From the Pastor's Desk

he front of the envelope proclaimed that the contents revealed the secret to church growth. Opening the envelope, I found a glossy flyer the headline of which announced, People leave your church everyday! Naturally, I found these two statements conflicting and confusing. Apart from an offer to sell mailing lists of new residents, I never did find the secret to church growth.

As I mused on the statement at the top of the flyer, I was both struck by the truth of the statement and troubled by it. While people may not be leaving our individual churches "every day," the truth is that

people do leave our churches on a fairly regular basis. Some leave and never assume an active relationship with a church again. Many others move their membership to other churches. A recent study indicated that most Protestant churches grow mainly by church members (many of them disgruntled with their previous church) moving their membership from one church to another.

People leave churches for many reasons. Often the reasons have little to do with matters of substance. Some that seem substantive are often nothing more

than shallow excuses that focus on secondary concerns rather than *the heart of Christian faith* and practice.

Often, we find people who have a history of moving from one congregation to another. They are labeled *church hoppers*. It is a safe assumption that if people have left a number of churches because they became unhappy with things in those churches, they will only be

"temporary residents" in any new

Although we clergy types tend to understand this behavior, it does not mean that we are not troubled by it. In fact, I must say that I find it

very disconcerting. I am particularly troubled when someone I have received into membership leaves – particularly those who become totally inactive and lost to the church – for I had hoped that I had helped them to an understanding of the importance of the church to their faith journey.

Those who move their membership elsewhere because of what I have noted as *secondary concerns* also trouble me. When the color of the carpet or the location of the hymn boards or the singing of an occasional new hymn (these are meant to serve as examples, not representing

any actual situations – even though they could) become the focus of one's relationship with the church, there is a serious disconnect between professed faith and practice.

Occasionally, someone will have a serious theological problem with a particular church. I respect individuals who wrestle with such theological issues. United Methodists, along with most major Protestant denominations, currently wrestle with the place of homosexuals in the ranks of the clergy. This is a difficult issue that does not yield itself to an easy solution, for there are committed Christians on both sides of the debate. It seems to me that when people on one side of the debate leave they are, in essence, abandoning their cause.

In my years in ministry people have left churches I served because they disagreed with me theologically, some finding me too liberal, some finding me too conservative. Yet, where such departures have taken place following an open and honest conversation, I have been able to affirm the person and respect him or her in their decision.

Yes, people leave churches for all kinds of reasons, perhaps not every day but with a disturbing degree of regularity. I grieve their leaving, for it reflects badly on the cause of the Gospel of Jesus Christ and the church that bears his name.


The apostle Paul counseled the people in the church at Ephesus, I therefore, the prisoner in the Lord, beg you to lead a life worthy of the calling to which you have been called, with all humility and gentleness, with patience, bearing with one another in love, making every effort to maintain the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace. There is one body and one Spirit, just as you were called to the one hope of your calling, one Lord, one faith, one baptism, one God and Father of all, who is above all and through all and in all. (Ephesians 4:1-6, NRSV)

Perhaps the secret of church growth lies somewhere in Paul's words!

Charitable Giving

from Jerry Manhart

Have you filed your 2004 tax returns? If you're in the process of filing your taxes, you'll want to figure your charitable deductions to add to your itemized deductions page. The more you give to charity the less you give the government to spend.

Some members have given stock as gifts for the Endowment Fund and the Capital Campaign. Now a few have given stock to meet their annual pledge. They received full credit for the value of the stock on the date sold and were able to avoid paying the capital gains tax.

Perhaps you've heard of paying your utility bills by automatic payment. A few members are paying their monthly church giving using that method. Contact your bank if you're interested.

Did you tithe last year? Tithing is making a voluntary, systematic contribution of financial support to your church. In the Old Testament, a tithe was a tenth of total property. Today we could use 10 % of our income. If you did not tithe last year, consider increasing your giving this year.

You can estimate your percent of giving using the following chart.




The current advisors for the group are the Rev. Quentin Wallace and Lisa Blount. The choir does not charge a fee, but gifts are appreciated.
