Children, youth, and adults will view a short video on Africa University, sponsored by the United Methodist Church. After dinner, we're invited to special musical activities including an intergenerational, participatory experience, "Kenya Believe It's Christmas?" We'll be

led by the Percussion Ensemble of Kutztown University in the sanctuary. **Pastor Jerry** and the ensemble will lead an upbeat, closing worship, and a special offering will be taken to support the work of Africa University. Child care will be of-

FLAMES OF THE FAITHFUL is an Advent worship series based on the traditional designations for the Advent Candles:

- The Prophecy (Hope) Candle bids us to listen to God's Word and act upon it.
- The Bethlehem (Peace) Candle calls us to prepare our homes and hearts for the presence of Christ.
- The Shepherd (Love) Candle urges us to behold the salvation of God, coming to us in the person of God's Son.
- The Angel (Joy) Candle invites us to join the heavenly host in living lives of rejoicing.

Worship at 9 & 11 am:

Sunday, December 2 - FIRST SUNDAY OF ADVENT

"Flames of the Faithful: Prophecy" - Deuteronomy 18:15-18, Luke 1:5-25.

Sunday, December 9 - SECOND SUNDAY OF ADVENT

"Flames of the Faithful: Bethlehem" - Micah 5:2-5a, Luke 1:67-79.

At 11 am, the Chancel Choir and Bell Choir will present a concert with ex cerpts from Handel's *Messiah* and additional seasonal music. Guest soloists will be tenor John Perella, soprano Pat Ruch, and bass Keith Ruch.

Sunday, December 16 - THIRD SUNDAY OF ADVENT

"Flames of the Faithful: Shepherds" - Ezekiel 34:11-16, Luke 1:26-38. At 11 am, students of Debbie Pyle will offer their music during the service.

Sunday, December 23 - FOURTH SUNDAY OF ADVENT

"Flames of the Faithful: Angels" - Isaiah 6:1-8, Luke 2:8-14.

At 7 pm, the Praise Band will rejoice in the birth of the Christ Child with a contemporary Christmas music concert.

Monday, December 24 - CHRISTMAS EVE

6 pm - Children's Musical, *The Mystery of the Manger*. This 1/2 hour-long musical will delight God's children of all ages with its spirited music and Gospel readings. A candle lighting ceremony with the singing of "Silent Night" will close the service.

8 pm - Family Candlelight Service of carols and readings. Pastor Jerry will explore the meaning of the favorite symbols of Christmas: the star, the manger, the shepherd's staff, and the stable in a family-oriented homily. Musical preludes will begin at **7:45 pm.**

11 pm - Candlelight Communion - Traditional communion and Candlelight Service. Trumpets and voices will herald our Savior's birth with carols, anthems and readings. In his message, "The Christmas Scenery," Pastor Jerry will fill our senses with the imagery of Jesus' birth. - Psalm 96, Luke 2:1-20.

Sunday, December 30 - FIRST SUNDAY AFTER CHRISTMAS

One worship service at 10 am - "Agape Service," or "love feast," will be offered for all ages. Pastor Jerry will ask us to share our favorite Christmas passages from the Bible, and a hymn sing will give us the opportunity to select our favorite carols. Everyone will also enjoy cake (with or without sugar) and hot chocolate.



THE SEASON OF ADVENT

The church year begins with the Advent, which means coming. The great proclamation, The Word became flesh and made his dwelling among us, (John 1:14), assures us

that God has entered into human history through the incarnation of the Son. Advent, a season of waiting, is designed to cultivate our awareness - past, present, and future. In Advent we hear the prophecies of the Messiah's coming as addressed to us people who wait for the second coming. In Advent we heighten our anticipation for the ultimate fulfillment of all Old Testament promises, when the wolf will lie down with the lamb, death will be swallowed up, and every tear will be wiped away.

The Advent season includes the four Sundays preceding Christmas. Traditionally, purple, and more recently blue, are the colors for Advent. These colors symbolize our need for the searching of our hearts and changing of our lives as we consider the need which brought Jesus to dwell among people. Purple/blue are also the colors of royalty, suggesting the second aspect of Advent, that is, the righteous rule of Christ as King of kings and Lord of lords.

Unique Opportunity for Endowment Fund Gift

Until December 31, 2007, donors who are age 70½ have a unique opportunity to make gifts from a traditional IRA or Roth IRA.

IRA donors may give all or portions of their mandatory IRA withdrawals (up to \$100,000 in 2007) directly to charity. While there is no income tax deduction, donors who make gifts directly from their IRA will not increase their adjusted gross income, and can avoid the higher level of taxation.

