Mission Trip to India

Each mission trip is an experience unlike any other. This trip was to a land and culture 7000 miles from here, to India, a country about 1/3 the size of the US. Our mission outreach was in the Ganges Plain, India's most densely populated, fertile agricultural area.

On our trip, two groups — The Dalit Freedom Network and Global Health Outreach — partnered to serve the spiritual and medical needs of the Dalit people, known as the "untouchables."

Five clinics were held during our stay; about 3,500 patients were treated for respiratory needs, colds and asthma, skin conditions, deformities, parasites, malnutrition, tuberculosis, arthritis, depression,

HIV/AIDS, and seizures. I received about \$1,000 in donations for medicine and supplies. A remaining amount will help buy sewing machines, as many young adults are taught a trade such as sewing. The goal is to encourage them to become independent from government and caste oppression.

Steeple Bells To Ring Again

The first phase of repair to the church steeple has been completed. This entailed reanchoring the steeple at its present location. Much work was involved in replacing deteriorated wood. The speakers

were removed, painted, and replaced with new supports. The bell was cleaned and polished and remains in the steeple.

The second phase will involve replacement of copper flashing and waterproofing all seams, requiring the use of a crane. This project has been on hold for a number of years, to the point that the steeple was about to severely damage the roof.

When all is completed, we may again have sweet bell music to our ears.

ecently, I took an interest in coaching sports in the Wilson School District. I felt I worked well with children and youth, and thought I would be a good moral influence in their lives. As I inquired about coaching ice hockey, swimming, track and field, and baseball, I was given a job description for each sport. It seems like every hobby, task, or job today comes with a detailed job description.

Since it is May, Keepers, Knowers, Makers
I began to think
about mothers and their job descriptions. Have you ever seen a written contract of a mother's job description?
In May of 1990, the following job description appeared in Guideposts.

- Keeper of all things: homework papers, matching mittens, Blinky the Teddy Bear, permission slips, practice schedules...all available immediately upon request.
- Knower of all things: When "I'm sick" is sick enough to call the doctor; when a difficult "no" is more important than an easy "yes;" when learning from a mistake is

more important than "fixing it;" when to be quiet instead of speaking; the importance of birthdays; the names of all your children's friends.

 Maker of all things: chocolate chip cookies; Halloween costumes; dentist appointments; Christmas spirit; peace

in the family; messy beds; brown bag lunches; children's smiles

The position gives no sick leave and no days off, demands lots of overtime and no pay!

Sound tough enough?

On some days, it seems impossible. But it is the greatest, most rewarding job in the world. It is a position that mothers would never trade for any other job in the world.

That is why we should take a moment on Mother's Day to say, "Out of a universe of possibilities, you came up with the idea of mothers. Thank you, Lord. On this Mother's Day, please grant mothers the wisdom, strength and patience to meet the challenge of the job description."

I tried the recipe with my girls, and not only did we have fun doing it together, but I think that they took more of the story with them than had we just discussed it. It is well worth making it a family tradition each year.

Thank you again and we hope to see you all next year.

These cookies are to be made the evening before Easter. Enjoy and treasure the time with your children, as they learn about the Easter story.



EASTER STORY COOKIES



1 cup whole nuts 3 egg whites 1 cup sugar tape 1 tsp. vinegar pinch salt wooden spoon Bible

IMPORTANT: Preheat oven to 300 degrees. Place walnuts in a baggie and have the child beat them with the wooden spoon to break into small pieces. Explain that after Jesus was arrested, He was beaten by the Roman soldiers.

Read John 19:1-3. Let each child smell the vinegar. Put 1 tsp into mixing bowl. Explain that when Jesus was thirsty on the cross, He was given vinegar to drink.

Read John 19:28-30. Add egg whites to vinegar. Eggs represent life. Explain that Jesus gave His life to give us life.

Read John 10:10-11. Sprinkle a little salt into each child's hand, let them taste it and brush the rest into the bowl. Explain that this represents the salty tears shed by Jesus' followers and the bitterness of our own sin.

Read Luke 23:27. So far, the ingredients are not very appetizing. Add 1 cup sugar. Explain that the sweetest part of the story is that Jesus died because He loves us. He wants us to know and belong to Him.

Read Psalms 34:8 and John 3:16. Beat with a mixer on high speed for 12-15 minutes until stiff peaks are formed. Explain that the color white represents – in God's eyes – the purity of those whose sins have been cleansed by Jesus.

