, that though I was blind, now I see.

**Sunday, March 13** – THE FIFTH SUNDAY IN LENT –

Pastor Larry's sermon will be entitled, *The Skeleton Key* based on Ezekiel 37:4-6: *Then he said to me, 'Prophesy to these bones, and say to them: O dry bones hear the word of the Lord. Thus says the Lord God to these bones: I will cause breath to enter you, and you shall live. I will lay sinews on you, and will cause flesh to come upon you, and cover you with skin, and put breath in you, and you shall live; and you shall know that I am the Lord.'*

**Friday, March 25 – 7:30 pm** – GOOD FRIDAY – TENABRAE – Pastor Larry's sermon will be entitled, *Looks Can Be Deceiving* based on John 19:30: *When Jesus had received the wine, he said, 'It is finished.' Then he bowed his head and gave up his spirit.*





#### Church Building Goes Up in Guatemala

A mission group of nine members plus myself left before 5 am on January 11 from the Philadelphia Airport, just before a snowstorm. After landing and taking off again from Houston, we continued to the Central American country of Guatemala on a 2 1/2 hour flight.

When we arrived at the Guatemala airport, we were joined by eight people from Honduras and two people from El Salvador who completed our work team.

The object of our work mission was to construct the first floor of a building to adjoin a church, consisting of two Sunday School rooms, a storage room, and a garage. The second floor will be added when another mission group comes and there are more funds to finish it.

We attended evening church services on January 12 and began working the next day. We worked for four days straight. On Sunday, January 16, we had a morning tour of a market in the town of Quetzaltenango, about 100 miles south of



Coatepeque. In the afternoon we attended church services.

From Monday, January 17, to Friday, January 21, we finished the construction on the first floor. The two Sunday School rooms

would be in use that Sunday!

We left on Friday afternoon to spend our last evening in LaAntiqua, the oldest city in Guatemala.

After a bus ride to the Guatemala City airport, we said good-bye to the Honduras and El Salvador team members. We boarded our plane for Houston. Because of a snowstorm in the Philadelphia area, we flew into Newark and took Amtrak and Septa trains to the Philadelphia airport. It was a joyful arrival in Reading late Sunday night!


Nationally, as of February 16, 9,185 organizations reported contributions of \$3,262,550 to help the hungry and homeless.

## Where Those "Extra Envelope" Dollars Go

Each month there are extra envelopes in the packet mailed to you. Some are for the Building Fund; others are for Missions and twice a year Endowment envelopes can be found. If you have placed a contribution in one of them, it became multi-

plied by the contributions of others.

Contributions to the Building Fund are applied directly to the outstanding principal on our loan. During 2004 an additional total of \$6,395 was applied to the loan. At the end of December, the outstanding loan balance was \$182,753.

Mission contributions are distributed to various projects selected by the Mission Committee. The committee publishes the selected projects in the bulletin and the *News-Linc*. A total of \$5,909 was contributed to missions during 2004.

Last year a total of \$9,535 was given to the Endowment Fund. The Endowment Fund principal has reached \$60,004. Each year 90 percent of the interest earned is made available to new church programs. This year \$1,800 was allocated for uses beyond the Program Budget.

## **Endowment Provides Extras**

Beyond our regular budget, four "extras" can be added to the thrust of God's Church in Lincoln Park. Funding will come from accumulated interest of \$1800 in the Endowment Fund.

Our mission ministry will be extended by an extra \$150. Our Bell Choir will function better by adding four complementary lecterns, costing \$200.

Pending the appointment of a Youth Fellowship Coordinator, \$350 will be available for further training and support, if needed. And \$1100 will round out expenses of the inspiring "Bridges of Hope" Retreat held in January.

Through the generosity of a number of our members during 2004, with gifts ranging from \$10 to \$1,000, the Endowment Fund reached a total in principal of \$60,004 on December 31. A goal of \$100,000 appears to be within reach based on continuing envelope and cash gifts and three confidentially disclosed bequests.

pute, or respect. Originally, the word referred to a person of honor, as when a citizen referred to the king as your worship.

There are many ways to worship the Most Worthy. We can fall to our knees. We can pray. We can praise. We can sing. We can conduct our daily lives with such honor and beauty that the One we serve is proud to call us citizens of the Kingdom. But there is nothing more honoring, honorable, and worshipful than in putting our money where our mouths are.

In some ways, our gift to the church is the highest and most concrete act of worship we perform, simply because it is the most difficult; it requires us to sacrifice the work of our hands, the fruit of our labors, a good portion of the legal tender with which we might otherwise have purchased many of the good things of

life. The way we spend our money is the most eloquent testimony to what we consider worthy and honorable.

When you stop to think about all that God has given – this shining planet, friends to cherish, a bountiful table, a Son at Calvary, a victory over death – God doesn't ask for much, only a small portion – an hour a week in praise, a couple more in service to church and community, small daily acts of mercy and justice. You get to keep at least 90 percent of your hours and dollars. That's not a bad deal, as deals go. Won't you respond extravagantly to God's extravagance?
