WORSHIP IN APRIL

Sunday, April 2 – Fifth Sunday in Lent – HOLY COMMUNION – The sermon will be entitled "Let Us See!" based on John 12:21, *They came to Philip, who was from Bethsaida in Galilee, and said to him, 'Sir, we wish to see Jesus.'*

Sunday, April 9 – PASSION/PALM SUNDAY – The sermon will be "Lost in a Crowd!" based on Mark 15:11-13, But the chief priests stirred up the crowd to have him release Barabbas for them instead. Pilate spoke to them again, 'Then what do you wish me to do with the man you call the King of the Jews?' They shouted back, 'Crucify him!""

Friday, April 14 – GOOD FRIDAY – TENEBRAE (Service of Darkness) The sermon will be entitled "Skimming the Headlines!" based on Isaiah 53:3, *He was despised and rejected by others; a man of suffer-*

ing and acquainted with infirmity; and as one from whom others hide their faces he was despised, and we held him of no account.

Sunday, April 16 – EASTER SUNDAY – The sermon, "A Live Option!" will be based on Mark 16:6, *But he said to them, 'Do not be alarmed; you are looking for Jesus of Nazareth, who was crucified. He has been raised; he is not here.'*

Sunday, April 23 – Second Sunday of Easter – HERITAGE SUNDAY – The sermon will be entitled "It's Personal!" based on John 20:24-25, *But Thomas (who is called the Twin), one of the twelve, was not with them when Jesus came. So the other disciples told him, 'We have seen the Lord.' But he said to them, 'Unless I see the mark of the nails in his hands, and put my finger in the mark of the nails and my hand in his side, I will not believe!'*

Sunday, April 30 – Third Sunday of Easter – The sermon will be "A Tough Call!" based on Acts 3:14-15, *But you rejected the Holy and Righteous One and asked to have a murderer given to you, and you killed the Author of life, whom God raised from the dead.*

From the Pastor's Desk

had just been at the church for about six months. They were preparing for the celebration of a significant anniversary. Additionally, they had voted to participate in a conference-wide emphasis on church growth.

Part of the participation in the conference-wide emphasis was surveying the

congregation relative to their attitudes and perceived needs around the issue of growth. One question on the survey dealt with the participants' perception of what was most needed in the church to help in its ministry and foster growth. Three respondents indicated that what they felt was most needed was a new pastor!

Though not devastated by this response, I certainly was troubled. After all, I had been at the church for only a short time, and already some people had decided that they could not work with me or didn't want to work with me. I felt unfairly judged. I wondered why they were unwilling to give me some time to prove that I could be a good pastor, that I wasn't all that bad a person. Now, these three people were anything but anonymous. In

many ways they left their dissatisfaction known – to me and to the congregation's leaders. But all they really accomplished was to hurt the church's ministry and witness within their circle of influence.

I am aware that change is difficult – more so for some than others. I realize that I brought a different perspective on

ministry, that I was a different person with a different personality than their previous pastor. And, yes, such changes can be difficult. It is difficult not knowing what is going to happen in our life together as a church family. We worry about programs and events that we have come to cherish in the church's life, about style of ministry, and relationships that

are defined by the way we have been the church in the past. I understand all that quite well.

But – and this is an important *but* – what I don't understand is an unwillingness on the part of individuals who claim to love the church and the Lord of the church to make a commitment to work together – people and pastor – for the good of the church. Whenever we refuse

to make such an effort within the community of faith, we do damage to the witness and mission of Christ's church. I am not saying that we will always agree on everything, but, rather, that we ought to make an effort, for the sake of Christ's kingdom, to be a community of faithful disciples in spite of our areas of disagreement. Even the disciples did not always agree, but perhaps with one notable exception, they were committed to the ministry to which Christ called them.

As you anticipate the arrival of your new pastor, I hope that you will be committed to the ministry of Christ and that your attitude and perspective will be similar to what the apostle Paul counseled the people in Philippi, *Only live your life in a manner worthy of the gospel of Christ...standing firm in one spirit, striving side by side with one mind for the faith of the gospel*. (Philippians 1:27) Working together with singleness of purpose for the sake of the gospel and the church, you will achieve great things together in the name of Christ.

