From the Pastor's Desk

"All the believers were together and had everything in common. Selling their possessions and goods, they gave to anyone as

he had need." Acts 2:44-45

In a materialistic society such as ours, we are tempted to put our trust in tangible things. The problem is that tangible things do not ultimately fulfill us. We are made with a "God shaped void" within us, and it is only the presence of God that can bring meaning and value to our lives

"... of all that you give me I will give you a tenth."
Genesis 28:22

One way God teaches us to trust Him is in dealing with our possessions. Throughout the Old Testament, God taught the people of Israel to give the first fruits of their crops to Him. As people who lived off the land, the Israelites struggled with this concept.

They said, "We don't want to give away the first fruits. What if we give God the first fruits and the second and third fruits are spoiled for us? Let's see how the fruits come out and then we'll give what we can later."

God was trying to teach the people of Israel to make Him #1 in their lives. Throughout the Old Testament the people

are charged to give a percentage of their crops and money to God as a faithful response to his love and blessings. God's

> representatives challenged the people to give one-tenth of all they had to God in gratitude and for his graciousness in their lives. And they were to give their tithe first as a sign that they loved God as their highest priority.

The percentage gift was not given because God owns 10% or 5% or 1% of all that we have, but it was given be-

cause God owns everything. The gift of a set percentage reminded the people in a very tangible way that God owns it all. We shouldn't ask, "How much of my money should I give to the church?" Rather, we should ask, "How should I use the money that God has entrusted to my care?" How do we respond to God's grace? A percentage gift is a discipline of obedience in response to a God who loves us. A percentage gift gets us away from deciding what we should give when we go to church. "The Tithe," the percentage gift, is a joyous discipline that truly teaches us to place our whole trust in God and not material possessions.

Our Finance Committee, after reviewing last year's stewardship program, again has selected the New Consecration Sunday Stewardship Program as a way to teach the biblical and spiritual principles of generous giving in our stewardship education emphasis this year.

Based on the biblical philosophy, the program focuses on the need of the giver to provide for his or her own spiritual development, rather than on the need of

the church to collect. Instead of treating people like members of a social club who should pay dues, we will treat people like followers of Jesus Christ who want to give as an act of discipleship. New Consecration Sunday encourages people toward proportionate and systematic giving in response to the question, "What percentage of my income is God calling me to give?"

During worship October 28, we will

ask our congregation to make their financial commitments to our church's missionary, benevolent, and educational ministries.

Every person who completes an Estimate of Giving Card does so voluntarily by attending morning worship on Consecration Sunday. This procedure is done in such a way that no one feels embarrassment if he makes the decision not to fill out a card during worship.

Again this year, we will not do home visitations. After some instruction and inspiration during worship, congregation members will make their personal commitments in a confidential way.

We again will seek participation in Consecration Sunday events through the Consecration team and church leadership. Since there will be no follow-up visits, we'll make every effort to inform, inspire, and commit everyone to attend church on October 28.

The question is not how much we give. The question is the spirit in which we give. Is the gift a grateful response to God's grace and a sign of putting our trust in God? If so, then we are learning the lessons of trust that God wants to teach us.

Are you willing to consider stepping further in your faith today? Are you willing to become a percentage giver?

Thomas G. Bandy has written a book entitled *Introducing*The Uncommon Lectionary: Opening the Bible to Seekers

and Disciples. Bandy discusses worship in a very interesting way, and I thought that it would be beneficial to share part of that discussion with you this month. We've spent the summer and now September talking about what it means to go outside the four walls of the church. Bandy does a nice job of connecting mission with worship in the following excerpt. I hope you find new insight from this reading!

"When worship becomes an act of mission, it shifts from good to great. An act of mission is an act of God. It is the eternal act of God to redeem and reconcile the world, revealed in the microcosm of experience we call worship. By our very nature, God is the giver of grace, stretching to embrace the world. Every worship service is a reenactment of that act of mission, and we are drawn into that act of mission. When worship becomes an act of mission, it ceases to be about us and becomes about God's mission. The challenge of worship is no longer to perfect it, refine it, universalize it, standardize it, and make it correct. The challenge of worship is to focus it on mission, open it to God's power, make universal God's love to include all the micro cultures in the postal code, and grow disciples who will share that grace over and over again every day of the week. That is great worship. That's the kind of worship the spiritually yearning, institutionally alienated publics seek; that's the kind of worship faithful Christians desire; and that's the worship that God expects.


"Worship as an act of mission includes two constantly reinforcing movements of the Spirit: mission and commission. Worship draws people in and sends them out. The people who are sent out, draw people in...If all you do is draw seekers into worship that transforms lives, without making them disciples, what is the value in that? If all you do is send out disciples to do good deeds without drawing them into worship, what is the value in that? Mission and commissioning go hand in hand. The one cannot survive without the other." (134-135)



Children and parents will be notified about children's performance times as this schedule evolves, based on children's readiness.



Keeping Our Priorities Straight

"Even if churches did not need money to operate, they would still need the ministry of stewardship programs to help people keep their personal priorities

straight. A United Methodist bishop once told about attending a country auction. It was a frosty December morning.

"The auction offered the usual conglomeration of belongings. There were four horses, 12 cows, and 30 sheep. Two wagon beds were piled high with tools, scrap metal, and rolled wire. Antique collectors nudged one another at the sight of a 30gallon copper kettle in which apple butter had been made the previous season. There was a brass bed adorned with a frayed canopy, and four bundles of used coat hangers. The table, piled

> high with glassware and bric-a-brac, included a two-bythree folding metal picture frame. One side was empty, and the other held a blurry tintype.

"The bishop said that the country auction points graphically to a basic truth about every one of us. One day soon, you and I will be called away.

Materialism Is Deceptive

Perhaps our currency should be printed with a label that reads: 'Warning, money may be hazardous to your spiritual health . . . 'Love of money and not money itself is the problem. Certainly wealth can be used for good purposes. When this is the case, it becomes beneficial to one's spiritual health." In Jesus' day, the Jews considered wealth a reward from God. They had great difficulty recognizing the subtle danger of materialism because they had come to identify it as a sign of God's favor. Coming out of that background, a rich young man approached Jesus with an important ques-

tion . . . 'Good teacher, what must I do to inherit eternal life?' (Luke 18:18).

"Although he asked a sincere question, when he heard the answer he was distressed. Jesus pointed out the main obstacle between him and eternal life—his money 'When he heard this, he be-

came very sad, because he was a man of great wealth' (Luke 18:23) He was deceived by believing that because he had great wealth he was blessed by God. In reality, his money separated him from God." [Partners With

At first glance, this Scripture seems to say we should give away all our money. The meaning is deeper than that. Jesus is saying that idolatry to money can disconnect us from the riches of God's Spirit.

That is one of several reasons why systematically giving money to God's causes is part of every church's teaching about personal spiritual growth. Giving money to God does not mean that God will insulate us from all of life's troubles. But not giving money to God guarantees that we are not likely to escape the small box of self-concern and connect with God's life-changing Spirit.
