

From the Pastor's Desk

From Pastor Larry Carl

I love Christmas!

I'm not talking about the commercial celebration. I'm talking about the church's celebration of the birth of Jesus Christ

I grew up in a home where not much was made of Christmas. My home church did little to mark the event. The first little church I served in Phoenixville marked it as a special celebration only if it fell on a Sunday.

But when I came back from seminary and was appointed to the Effort and Saylorsburg Charge, each church had a

Christmas Eve service. And there were other events and celebrations that made the coming of Christmas very special. In that charge, I remember working with a gentleman who owned a Western Auto store. He helped to make Christmas special for families that might not have much of a Christmas. After services were over in both churches, I would meet Dave at his store. He would give me his "leftover" toys and some other merchandise that I would deliver to chosen families. How blessed I was to share in bringing some Christmas joy to families that might not otherwise have known it!

When I was appointed to St. Andrew's in Warminster we had two Christmas Eve services. What I remember most about those services is the number of people who came to worship. One year,

at the 8:00 service, we had over 400 people in a sanctuary that should seat approximately 235 people. It was awesome to share in a service where so many people had come to hear the good news of Christ's birth.

I could go on noting events and celebrations in churches I have served that have fostered my love for the church's celebration of Christmas. What I

have learned through all of these is the Christmas is not just "for the kids." Christmas is for anyone who will open his or her heart to the presence of God in the world. There are a myriad of events and moments which testify to that presence!

At some point, I was introduced to the writings of the late Rev. Harold E. Kohn, an Evangelical United Brethren pastor and author. He became – and still is – my favorite author on the Christ event - Christmas. Rev. Kohn wrote, *Christmas is not merely the commemoration of a*

long ago event. It is the repetition of the best of all human experiences, once shared by shepherds and wise men, the recognition that God has entered our midst by coming to us in flesh like our own. And Christmas is seeking Him, finding the good God in the humblest places, even our shabby, unworthy hearts, and giving Him our wholehearted devotion.

Yes, Christmas is more than a history lesson, more than trees and decorations, more than spending and gifts. *It is the repetition of the best of all human experiences* – to see and hear the presence of God in our world. As Rev. Kohn has written elsewhere, *Let us not miss the miracle because of some dullness of the soul*.

I love Christmas. I am grateful for the opportunity to be present with so many people in so many places who have had that *best of all human experiences*.

And, for you, this Christmas and everyday, I wish the same experience, the same miracle.

Course on Islam Enthusiastically Received

This will be a short flight over a tall mountain--so we'll be viewing only a glimpse, is how instructor/facilitator Sandi Rosencrans opened her five-week course, INTRODUCTION TO ISLAM which concluded Sunday, November 6. An ESL tutor for over 30 years and "affiliated" with Islam for 10 years, Sandi has an on-going interest in cultural and religious bridge-building and offered to design and conduct a course which would reflect that goal.

Three-time guest speaker, Jamal Abodalo, Vice-President of the Islamic Center of Reading, is a Kuwaiti-born engineer, a longtime resident of Berks

County and a personal friend of Sandi's who provided insightful historic detail on the origins, beliefs and development of Islam. In his first appearance, he greeted the class as fellow Muslims explaining that anyone who submits to the will of God is Islamic (*Islam* is an Arabic word which means submission to the will of God as a means to inner peace.)

On Saturday, October 30, the class and three accompanying guests visited the mosque from 6-8 pm to experience


Ramadan prayers and the breaking of the fast during which participants enjoyed a sampling of food with mostly Middle-Eastern accents. As one participant described it, *The mosque is like a United Nations!*

The last class presented three Muslims of diverse backgrounds: Rabia, from Morocco, who brought her two delightful and religiously knowledgeable children, Will and Kamilia; Khadijah, a self-described "Pennsylvania Dutch born-and-bred ex-Catholic" who converted to Islam some years ago, and Karima, mother of seven and a traditionally raised black American who con-

verted to Islam 27 years ago.

The total course emphasized the many similarities between Christianity and Islam. Critique sheets as well as conversational feed-back on this unique class validated the decision of the CE office to sponsor it. A letter of appreciation was sent to the Islamic Center of Reading thanking them for their cooperation and for their time, talent, candor and generosity of spirit.



mitment to the Lincoln Park Community United Methodist Church and its Christian service. Most of our members do reach the pledged goal that they set. Because costs go up each year, we hope that members will increase their giving each year

and therefore increase their pledge. Some members find that circumstances won't allow them to increase their pledge, so they pledge the same amount for an additional year. A few members find that they have to decrease their pledge. Although we hope we don't have too many, when members decrease their pledge, it still gives us more information to use in planning than not receiving a pledge.

What happens when members don't pledge?

When members don't pledge, the Stewardship Committee has to guess what their giving will be. If they guess too much, at the end of the year the expense budget will be in the red. If they don't guess enough, opportunities for Christian service will be lost for fear of lack of funds. Most of the time the committee guesses that those members will contribute the same as they did last year.



January, 2005 until April, members were sought for the Stewardship Committee and preliminary plans were made for the Fall Commitment Campaign. From May until July, the church staff and church committees were asked to meet and plan their 2006 Budget request. In August, the Finance Committee put the Proposed 2006 Budget together from the requests, and final plans for the Commitment Campaign were made. During September and October, information was distributed to the congregation, and the campaign was held. As I write this in early November, the

Reaching Out to Bahirdar, Ethiopia

I have been a member of Lincoln Park Community United Methodist Church for about 12 years. In the past six years it

has been my privilege to serve on medical mission teams under the guidance of our Lord and the Christian Medical & Dental Association-<u>G</u>lobal <u>H</u>ealth <u>O</u>utreach - traveling to El Salvador, Ecuador, Guatemala and Cameroon, Central Africa.

From Jan 28 - Feb 11, 2006, it will be my privilege to travel with a GHO medical team to Bahirdar, Ethiopia, located 250+ miles northeast of the capital, Addis Ababa. The population is about 168,048, plus those who come from surrounding areas. While Christianity and Islam are the predominate religions, less than 2% are professing evangelicals. We will work with the Emmanuel Light and Life Church, who will help with interpreting the Amharic language and the Christian discipleship and follow-up for new believers.

There are many medical needs. Those we expect to see most include:

- Malaria
- Bacterial/fungal skin infections
- Muscular rheumatism

- Tonsils infections
- Bronchopneumonia
- Parasitic infestations
- Gastroenteritis
- Tuberculosis
- Inflammatory diseases of the eye
- HIV/AIDS
- Sexually transmitted diseases
- Malnutrition, especially in children

In the past, you at LPUMC have graciously offered your prayer support for success in sharing the Lord's love with the people of the region, and for safety and health of the team. Prayer is the key to the success of any outreach. I ask for your prayers for open doors, open hearts to receive His gift of salvation, and for strength and health of the team. In January, a daily prayer schedule will be available for anyone who would like one.

If you wish to donate over-thecounter medications, I will be carrying with me the following:

- Adult or children's multivitamins with iron
- Ibuprofen 325 mg tablets or capsules


Any monetary donations will be used to purchase prescription medicines. My travel and personal expenses are my responsibility.