EXTRA, EXTRA - READ ALL ABOUT IT

Each month during 2005, *EXTRA* envelopes were placed in the packet you received in the mail. These envelopes gave you the opportunity to make contributions above and beyond the 2005 Budget to the Building Fund, Missions Designated Fund, and Endowment Fund.

Your contributions of \$3,950 in the Building Fund Envelopes were used to directly reduce the loan principal. Overall, our outstanding bank loan was reduced by \$22,586.10 last year, from \$182,278.59 to \$159,692.49.

Mission Designated Fund envelopes contained \$7,474, which was used for various mission projects selected by the Missions Committee. These projects included Habitat for Humanity, Greater Berks Food Bank, Iglesia National Metodista Church, Red Bird Mission, Opportunity House, Thomas Sligh Charity, Central Park UMC, Berks Women in Crisis and mission trip materials and books.

On some Sundays, *EXTRA* envelopes were placed in your bulletin. You responded to the Special Sunday envelopes as follows:

Worship Leader Minute for April

How do you define worship? If you're like most people in this country, you define worship by what you experienced as a child and the traditions you follow. Very few people can define worship in its biblical context. What does GOD say worship is? Our reference for God's definition of worship is the Bible, so we need to start by looking there if we want to see what God wants in worship.

It is very clear that God commands us to worship Him. Psalm 29:2 says Ascribe to the Lord the glory due his name; worship the Lord...,Psalm 96:9 says Worship the Lord in the splendor of holiness..., and Matthew 4:10 says, You shall worship the Lord your God and him only shall you serve. God created us to worship him, all the time, in everything we do, and with all our heart, mind and soul.

Worship is to honor God and it is directed towards God. It is not meant for us. When we begin to believe that worship is for us, we have forgotten the purpose of worship. Worship honors God, is directed towards God, and involves the worshiper. There are several verses that help to make this case:

- 2 Chronicles 20:18 ...all Judah and the inhabitants of Jerusalem fell down before the Lord, worshiping the Lord.
- Nehemiah 8:6, And they bowed their heads and worshiped the Lord with their faces to the ground.
- Psalm 95:6, Oh come, let us worship and bow down.

Worship

- Matthew 28:9, And they came up and took hold of his (Jesus) feet and worshiped him
- Romans 12:1 ...present your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and acceptable to God, which is your spiritual worship.

Each scriptural reference honors God, is directed toward God, and involves the worshiper. There is no doubt that God intends for us to praise God, show respect for God, and demonstrate our devotion to God. God made us for worship! Over the next several months, we will explore the meaning of worship in its biblical context. I hope that you enjoy this exploration with me. Until next month...think about your definition of worship? Is it in line with God's?

Two LP Members Make Mission Trips

The trip to Ethiopia was a time of
learning for our team of 19 — eight doctors, four nurses, two pharmacists, one
pharmacy student, three logistics persons, and one pastor. We gathered at
Dulles Airport in Washington DC,
boarded an Ethiopian Airway flight, and
arrived 15 1/2 hours later at Bole Airport
in Addis Ababa.

Customs clearance provided us with opportunities to practice two of the five qualifications for a team member — flexibility and sense of humor. We had more chances to practice these during our two-week stay and also the other three qualifications (flexibility, flexibility, and flexibility.) We were allowed a few hours to go to the Hotel Bihon in Addis Ababa to wash and rest. In the morning we went back to the airport where "negations" went on until 7 pm with the final release of our medical supplies.

After traveling five to six hours into the

night, we arrived safely at our hotel and were blessed with a few hours rest. The Lord is good and you at home were praying. Thank you very much!

In Awassa, our ultimate destination, there are few autos; most people walk day and night. The local taxi is a two person, horse-drawn cart. We saw herds of goats, and heavily loaded flatbed carts drawn by small donkeys. At the hotel we were entertained by large black and white monkeys, brown monkeys, and wonderful birds of all sizes and colors.

This area has very little grass or water; the result is dust. The smallest movement caused clouds of dust!

The "Health Clinic of Awassa" is an established full-time clinic where people come for medical treatment at the cost of five Birr (75 cents) per visit (a high price for many of these people!)