If you must make mandatory withdrawals from these types of plans and have accumulated more than you need in retirement, this gift option in favor of Lincoln Park United Methodist Church Endowment Fund could be the one for you.

We recommend that you consult your financial advisor before making any significant charitable gift decision.



Lincoln Park Youth "Shine" on Youth Sunday, November 11

If you worshipped at Lincoln Park this November Sunday, you probably went

home—like I did—feeling uplifted and invigorated. Both services were produced and presented by our youth, and they did an amazing job.

Under the direction of two Cori(y)s, **Cori Rigato**, our Youth Leader, and **Cory Laity**, Praise Band Leader, the enthusiastic cast included: **Kevin Villecco**, **Matt Hope**, **Jordan Bartal**, **Jonathan**

Chadwick, Katie Osika,

Danielle Pasquale, Bronwyn Graeffe, Ross McKently, Heather Hope, Becky Perry, Dylan DeHart, Megan Osika, and Ashley Loeb.

As the drama played out, I assumed the script was purchased from outside our church, only to discover afterward that it had been written by **Cori Rigato**. Worship Leader **Becky Chadwick** had picked out the Bible verses to be used, primarily Romans 12:9-19, and as Cori says, "the youth absolutely loved them." The verses came from *The Message* version, which I was unfamiliar with, but enjoyed very much.

After the youth decided to do a drama, their leaders asked them to look for music to go with the verses, appropriate for a church service. "They came back with the

music the very next week," says Cori.
Incidentally, the scriptures and music

lyrics were displayed on a large screen in front of the sanctuary (as regularly happens for our Contemporary Service.) Although I usually attend the Traditional Service, I found these aspects of contemporary worship appealing. Cori says the youth are very much into the idea that, even though we may worship differently at each service, we all have in common that we worship and love God.

Cory Laity "got every single youth involved in the music. Kids who don't like to sing that much were singing," says Cori.

The lyrics of all the songs were very meaningful (From *Dig* by Incubus: "Dig me up from under what is covering the better part of me," or from *Our Lives* by The Calling: "Cause these are the days worth living, these are the years we're given, and these are the moments. These are the times...Let's make the best out of our lives."

The idea for the plot came in part from Cori's interest in the TV show, *Survivor*, and is based on the premise that adults and youth should "tryout" to become

andy was born in Winston Salem, NC to Maryann and Floyd Doxie on April 8, 1958. She relocated to Reading in 1963 and graduated from the Wilson School District. Always a secretary, Sandy served as secretary of the senior class and editor in chief of the Wilson yearbook. She graduated from Kutztown State University with a BS in Art Education, certified to teach K-12, with a concentration in Aesthetic Education and crafts.

Sandy married her high school sweetheart, Joe Bressi, and moved to Arizona. There she taught in the Tuscan School District and worked for Trans Art Company in sales and interior design. In 1988, Sandy and Joe moved to California, and there she earned her license as an insurance agent to work as CSR with Nationwide Insurance. Sandy accepted the position of San Diego office manager for California and Calco Insurance brokers and agents until 1990.

On July 23, 1990, Sandy gave birth to her son, Joseph Anthony. She also attended Palomar college in San Marcas, CA. During her evenings she earned 15 credits in ceramic/pottery. In 1992, she started her own pottery business, SLB Productions.

Sandy relocated back east to Gaithersburg, MD, in 1993. On May 1, 1995, Maranda Lea was born. Sandy was a *stay-athome mom* for both children. In 1996, they relocated to a new home in Frederick, MD. Sandy became an active volunteer in the school and later a helper at Maranda's day care. Sandy also assisted with Boy Scouts and Daisy and Brownie Scouts. During this time she joined the New Market Garden Club, became a chair person, and taught flower design. In December, 2004, her husband lost his CEO position with MCT Federal Credit Union.

Most of us will feel tired just reading about Sandy's travel and work schedule, but there is still more!

On May 1, 2005, Sandy was hired by LPUMC. In July of that year, Sandy and her family moved to Reading from Maryland. On August 1, Sandy was diagnosed with ovarian cancer and had surgery to remove the tumor. From that September to February, she received chemotherapy treatments. Sandy has worked for two years at LP Church, organizing the front office, creating a better work flow of operations, with attention paid to details and important record keeping. We are all happy to have you, Sandy! We wish you health and happiness at LP.

"Our youth are amazing ...their goals, their vision!" says Cori. "I've just given them the outlet to speak." **Heather Hope** and **Becky Perry** are now youth members of Church Council and have presented some of the ideas and vision of our youth to the Council. One goal of LP youth is to present a Sunday night youth worship service once a month.
