



From the Pastor's Desk

From Pastor Jerry McGrath

his month we enter the season of Advent, celebrating the "coming" of Jesus Christ, both in remembrance of his coming over 2000 years ago as an infant and his return in glory. It is a very busy time of the year for most of us. It is also a time of intense and mixed emotions. So let me share some words adopted from those of Henri Nouwen, one of the best known spiritual writers of our time, found in a book of meditations entitled. The Lord is Near.

Joy and sadness are as close to each other as the splendid colored leaves of fall are to the somberness of barren trees. When you touch the hand of a returning friend or relative, you already know that he or she will have to of Christmas leave you again. When you are moved by the quiet vastness of a sun-colored ocean, you miss the one who cannot see it with you. Joy and sadness are born at the same time, both arising from such deep places in your heart that you can't find words to capture your complex feelings.

But this intimate experience in which every bit of life is touched by a bit of death can point us beyond the limits of our existence. It can do so by making us look forward in expectation to the day when our hearts will be filled with per-

fect joy, a joy that no one shall take away from us. The prophet Isaiah (35:10) proclaimed to a longing people in exile 600 years before Jesus was born:

The ransomed of the Lord shall return, and come to Zion with singing; everlasting joy shall be upon their heads; they shall obtain joy and gladness, and sor-

row and sighing shall flee away.

Isn't this what Christmas is really about? Christ came to save us from pain and suffering and provide for us everlasting life. Christians celebrate the human birth of the infant Jesus knowing full well that he grew to be a man, gave himself up to death and was raised from the dead to new life for our sake. The mystery of death and life is part of the celebration that proclaims the victory of life

over death. We have not been promised a life free from sorrow, but one in which joy will have the last word.

May you experience, once again, the true meaning of Christmas, joy's victory over sorrow and despair through the One who was born to us in a manger.

Katrina Relief Grand Totals

All fundraising totals for the Katrina Relief efforts are in! Leaders are pleased to report that \$4854.74 was raised for hurricane relief in the New Orleans area. As approved by Church Council,

this amount will be sent to St. Matthew's United Church of Christ in New Orleans. The president of St. Matthew's Church is a long time friend of Pastor Dorris, from church camp and youth ministry events in Texas.

Their recent newsletter reports that this church has hosted a total of 27 Recovery Teams and expects another seven by the end of '06. These teams have been mostly gutting houses but expect to move into rebuilding soon. Teams have come from Washington state, Michigan, New York, North Carolina, PA, Missouri, Colorado, Wisconsin, and Ohio to address the needs of families impacted by Katrina.

Monies from LP's youth will help purchase supplies for rebuilding projects and the many ongoing needs, which we cannot fathom, still existing a year after Katrina. Youth and leaders express thanks to all who supported them in this outreach ministry!

STEWARDSHIP NUGGETS 7 by Herb Miller: Enjoying What Belongs to God

"On a recent mission trip to India, I learned about a fascinating practice of the Evangelical Church of India.

When the church baptizes a new believer, this new member is given a coconut palm tree. The new believer takes it home and plants it, and within four years, this tree starts to bear fruit.

When the coconut palm is young, it will bear about \$50 worth of coconuts a year, and when it matures, it will provide about \$100 of annual income. In India, \$100 of yearly income is a significant amount of money, even for the middle class.

The church gives new believers coconut palms for two reasons. First, almost everyone in India is needy, and the income helps to provide for their needs. Second, the coconut palms teach a lesson about Christian stewardship. The church tells each new believer that it expects them to give 10 %, a tithe, of whatever income they get out of that coconut palm tree.

The 'coconut tree plan' is a wonderful idea and a great expression of the deeper meaning of Christian stewardship. The income the family gets from the tree comes free, entirely as a gift... Also, the tithe, the 10 %, is money they get free. The family is able to enjoy the fruits of a gift given freely to them and also to have the joy of freely giving something away themselves.

Moreover, these new Christians play a crucial role as stewards in all of this. They have a choice. If they wish, they can take the tree home, throw it in a corner, and let it die, never growing any coconuts. But they also can choose to plant their tree in a good spot, take care of it, and harvest the coconuts. Everything depends on their decision making. No one forces them to tithe . . . they . . . are free to choose to give or not.

The idea that human possessions are really gifts comes from the Bible. The biblical understanding of wealth and possessions is that everything comes from God and everything belongs to God... as Psalm 24 put it clearly, *The earth is the LORD's and all that is in it, the world, and those who live in it.* Everything and everybody belongs to God. *If I were hungry*, God says to the people, *I would not tell you, for the world and all that is in it is mine* (PS. 50:12)

Usually when we think of stewardship (of giving to charitable causes, if you want), we define it as our giving to God or to the church something that belongs to us. But in the Bible, stewardship is just the reverse— our freely using, enjoying, and giving what already belongs to God." [Speaking of Stewardship, William G. Carter]

The Church Library has some new titles you'll want to add to your Christmas reading list for the whole family. There are also some books that will get the New Year off to a good start. Our library has something for almost everyone. For children and the family, there is:

- Christmas in the Manger, by Nola Buck, a board book for little hands about the birth of Jesus.
- An Angel Came to Nazareth, by Anthony
 Knott. As the first Christmas draws near, four
 travelers make their way
 from Nazareth to Bethlehem. An angel asks four
 animals to choose which traveler they
 will carry. Through simple rhymes and
 lavish illustrations, this book conveys
 the very special spirit of the season.
- Christmas After All, by Kathryn Lasky, a book in the *Dear America Series*, is written as a diary. It takes place in 1932; Minnie Swift knows this will be an odd Christmas. Instead of sugar plums and presents under the tree, everything is diminishing--their money, the light of day, and even the hours that Papa works. But Minnie knows that somehow, someway, there will be Christmas.
- When Christmas Comes Again, by Beth Seidel Levine, is another book in the *Dear America Series* set in

- 1917. Written as a dairy, this book tells the story of a young girl joining the Signal Corps of the US Army in World War I
- Chicken Soup for the Soul Christmas Treasury for Kids, by Jack Canfield, provides a story a day from December 1 - Christmas, giving families 25 gifts of inspiration and Christmas spirit to share.
 - Diamonds in the Dust, by Joni Eareckson Tada, is a devotional guide with a story for each day of the year.
 - Daily Word, by Colleen Zuck, another devotional guidea word for each day, a prayer for each need.
- On the Wings of Angels, compiled by Gail Harvey, celebrates the wonder of God's marvelous messengers.
- The Red Tent, by Anita Diamant, a fictional book based on Dinah, the daughter of Jacob, sister of his dozen sons in the book of Genesis. Told in Dinah's voice, this novel reveals the traditions and turmoil of ancient womanhood.

Please come to the Church Library and check out these books. Each book will add to your Christmas spirit and will carry you through the long winter. Merry Christmas and happy reading in the New Year!!!