The medical help offered there includes general medical, family planning, some emergency care, labor/delivery, a pharmacy, and psychiatry. Our team offered extra help in these areas, plus dentistry, a portable ultrasound, additional medicines, and spiritual guidance. We gave free care and medicine to the people but had to pay the government for each patient we treated or saw. On our final day, the minister of health demanded we leave

all unused medicine behind.

Many people were treated daily and most were grateful. The desperate needs of the hundreds waiting in line frequently caused them to stampede, causing injuries and eventually the closing of the clinic.

Our team began and ended the day with prayer and thanksgiving to the Lord for His mercies and for you our prayer partners at home. Every day more and more people came to the spiritual tent. They were prayed with and given the Lord's message of hope and salvation. Many accepted Him into their hearts; some returned the next day to help others accept His promises. Members of the local Methodist Church came to help interpret. What a blessing to see those crowds grow. There is assurance that there will be follow-up for the new Christians.

By the end of our service at the clinic, some of the local clinic staff and hotel staff told us that their own hearts had been changed as they observed the team serving and praying, but expecting nothing in return. That was a precious reassurance of His presence in the time spent there.

About 2,500 to 3,000 patients were treated. Most of us felt it had been a successful adventure for the Lord.

Our fun times included walks about Awassa as a group and a sunset boat ride on Lake Awassa (eight miles long, three miles wide, and 30 feet deep). A sturdy

Ethiopia: Some Background

Ethiopia — officially the Federal Democratic Republic of Ethiopia — is located in northeast Africa, bordered by Eritrea, Djibouti, Somalia, Kenya, and Sudan. It has a transitional government, a population of 55,980,000, and covers an area two times the size of Texas. It's capital, Addis Ababa, is the largest city with several million people.

The population is mainly rural and about half are Muslim; a third belong to the Ethiopian Orthodox Church.

About 90% of the people are poor farmers. Much of the area we drove through and worked in was mostly high desert, of barely sustainable farms with cattle and minimal water.

Many of the people look more Egyptian than Negroid; their language is Semitic — the spoken word sounds Arabic. Their main exports are grains, vegetable oil and wonderful coffee. There is one good north/south highway, but no port for shipping.

In all of Africa there is a workforce of over 200,000,000 and an almost inexhaustible source of raw materials. However, they lack the basics of clean water, simple disease protection, education for all, and a non-corrupt government!

young man (who brought two containers for keeping us afloat!) did the rowing. It was peaceful and beautiful.

Some of us visited the Coptic Christian Church, shopping along the way; some went to an internet café; others sat in the hotel courtyard reading.

Our morning and evening meals were taken at the hotel. The food was good though selections didn't change much day to day. At lunch we gathered in the dental clinic (away from the crowds) for peanut butter and jelly, cookies, soda, or bottled water.

The faces, young and old, were beautiful: some fresh, others crafted from years of living. They were wrapped securely against the weather. (85-90 degrees daytime, 60-70 at night.)

Why do I feel the Lord encouraged my going to Ethiopia? What did I learn?

The trip was difficult for me. I have not experienced the active presence of Satan and his influence for a long time. I reminded myself to go to the Bible to find answers, reassurance of God's presence, and encouragement. When I did search, there were answers everywhere. He had known what we would face, what we would need. The Bible is filled with these assurances, reminders, promises: Psalms, Proverbs, 1 Timothy, 1 and 1 Corinthians, Matthew...

I thank the Lord for loving even me and challenging me to grow in His Word and His Service to others

When our Northeastern Mission Group met on February 20, we were surprised by the presence of the Superintendent, the Rev. Christopher Kurien, who prayed with us before our departure, and by reporters from Channel 69 who had come to interview us.

Our destination was Ocean Springs, Mississippi, where painting a house damaged by Hurricane Katrina would be our project. Our home base was on the grounds of St Paul UM Church (17 acres): 20 white and green tents, reminding us of the TV show *MASH*.

The brick rancher we painted had taken five feet of water in the storm and the old walls were ripped out. It had been cleaned and walls replaced and was ready for our painting. We worked for seven days on the project. We were told that over 300 houses had been similarly cleaned and sanitized by Christians organized for relief efforts as of last fall.

One terrible sight was a dilapidated grade school in St Martin. Winds and a strong water surge had done incredible damage. Demolition crews took the school down while we were there, and I hope the school will be rebuilt later.


