and trust in God.


what it is to have plenty...my God will satisfy every need of yours according to his riches in glory in Christ Jesus. Philippians 4:4-6, 12,19)

Those who chanced bidding on her authentic, formal Moroccan banquet dinner for six, in 2003, can tell you it was fabulous, indeed. This elaborate feast was prepared and served by Sandi in her Wyomissing town home.

In 2004, the bids went up, and the auctioned dinner was a traditional family dinner for six as served in Ponte Vedra. in the Galician region of Spain. And for 2005, the winning bidders were treated to a "So, you MUST come beachfront buffet dinner for eight "in" the two-island nation of Trinidad and Tobago.

Authentic background music and several souvenirs accompanied each of these

ethnic dining events. The formal party invitations announce the time, date, location and even the parking specifics. (Did you know that local tribal chieftains forbid camel parking on Reading Boulevard?)

The bids for these auctioned culinary events are shared equally by the couples or individuals who want a truly great evening out. A designated group representative does the bidding. On the night of the auction, winners receive an envelope with the ground rules, and, prior to the bidding, a colorful description of the culinary and cultural event is read aloud.

"In addition to helping the church," explains Sandi, "my main goal is to interest Americans in geography, diverse cultures, and new dining experiences, foreign or domestic. I base this specialized cooking on my travels, many foreign friends, interest in world cultures, and my life living abroad.

My mother was a great cook, and I at-

tended culinary classes when I lived in Germany. My sister is a professional chef, so culinary interests pervade the family blood lines."

Lincoln Park Church is not the only lucky recipient of these donated fund-raising dinners: Sandi donated the

formal Moroccan banquet dinner for six to the auction at the Reading Country Club to raise money for the Exeter Township Capital Library Campaign and it brought in \$487.

So, you MUST come to the auction prepared for mouth-watering serious bidding. All the money goes to the church — and perhaps Lincoln Park's winning bid can beat the \$487 in Exeter Township.

And some smart folks will be enjoying a really memorable evening — just ask those who know!

The Joy of Obedient Worship

ree us for joyful obedience. You may recognize that phrase as part of the congregational prayer that we pray just before we celebrate communion. That prayer describes why you and I exist: joyful obedience. You and I exist to worship. The more we realize that, the more we approach the experience of pure joy.

Tithing and giving has less to do with money than with freedom. Tithing is not about percentages. Tithing and giving are about being part of what is holy, eternal, and the truly "good life."

I could never go back to where I was before I began tithing and retain the joy I have found in obedience and giving. I like being free. I give to be free. I give to stay free. Through tithing, I receive more than I give—the joy of obedient worship in giving. [Scott Robertson, Lubbock, Texas]

The Security Myth

Helen Keller said, Security is mostly a superstition. It does not exist in nature. Nor do the children of men as a whole experience it. Avoiding danger is no safer in the long run than outright exposure. Life is either a daring adventure or nothing. [John C. Maxwell, The Confidence That Convinces, Audio Tape]

Many people who withhold their whole-

hearted support from God's work are victims of that "superstition of security" to which Helen Keller referred. They somehow failed to learn that no amount of money makes us totally secure from the painful experiences that life flings against our windshields without the slightest warning.

What happens when we try to create our own security blankets by avoiding the risk of being generous? Our selfishness costs more than money. It robs us of a spiritual relationship with God.

Self-giving does not bring us total security. Nothing does that. Being alive puts us at risk in a thousand ways. But generously giving our money to God's purposes gives us a sense of meaning and purpose as we work with other people in God's great causes. That is a far greater reward than anything we can obtain by striving for the myth of security.

Holding onto the Best

Some 200 years ago, the French educator Alexis de Tocquesville came to America to study our newly independent republic. In "Democracy in America," he pointed to elements of colonial life that still describe Americans today: I have seen the freest and best educated of men in circumstances the happiest to be found in the world. Yet it seemed to me that a

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

cloud habitually hung on their brow and they seemed serious and almost sad in their pleasures. They never stop thinking of the good things they have not got. They clutch everything and hold nothing fast.

We have grown more knowledgeable and secure over the last 200 years, but . . . The forces that hammer at us have turned us into a nation of seekers. Part of our search has been prompted by a sense that much of our lives is empty, confusing, monotonous, unrewarding. We search for meaning and inspiration, for a workable formula that can lead us to a joyful, contented, satisfying existence. [Give to Live, Douglas M. Lawson]

The answer is so obvious that we can fail to see it. Real meaning in life does not come from getting things but from giving something.

In the early days of Christian persecution, the fish symbol was used by believers as a secret sign. One person would draw an arc in the sand. The other would complete the sign to show his shared faith in Christ. The initial letters of the Greek phrase "Jesus Christ, Son of God, Savior" form the Greek word ICHTHUS, which means "fish."

Worship Leader Minute for October

As I reflect on the meaning of worship today, I'm reminded of an old "Dharma and Greg" episode I recently saw on re-run. Dharma becomes totally enthralled with football, specifically the 49'ers. She eats, breathes, loves, talks, walks, and lives football. She worships football. It consumes her life. Steve Young guest stars as himself and tries to deter Dharma at Greg's request, but gives in to Dharma's enthusiasm for football. Dharma has

at Greg's request, but gives in to Dharma's enthusiasm for football. Dharma has placed football in the number one spot in her life. That is worship. Her time, money, thoughts, and energy are focused on football. That defines worship. While "Dharma and Greg" is fiction, doesn't it represent the truth about all of us? We choose what to set our heart and mind on.

The Praise Team has recently begun a video series on Worship by Louie Giglio. Its focus is on defining worship and making us better worshipers. Giglio claims we say one thing with our mouths and do another thing with our lives. We all say we worship God. We all say God is the center of our lives, but when we look at the "bread crumbs" of our lives, we often see a different picture. Giglio says if we really want to know what we worship, we need to look honestly at our lives. We need to ask:

- ♦ Where do I spend my money?
- ♦ Where do I spend my time?
- ♦ What do I think about most of the time?

If God doesn't pop up somewhere in the top two answers to each question, maybe you need to look at what you are really worshiping. Are you worshiping your money? A person in your life? A particular toy? A car? A team? A sport? Music? A job?

Do you spend your time thinking about getting that next promotion or do you spend your time thinking about doing the very best job you can to bring glory to God? Do you worry that you're going to fall behind the Joneses or do you look for the Smiths that need a hand up? Do you spend money on that next generation I Pod or do you look at the needs around you and base your spending decisions on that? Do you get so caught up in the process of worship that you forget the purpose of worship? Are you so busy running kids from one thing to another that you don't take the time to look for God in what you are doing? Look closely at the "bread crumbs" of your life and they will tell you what you are worshiping. If God only comes into your life on a semi-daily whim, or on a Sunday morning, or Christmas Eve, or Easter, or on rainy days, then I


