

Stewardship Thoughts

A farm equipment dealer described a beautiful new tractor in the showroom to the farmer who was looking at it. Lavish words painted an exciting picture of power coupled with ease of operation. Each special feature was



eloquently enhanced with sales hyperbole. Glowing terms proclaimed the wisdom of investment in this particular model. Then the dealer told the farmer how much he (the dealer) needed to make this sale. If the farmer didn't buy the tractor, the company might go out of business!

Too often, this story is similar to what happens in our churches. Actually, it may be better than what we do in the church. Ministries of the church can be described in a vivid way to excite the potential giver. Features of the church's ministry are seldom extolled. In a rapid move, we zero in on the invitation: 'Please give, because the church needs the money to keep going.'

The invitation is not an invitation to keep the church afloat but to participate in its mission . . . The invitation is to invest in gospel work in this world.

We receive an abundance of invitations each day.

Giving is only one kind of invitation the church offers. It is a part of commitment but not all of it. In a culture with such strong economic implications for every action, giving is a very important dimension. It is a powerful sign – both to the outside world and the self-understanding of the giver.

Jesus had a lot to say about the way we manage our resources. He recommended sharing, giving, and sacrificing. He believed that the way we use our resources reflects our relationship with God. The church's invitation to commitment is always in the context of the mission of Christ. Financial giving is one dimension of the committed life. To omit giving from the commitment invitation is to ignore an important part of our faith response.

Tips for Making the Most of a Hospital Visit

From Linda Francisco Bets, Chaplain at Iowa Methodist Medical Center and Blank Children's Hospital in Des Moines, Iowa

- 1. Respect the patient's dignity and privacy. Telephone first to ensure your visit is timely and appropriate. Knock before you enter, even for relatives.
- 2. Concentrate on the patient, not your own activities, worries, and feelings.
- 3. Visit the patient, rather than visiting around the patient, even if the patient is unresponsive.
- 4. Offer to pray with the patient. Include the patient's concerns in your prayer.
- 5. Don't display any knowledge you may have about the patient's condition; let the patient tell you what's going on.
- 6. Never gossip about a hospital patient.
- 7. Offer to relieve family members so they may get coffee or take a walk.
- 8. Limit your visit. Two 20-minute visits are better than one 40-minute visit. Phone calls should also be brief.

When a patient has a life-threatening illness or is comatose, visits may be too much, and your support may best be expressed with frequent notes, cards and acts of kindness.

When you visit a seriously ill patient:

- Listen more than you talk. Avoid sharing stories of others with the same illness.
- Accept the patient as he is, whether passive, angry, sad, or optimistic.
- Always assume you can be heard. People in comas hear, think, feel and

dream.

- Speak to the person by name in a normal tone of voice.
- Touch is comforting. Hold hands, stroke an arm, the forehead or cheek.
- Read or recite familiar Bible passages such as Psalm 23, the Lord's Prayer or the Apostles' Creed.
