The lover of money will not be satisfied with money; nor the lover of wealth with gain. This also is vanity.

---Ecclesiastes 5:10, NRSV

One of Aesop's fables tells of a dog with a fine slab of meat in his mouth that crossed a bridge over a river and saw his reflection in the water. Thinking it to be another dog with a larger piece of meat, he let go of his own and dived at the other dog to take it. He surfaced with nothing, and his dinner washed away in the current.

This fable is an example of what happens when we make money or possessions our most important goal – we can wind up losing everything.

An Update on Abuse Clearances

The Eastern Pennsylvania Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church passed Resolution 2005-14S at the '05 Annual Conference, requiring all paid and volunteer workers with children and youth to have on file current appropriate Child Abuse Clearances in

order to continue in these ministries.



This is in keeping of Jesus' commanding his disciples and us to *Let the little children come to me*, (Matt. 19:13) and his indicating that children should be protected and respected

in his community (Matt. 18:1-10). Local congregations are also called to affirm their valuable workers, both volunteer and paid, and to protect them from suspicion and gossip. This requirement is effective December 31, 2005; LP's compliance with this resolution must be a matter of record at its annual Charge Conference.

What does this mean for LP Church? This means that all of our dedicated, car-


