# From the Pastor's Desk

**THOUGHTS** 

ON

RETIREMENT

hen I came into ministry, I was an idealist. I suppose in my church involvement as a young person I was never part of the "reality church." And so I entered ministry believing that people really did live by Biblical and spiritual guidelines. I knew about the disputes in the early church as recorded in Scripture, but I thought that was in the "olden days" and we are so much more sophisticated and knowledgeable **APPROACHING** now. Surely, we've gotten beyond all that.

Even though I've discovered that we haven't gotten beyond all that, I will leave ministry still an idealist. That is. I honestly believe that there is an ideal to which we are called as the church of Jesus Christ. Just because we fail in living out that ideal does not mean that it ceases to exist; it still stands as our goal – and as our judge!

As I watched the images of the wrath of hurricane Katrina and its aftermath, I heard many newscasters say that the storm brought out both the best and the worst in people. There are times when the life of the church seems to bring out the worst in people when it ought always to bring out the best.

I think of all the people who have stood in front of me and the congregation and took vows, made covenant, to be faithful participants in the life of the church, but did not live up to those vows. I have always sought to take people at face value and have wrestled with whether many who stood before the congregation might have perjured themselves, never intend-

> ing to keep the vows they made. I grieve for the potential loss to both the individual and the church Surely our best is better than that!

There are those who have cut and run. Something does-

n't please them. They don't like the form of the service. They don't get anything out of the sermon. They don't like that John Jones has been made Lav Leader. So they cut out and run someplace else – until something there doesn't please them. I came into the ministry believing that the life of the church was not so much about us but about building the kingdom of God and serving the Christ, that people of faith and commitment. when they saw a need in the church for things to be different, would work with Christian love and grace to make them what they needed to be.

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When we moved to Berks County, I remember billboards advertising a health insurance company and proclaiming, *It's all about you!* Sadly, too many people in the church believe *It's all about me!* They will do whatever they need to do, say whatever they need to say, hurt whomever they need to hurt, go wherever they need to go, to have it their way and get what they want. I grieve what the cause of the gospel has suffered with such attitudes. Surely our best is better than that.

I share this with you not to point fingers or level blame but to let you know that in the years I have been in ministry these things have been the greatest source of disappointment and frustration for me. They are the things that sadden and grieve me about the church

People have told me that my view on things is not realistic. They are probably



right. I neither understand nor like so-called "reality TV." I don't understand or like "reality church" – if that's what it is. I will leave ministry an idealist, grieving the church's failure to live up to the ideals that it was given by the one who is the Lord of the Church.

On a hillside in Pottstown, PA, sits Second Baptist Church, an African-American congrega-

tion. For the 11 years I served in Pottstown, Second Baptist's outdoor sign proclaimed, *Let the Church be the Church*! That's the ideal I longed to see: the church being the church, being what the Lord intended and called it to be.

Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewal of your minds. (Romans 12:2a)

# A Traditional, Blended, or Contemporary Service?

### Psalm 150 RSV

raise the Lord! Praise God in his sanctuary; praise him in his mighty firmament!
Praise him for his mighty deeds; praise him according to his exceeding greatness!

Praise him with trumpet sound; praise him with lute and harp!
Praise him with timbrel and dance; praise him with strings and pipe!
Praise him with sounding cymbals; praise him with loud clashing cymbals!
Let everything that breathes praise the LORD! Praise the LORD!

Which is the right way to worship God? Is there only one way to worship God? What kind of worship is the proper one? What kind of music genres and instruments does God want us to use for worship?

These and many other questions are commonly debated topics in the majority of churches worldwide. Broad terms such as *traditional*, *blended*, and *contemporary* attempt to define several worship styles in the church of today. However, this terminology cannot always include what is considered traditional, blended, or contemporary for everyone, and in many cases the lines are often crossed. Moreover, what was labeled traditional

or contemporary in previous generations is not what we call traditional or contemporary today. The same rationale tells us that this trend will continue.

Nevertheless, some general characteristics involving these contrasting worship styles are present in most denominations and independent churches of our times. A traditional service usually employs:

- a chancel choir mainly singing anthems in a four-part harmony setting

In contrast, the contemporary service usually employs:

- a praise-band with electronic and instruments usually associated with popular music
- a small ensemble of leading vocalists with microphones primarily singing melody with occasional harmony
- the use of Christian lyrics adapted to popular music often inspired by current and living Christian artists.

As a result, a blended service freely employs elements from both of these styles.

While elements such as congregational singing, prayers, scripture reading, hom-

ily, offertory, and communion are present in the traditional, blended, and contemporary services, it is really the way in which they are presented and performed that makes them unique.

Psalm 150 gives us an excellent example of how we should worship God. What does it really say? Does it lead us towards the traditional, blended, or the contemporary service? I am not a theolosing unto the gian, but I don't think that this

psalm tells us what kind of music genre we should employ in worship.

Instead, this passage is rather very inclusive by representing different families of instruments that have gradually evolved throughout the centuries, such as brass, string-based instru-

ments, other wind-based instruments, and even percussion. Moreover, Psalm 150 calls for everything that breathes to praise the Lord with music and even with dance. The point is that all musical instruments can be used in any type of service; it is the musical intent of the instruments and the performers which makes the difference.

Other scripture passages address the repertoire to be used in worship.

Ephesians 5:19 – Speaking to yourselves in psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, singing and making mel-

ody in your heart to the Lord, and Colossians 3.16 – Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly in all wisdom; teaching and admonishing one another in psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, singing with grace in your hearts to the Lord.

While hymns have remained as an icon of the sacred literature through-

out the ages, the song form has been exploited in the secular world. Church history reveals an endless cycle in the argument harp; about the use of secular music in worship: as soon as secularism takes over completely, a

reform calls for a return to the original sacred elements. The and the voice bottom line is that the Bible of a psalm. teaches us that praising God Rsalm 98:5 involves primarily our entire being, our spirituality ori-

ented to lift praises to God, and that the gift of music and other arts, and their rich forms and resources, should be also dedicated for the glory of our Lord. After all, music and art are an expression of humanity. Culture, time, and personal experiences play a big role in art forms, allowing a wide spectrum of the human condition to be expressed.

Christ By the Sea is aware of the need to spread the gospel to as many (Continued on page 16)

people as possible. Having traditional, blended, and contemporary services is living testimony of our mission to reach our goal as Disciples of Christ by unconditionally opening our doors to different people with different ways to praise God.


