Soup Kitchen Volunteers Are Active at LP

For many years, Lincoln Park Church has supported both the Soup Kitchen and Food Pantry at Central Park UMC

Two teams of workers each go once a month to serve at the Soup Kitchen. They would welcome your help, if only on a substitute basis.

There is a food box in our kitchen for your food donations 365 days a year. Just a can of veggies or a box of pasta will help. You may donate some used baggies for people to carry things from the food pantry, but please don't bring bags without a food donation too!

A team of retired ladies gathers together several times a year to make soup or a casserole for the Soup Kitchen. We each donate ingredients for the meal we prepare. We gather at 10 am on a desig-

Pastor's

Message

o you want to go back to Egypt? In this Exodus passage the Jews had just left their homes in Egypt, a place of oppression, slavery, and torture, for the *Promised Land*; a place that was foreign to them with some discomfort, and yet they desired to go back to Egypt. The *Promised*

Land, Israel, was a better place for the Jews to live, yet because they were not familiar with it they yearned to go back to the horrid conditions in Egypt. Why do we have a fear of the unknown? What is it about our uneasiness towards

change that would have us choose familiarity, even though it is not beneficial, over new beginnings? In many ways our stories are similar to the Jews. We cling to the things in our lives that we are used to, that appear safe, despite them being destructive.

We begin a new year, a time that has us sometimes wishing for the wonderful experiences from last year and yet looking forward with some timidness to new beginnings. We are torn. We want to grow, but when we encounter new adventures that seem difficult there is a tendency to want to retreat to what is familiar. Can

we go back to Egypt? Can we go back home to the place or places in our lives that are familiar to us?

I remember that when I was much younger, when I faced horrible situations, particularly rough times at school, I would run home and hide in my bed-

room. When I grew older and moved away, my father always said I could come home. When I did return home for the first time for a visit, it was just that, a visit. My bedroom and my home were not the same anymore. I realized through time we can always visit home, but never truly "come

home." We cannot go back to Egypt, we can only visit. However, one thing is certain; we can always go back to God, for God is where our true "home" is.

2006 has come and gone. We can always cherish in our hearts the memories, but we cannot go back and stay. With God leading us, 2007 is a new year with incredible possibilities that await us. If we build our lives on God with our past year's experiences, this new year promises to be wonderfully lifechanging. May God bless us this new year.



2007 BUDGET HIGHLIGHTS





The Church Council has adopted a budget of \$374,930 for the year 2007. Because of the \$30,000 increase in pledged giving during the Commitment Campaign, spending increases were possible for programs, maintenance and repair of our facilities, staff salaries, and mission giving.

Some of the highlights of the budget are:

- A balanced budget (\$374,930) with no money used from savings
- Income from the Autumn Auction and Flea Market will be capped at \$2,500 and \$4,000 respectively, with any extra amount raised to be used for committee recommended projects or missions
- Increases for the UM Youth Fellowship (66%) and Junior Youth programs (43%)
- Increases for Intergenerational events (81%) and Summer Educational Ministry (25%)
- Increases for Connectional Ministries (13%), World Service Fund (24%), and General Church Fund (21%)
- Increase for the Reading-Berks Conference of Churches (\$500)
- All staff received a raise in salary (3.5%)
- Increases for maintenance and repair of the church, education building and parsonage (14%)
- Money for lawn care and snow removal (\$4,000)
- Money for the long term repair fund (\$2,500)

Thanks to all who felt God's blessings and made these increases possible. The goal of Christian stewardship is the faithful management of all that God gives so that God can use our gifts to transform us spiritually and to extend Christ's transforming love to others
