FISH TALES: Coming To Lincoln Park in August




The production staff of *Fish Tales* welcomes members and

From the Pastor's Desk

Do not remember the former things, or consider the things of old. I am about to do a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it? Isaiah 43:18-19

his book, Leading Change in the Congregation, Gil Rendle writes, "Two essential fears face our congregations: the fear of too much change and the fear of too little change." Lincoln Park Community United Methodist Church stands on the edge of great change. No one knows how much is needed. No one knows what is too much or what is too little.

I grew up in a church system in which power rested in the hands of the church elders, who were all males with white hair, dark suits,

white shirts, and ties. I remember when it was a big thing to have women in any sort of leadership position. Then youth were included in those leadership positions. Suddenly the quiet meetings of powerful men in the dark back rooms of churches became public discussions that included everyone. Lots of the family secrets became more public.

Yet there is still a general reluctance within churches to talk about painful, awkward subjects. We tend to hope problems will go away, get better on their

own, or disappear if we ignore them long enough. In the recovery world, people talk about the *elephant* in the living room. That refers to the addiction, or some other inappropriate behavior in the family that is never discussed. No one talks about it because it may cause hurt feelings. The problem is that when we learn to ignore the *elephant in the living*

room we also learn to ignore Let's talk about the zebra, the cow, the horse, pony, cat, and dog. Soon, we're not talking about anything but the weather outside the living room.

> Change is difficult for all of us. Human beings like things

that are settled and reliable. That makes life easier. But we live in a world of change and we are part of a church that is changing. Probably the most significant thing that needs to change in most 'pastor dependent' churches is the cloud of silence and secrecy that pervades the church. The most significant thing that needs to happen is for everyone to start talking about what they think and feel; to disagree with the leadership; to share ideas and thoughts about what is being

That is a scary proposition because it means that we have to risk being wrong, possibly hurting someone's feelings, or being responsible for some new direction the church might take. It is easier not to say anything and ignore the elephant, and all the other animals, that take up the whole living room.

The liberating thing that occurs, however, is that when we start talking about all the animals in our living room we can begin to make plans to deal with them. Suddenly, the living room becomes much bigger and we feel more confident. Suddenly there is more room for the grace of God, because there is more room for the spirit to work.



In the most recent "Religious Products News" (May 2007), I read a great article entitled, *Growth Strategies Maximizing Your Congregation Slogan or Niche*? The focus was on the difference between having a slogan and really defining the people that a congregation wants to reach. The problem with most congregations is

they have good slogans, but they don't have a defined idea about who they are trying to reach and how to reach them. The competition among mainline Protestant churches for new members is fierce! People born after 1960, in general, believe that they have the right to make decisions that will shape their future. Their parents (in general), and in many cases their grandparents, maintained institutional loyalties. Those loyalties included a specific religion, companies, political parties, department stores, and choice of spouse. With this in mind we have to shift our thinking from denominations to congregations. What does our congregation offer to people who are looking for congregations that meet their individual needs?

There are some things that we know make a difference when trying to attract new members. This list is not a check off. A congregation doesn't have to have all six points, but each of the points works together to make up a growing congregation:

- 1. PASSION: The leadership (NOT just the Pastor!) is driven by a passion for evangelism.
- 2. NEW: The congregation has been worshiping at the same address for fewer than 30 years. The focus is on creating the new, not on perpetuating the old.
- 3. Relevance: "The ministries here speak to me where I am at on my personal and/ or faith journey."
- 4. QUALITY: Quality is highly valued! This applies to "everything to preaching to parking, from equipping believers to be engaged in doing ministry to transforming inquirers into fully devoted disciples of Jesus Christ."
- 5. CHOICES: Worship offers attractive and meaningful choices. Choices in learning and meeting and making new friends are important. Doing ministry and one's own personal and spiritual growth are priorities.
- 6. NICHE: "The reason I came back a second time and I'm still here is this place is filled with people like me."

With 80% of all congregations experiencing a decline or a plateau in size, and some people wanting to blame the culture in general and younger generations in particular for the decline, we need to take a hard look at what we are doing. What is our niche? Not what we say our niche is, but what is it really? How do we respond to the needs of the people outside our church? As a congregation we need to "be sure your (our) self-described identity or role or niche or distinctive ministry is consistent with what you (we) offer." (p. 17). In corporate worship and in our own personal worship we need to add this to our list of daily topics to discuss with God. We cannot move forward without doing what God wants us to do!

Controlling Your Addiction

"A friend of mine taught me about addictions when he discovered that he was not just a compulsive eater, but a foodaholic. He had an uncontrollable addiction to food and was unable to break the addiction

"That kind of addiction is not like an addiction to heroin or alcohol, though it is equally fatal. Food is something one cannot simply say no to! Saying no to food leads to death. One can neither walk away from food entirely nor give in to the addiction and let it control one's life. The task of living is to try to find a way between the extremes. My friend tells me of a conversation he had with an alcoholic who had been successful in staying dry. The alcoholic said, 'Compared to you, I am lucky. I can put my tiger under lock and key and never let him out. You have to let your tiger out three times a day.' Every time that compulsive eater has a meal, he has to control his addiction, his tiger. No easy answers, here

"We who are haunted by an addiction to things, to wealth, to money have that tiger of addiction sitting on our laps every time we watch television. When we pay our bills. When we go to a restaurant. When we sign a mortgage. When we try to figure how much to tip a taxi driver. When we think about our retirement plan. When the church asks us for a donation. It is all around us all the time. It never goes away, and it never lets go of us. And we never seem fully to tame it.

"In our world, we must learn to live with the tiger without letting the tiger destroy us.

"Because we and our world are so obsessed with this particular addiction to money, the church must help us learn how to live with it - to work through the inherent tensions we feel about our wealth." [Financial Meltdown in the Mainline?, Loren B. Mead]

In addition to helping God accomplish numerous ministries, that is a benefit of our offerings. They help us to keep the tiger of addiction to money on a short leash.

Money Is a Measure of Devotion

'Discretionary income' is a reality for most of the population. And advertising agencies very intentionally have targeted that income; turning 'wants into needs.'

"To increase in affluence becomes significant to the degree that the Bible suggests that money has a spiritual component. For example, in Matthew 6:24 Jesus tells his followers, 'You cannot serve both God and Money.'

French philosopher Jacques Ellul points out that in this text, Jesus personifies mammon 'as a sort of god,' a force that is competing with God for our souls. Ellul suggests that Jesus' choice of words 'reveals something exceptional about money, for Jesus did not usually use deifications and personifications. What Jesus is revealing is that money is a power.'

"In Matthew 6:21 Jesus also describes another aspect of money that is an important indicator of our heart's condition: 'For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also.' Money is a measure of devotion, the way we spend it indicating something about us—sort of like a spiritual thermometer—according to Jesus. In a consumer society, such as the United States, it may be the most intentional measurement available." [Behind the Stained Glass Windows, John and Sylvia Ronsvalle]
