What is Lectio Divina?

At the 8:00 Traditional Service, Pastor Jerry has been introducing this time-honored method of prayer. Lectio Divina is a way of listening to the texts of scripture as if we were in conversation with Christ and He was suggesting the topics of conversation. This type of prayer could be considered "Centering Prayer." Centering prayer is not a technique, relaxation exercise, or charismatic gift, but rather an exercise of faith, hope, and love. It is at the same time a relationship with God and a discipline to foster that relationship. This has been summarized by Gregory the Great (6th Century) as resting in God. This was the classical meaning of contemplative prayer for the first sixteen centuries.

'Woe is me! I am ruined! For I am a man of unclean lips, and I live among a people of unclean lips, and my eyes have seen the King, the Lord Almighty.' Then one of the seraphs flew to me with a live coal in his hand, which he had taken with tongs from the altar. With it he touched my mouth and said, 'See, this has touched your lips, your guilt is taken away and your sin atoned for.' Isaiah 6:5-7

o this is Lent. Isn't this the most boring, dull season in the Christian year? Let us just slide by this time and get ready for the joy and happiness of Easter. What is the

big deal about Lent? People really don't pay attention to it too much anymore.

Lent is the most penitent time in the Christian year, but I don't like being penitent. Please don't make me be penitent. Wait a minute...what is penitent? Penitent means

to repent, to be sorry for having done wrong and the willingness to atone, to make right. We can't experience the full meaning and joy of Easter until we journey through Lent understanding the implications of what Christ has done for us.

Lent is an excellent time for us to journey deeper in our spiritual walk with Christ. During this time we reflect on our human condition, broken people living broken lives. We are reminded of our mortality and our dependence on God to

save us. As we reveal who we are with all our spiritual warts and scars, we are also fortunate to experience who God is and what God does through Jesus Christ: loves, accepts, reconciles, and sacrifices.

We are somewhat like Isaiah, *Woe is me*. We are unclean. God is perfectly clean. We are not worthy, but as we travel through Lent we also realize that God slowly draws us closer to Him, calling us worthy through Jesus Christ.

- → Adults study the Lectionary Cycle C readings in the Church Library under the tutelage of Norm & Nancy Dettra.

- → All children gather first for theme and musical introductions in the Choir Room and then move to graded options in Rooms 101, 102, & 104
- → Youth Class meets weekly in Room 103
- → Adult Bible Class meets in the Church Library with **Earl Hope** to continue their indepth look at biblical characters, their history and message for us today.

Children's Activities Involve Learning and Service

Children's activities at both Church School hours center on the same theme, using differing curriculum approaches from Group Publishing to keep the attention of kids who love staying for both hours. During March sessions, children will journey through the Gospel of Luke (portions of Chapters 6, 9, 15) and John 13:1-17 to explore Jesus' teaching about good fruit, present the Old Testament connection, learn about God's loving and forgiving ways, and challenge them also to be servants as Jesus was.

They can tell you about their recent efforts at servanthood...though they may not use those exact words. All classes learned about **Betty Frederickson's** Medical Missions trip to Northern India. They made bookmarks for her to share with children she meets, to let them know that they too are God's children. They also made Valentines for Veterans in local veterans hospitals and stood with soup pots for SOUPER BOWL SUNDAY.

Worship Leader Minute for March

I learned a new word this week. *Shachah* (pronounced "shaw-khaw") is the original Hebrew word we now know as *worship*. According to John Randall Dennis, author of *Living Worship*, this word is used in the Old Testament over 170 times! Authors of the Old Testament used it over and over to encourage each other and to describe their experiences. It means "to prostrate


in honor to God - to bow down, fall down flat, to do reverence, to stoop, to worship" - to shachah.

The most interesting part of the word and its use in the Bible is that to which *shachah* should and should not be offered. *Shachah* is so special, so meaningful that it is reserved for God only. It is not offered to anything or anyone else EVER! So the real question is, do we *shachah* God only, or are there other things or people that we give our *shachah* to on a daily basis?

I was having a conversation with my oldest son, Jonathan, last night at dinner in which he was sharing with me the different wrestling stars he liked or disliked and why. He went through a quite extensive list of names, telling me why he once liked the wrestler and why he now does or doesn't. His reasoning was very sound, and I was very proud of him for his criteria for not looking up to one or another ("I don't like him anymore because I found out he does drugs" "He is really mean to people in real life." etc.) and his criteria for looking up to others ("He is a good guy in real life." "He helps other people in real life."). What occurred to me as we were talking is Jonathan is looking to these "stars" to demonstrate what Jonathan sees as worthy in his life. He is looking to the wrestlers to demonstrate the characteristics that Jonathan sees as worthy to be upheld.

Jonathan doesn't want to worship the wrestlers; he wants a role model to follow. Isn't that what so many people are looking for? They are looking for people that *shachah* the one true thing – God! The way we live our life is *shachah*! The way we treat others, the way we use our money, the way we speak to strangers, the way we express our likes and dislikes, the way we spend our time is all worship. If God is at the center of all that we do and we are conscious of what we worship, then we make good role models, not only for our children but for those who are young in their faith. What do you *shachah*? Are you a role model that encourages others in their worship?

Annual Conference Superintendent Appointed

A Philadelphia native, Dr. George earned a BA degree from Gwynedd Mercy College and a Master of Divinity degree from Philadelphia Theological Seminary. Further studies include a second Masters of Divinity from Drew University School of Theology, and a Doctorate of Ministry in Marriage and Family Enrichment from Eastern Baptist (now Palmer) Theological Seminary. After more training at the University of Pennsylvania's Division of Psychiatry, he became a Licensed Marriage

and Family Therapist with the Penn Council for Relations

Dr. George was the first associate pastor at Camphor Memorial United Methodist Church. For the last 12 years, he has been the pastor of Grace United Methodist Church in Philadelphia.

Dr. George's hope for his ministry in the Central District "is to be a pastor to pastors and to enable them to lead people to win souls for Christ, to lead congregations in spiritual development, and to bring understanding, respect, and love for all cultures—for we are all one in Christ"

Will You Try These Five Fingers of Prayer?

1. Your thumb is nearest to you. So begin by praying for those closest to you. They are easiest to remember. To pray for our loved ones is as

our loved ones is, as C.S. Lewis once said, a "sweet duty."

- 2. The next finger is the pointing finger. Pray for those who teach, instruct, and heal. This includes teachers, doctors, and ministers. They need support and wisdom in pointing others in the right direction. Keep them in your prayers.
- 3. The next finger is the tallest finger. It reminds us of our leaders. Pray for the President, leaders in business and industry, and administrators. These people shape our nation and guide public opinion. They need God's guidance.

4. The fourth finger is our ring finger. Surprising to many is the fact that

this is our weakest finger; as any piano teacher will testify. It should remind us to pray for those who are weak, in trouble, or in pain. They need your prayers day and night. You cannot pray too much for them.

5. And lastly comes our little finger — the smallest finger of all. Which is where we should place ourselves in relation to God and others. As the Bible says, "The least shall be the greatest among you." Your pinkie should remind you to pray for yourself.

By the time you have prayed for the other four groups, your own needs will be put into proper perspective, and you will be able to pray for yourself more effectively.



I advise depressed people to pray this simple prayer: "The joy of the Lord is my strength." (Nehemiah 8:10) Pray it slowly. Experience the prayer. Let the prayer become a part of you — morning, noon and night. When a mood of depression comes upon you, pray it all the more.
