From the Pastor's Desk

From Pastor Larry Carl

orty years! It hardly seems possible, yet it was in the spring of 1965 that I was licensed as a probationary member of the Evangelical United Brethren Church. Shortly after I received a call from the Rev. Dr. Warren Mentzer asking if I would be interested in serving as pastor of Bethesda Evangelical United Brethren Church in Phoenixville. I assumed the pastorate of Bethesda Church on July 1, 1965. I was married to Brenda on July 10. In September I entered my junior year at Albright College.

For the most part those 40 years have been, as they say in auto racing, "a good ride." I have been blessed to know many wonderful people and to experience many inspiring events in the churches I have served. I could reflect on each church and lift up persons or events that had a profound impact on my life. I have learned much from the people with whom I served in ministry that has stayed with me through the years.

When I first went to that little church in Phoenixville, the congregation's "sage" of down-home wisdom gave me a lot of advice that has served me well in my ministry. Among the things he shared was, You ain't gonna (sic) please everybody. You better learn that right away. That's a hard lesson for clergy to learn, for we tend to be pleasers, wanting to please everyone. I learned that Lester was right.

Instead of trying to please everybody, I have struggled to find a way of pleasing

God in my ministry. Integrity has become a by-word for me. I want what I do to reflect my confession of faith. And I want people to know that what I do and say is consistent with what I claim to believe. For me, it is a sad commentary on the church that integrity seems too often lacking in our clergy and in our parishioners.

Shortly after graduating from United Theological Seminary in

1970, I was assigned to the Effort and Saylorsburg Charge in Monroe County. Both of these churches were blessed with visitors who had second homes in the Poconos. One Sunday a regular visiting couple brought a guest, a professor of New Testament and Homiletics (preaching) at Eastern Baptist Theological Seminary. A gracious gentleman, the professor told me I had a special gift for preaching. His words have remained with me, and I have sought to make preaching

a priority in my ministry, to develop and use the gift well and with the same integrity I have attempted to apply to my ministry.

A social worker, who served in the same churches with me and worked with the same family in crisis, noted that I was "very accessible." The words were meant as a compliment, but they also came as a challenge. I wanted to be accessible. Out

of those words came another focus for my ministry: pastoral care. Through the years I have sought to be accessible and diligent in providing pastoral care for those in need. While I recognize that I have not been "perfect," I hope I have been faithful in my role as pastor.

As I was working on my Doctor of Ministry degree, I was challenged to develop a personal mission statement. I took my cue from the words of the apostle Paul in his letter to church at Colossae: I became its (the church's) servant according to God's commission that was given to me for you, to make the word of God fully known . . . It is he (Christ) whom we proclaim, warning everyone and teaching everyone in all wisdom, so that we may present everyone mature in Christ. For this I toil and struggle with all the energy that he powerfully inspires within me. (Colossians 1:25, 28-29) My personal mission became to help those under my

ministry know the word of God so they may "mature in Christ." I hope I have been faithful to that mission.

Recently, I read the comments of a pastor retiring after many years of service. He was asked what the greatest blessings were in his ministry. His answer was *the people*. He was then asked what his greatest frustrations and/or disappointments were. His answer was *the people*. I know what he

means. Many of the people I have met have been a rich source of blessing. But I know, too, the disappointment of which he speaks. It is not a disappointment born of a lack of skills or abilities, but rather a disappointment in people's failure to live by what they claim to believe, a failure to truly be the church, the people

of God. It is that integrity issue once again.

As Brenda and I have often noted, it is the positives that remain in our memory. The problems, the difficult situations, and difficult people slip out of our memory. We hold onto and cherish and celebrate those moments where the grace and love of God has made itself known in our relationship with others and in the life of the communities of faith in which we have served. Just yesterday I received a note from a man whom I have not

seen in 18 years. It was a simple but beautiful testimony to the power of God's love in the community of faith. He simply wrote that since we left St. Andrew's he has prayed for us every day, for our family and for our ministry. What a blessing!

If I could change something about my ministry it would be to have given more of my time and energy to ministry with, and advocacy for, the poor and disenfranchised. I have come to believe that this should be the church's focus in the world. We focus much of our time and energy on other things and tend to forget that Jesus says we will be judged ultimately on whether or not we fed the hungry, provided drink for the thirsty, welcomed the stranger, clothed the naked, cared for the sick, and visited the prisoner. (See Matthew 25:31 vv.)

I have been blessed to have Brenda with me on this journey. She has been a source of inspiration, encouragement, counsel, and challenge. She has always shared herself

unselfishly with the churches we have served. Someone recently said that her picture should be in the dictionary next to the definition of a pastor's wife. More, I believe, her picture could be beside the definition of Christian, for she has exhibited all of the finest qualities of a life committed to Christ. I am grateful that she has been with me on this journey.

Forgive me for such a long article but I wanted you to



As we approach our Fall Stewardship Campaign, we could be asking ourselves what more can we do as individual members to carry out our mission of Seeking and Sharing Christ? How

can we put our membership vow of "time, talent and treasure" into greater **ACTION?** In what ways can we support the efforts of our pastor and leaders to achieve new dimensions of Christ-like service?

With awareness that **God gives us everything we possess**, many of our members are already giving their **TIME** and **TALENT** generously. Each of us has unique talents to do the same.

The purpose of this article is to take a hard look at treasure (our income) as a gift of God in a special way which may be new for some of us. If our **heart** is behind our treasure, our giving becomes both a spiritual and financial opportunity to put our faith in action. How? **As**

A PERCENTAGE OF

INCOME. Some are certainly doing this already—others may not.

In the June *News-Linc*, Pastor Larry cited these references in his "Stewardship Thoughts:"

- "Churches that have no annual stewardship campaign produce the lowest average of per capita giving—
 1.5% of income."
- "Pledging congregations (perhaps similar to us) average 2.9% of income."
- "Percentage-giving congregations average 4.6% of income."

In the May *News-Linc*, a profile of our congregation showed a wide variation of pledging per week — \$1 to \$300 - with 11% (24) pledging \$65 to \$300 per week, 13% (28) between \$35 and \$55 per week, 32% (74) between \$5 and \$30, and 44% (over 100) no pledge at all. Two questions arise —

• Where do you fit into this profile? and...

• Does your pledge represent a percentage of your income?

If we are at all like the "pledging congregations" noted above, our total congregational income could be estimated at \$11,295,137 based upon our operating budget of \$327,559 and the 2.9 percentage of income.

Consider these possibilities...

• If we achieved the average percentage giving of 4.6% of income, our annual operat-

ing budget could reach a total of \$519,576...a significant increase in support of our ministries, AND—guess what? — pay off our debt in one year.

• But...picture this—if we became a **TITHING** congregation (10% of income) —as a few members already do — we could achieve an annual budget of \$1,129,514. At this level, we could advance our services in major ways, enhance God's Church and property, and move on to additional exciting goals and objectives.

As we approach Commitment Sunday in early fall, our Stewardship Committee asks us to prayerfully consider **placing God first** by committing to the **highest percentage of income** we are able. If we all did this, we would witness **amazing grace and service** in the name of *Seeking and Sharing Christ*.

"He's a good kid and has made choices to be his own person," says Laura. Congratulations to Carson!


Lindsay Sakmann


needed or a volunteer was not available