Read Isaiah 1:18 and John 3:1-3. Fold in broken nuts. Drop by teaspoons onto wax paper-covered cookie sheet. Explain that each mound represents the rocky tomb where Jesus' body was laid.


Read Matthew 27:57-60. Put the cookie sheet in the oven, close the door and turn the oven OFF. Give each child a piece of tape and seal the oven door. Explain that Jesus' tomb was sealed.

Read Matthew 27:65-66. Go to bed. Explain that they may feel sad to leave the cookies in the oven overnight; Jesus' followers were in despair when the tomb was sealed.

On Easter morning: read John 16:20 and 22. Open the oven and give everyone a cookie. Notice the cracked surface and take a bite. The cookies are hollow. Explain that on the first Easter, Jesus' followers were amazed to find the tomb open and empty. Read Matthew 28:1-9.

God and serve tables. 3 Therefore, brethren, seek out from among you seven men of good reputation, full of the Holy Spirit and wisdom, whom we may appoint over this business; 4 but we will give ourselves continually to prayer and to the ministry of the word.'...7 Then the word of God spread, and the number of the disciples multiplied greatly in Jerusalem, and a great many of the priests were obedient to the faith."

Priorities! I've been thinking a lot lately about mine. As I write, I'm still absorbing the news that I'll have surgery on my neck one week from today. As many of you know, I've struggled with back problems since January, which have limited what I can do. I've had a hard time putting the brakes on myself. I've worried about all the things that are suffering because of my inability to do them. My own priorities have really become apparent to me as well as the priorities of the people around me!

My immediate worry upon hearing this news was our Chili Supper and Talent Show, but that was calmed by a conversation with **Elizabeth Stoud** and **Rebecca Chelius**. My next worry was my children. What did I have to do to cover all of their activities? Thankfully, the two oldest have a church sleep-over, and the youngest will be with Daddy. When I called my boss, I was worried about the time that I was going to be out of work again. Another three weeks of work gone, and no one to pick up my slack! My boss was wonderful; she simply said, *What do we have to do for you so you are taken care of*? I called **Pastor Jerry** about the surgery, and his response was exactly the same, with the added benefit of a prayer! Every worry was taken care of.

So what does this have to do with the Acts scripture? The Disciples knew that everyone could not take care of everything. They understood that people have different gifts that allow them to take care of different things. People are assigned to jobs that meet their gifts and meet the needs of people around them. All the while

Calling "Time Out"

The gift of the Sabbath has been given to us by God to free us from slavery to time which drains our strength (see Ex. 16:22-30)

"To observe the Sabbath means to call 'Time Out!' This day of rest is to re-create that which has been expended during the week. The Sabbath allows us to receive the strength God supplies so we can continue to produce wealth, while keeping wealth in the proper perspective." [Partners With God, Bobby L. Eklund and Terry Austin]

The tithe—giving 10 % of our income to God's work—gives us the same opportunity. It helps us to take a "time out" from serving the god of money so that it cannot become a compulsive destroyer of our lives.

Is God in First Place?

"Why should I tithe? It demonstrates that God is in first place in my life. Deuteronomy 14:23, *The Living Bible*: 'The purpose of tithing is to teach you to always put God in first place in your life.'

"I can say God is in first place in my life, but there are two things you can look at that will tell what is really first place. If you look at my schedule and if you look at my checkbook stubs. That tells what is first place, no matter what I say is first place. The way I use my money and the way I use my time tells what's first place in my life." [Discovering Spiritual Maturity, Rick Warren, audio tape]

That is one of the major reasons why churches take offerings in their worship services each week. In addition to helping accomplish God's goals of ministry, this action restates who ranks in first place in our life.

Why Did Jesus Talk about Money So Much?

"Jesus' insistence that money is both physical and spiritual explains why he spoke of it so frequently.

"Buttrick's classic book, *The Parables of Jesus*, lists 43 parables. Twenty-seven of these (62 %) refer to money and possessions. One out of every 10 verses in the Gospels (a total of 288 verses) deals with money. The Bible includes 500 verses on prayer, fewer than 500 verses on faith, and more than 2,000 verses on money and what it buys.

American Heritage Dictionary defines endowment as *providing* with income or a source of income.
