
Flowering the Cross On Easter Sunday

Have you wondered why Christians gather at the Lord's Table? Or, have you asked "Just what is a sacrament, anyway?" If so, you'll want to attend the workshop on Sunday, **March 9**, at 12:15 pm, in the sanctuary. Although children in 3rd grade and above are our targeted audience, all ages and their parents are welcomed.

The United Methodist Church has set no specific age to begin taking communion, but encourages a family and child decision based on desire and readiness of heart. After attending the workshop, parents and children can decide if



they will receive Holy Communion together at the first table at the Maundy Thursday Seder Service on March 20 (see above).

Pastor Jerry will take us through the biblical foundations of the Eucharist and guide us in hands-on discovery of the various ways in which communion is offered at LP. Human nature tells us that we need to see before we believe; we need the facts before putting our trust into something.

We are created with a He is not here sense of skepticism to question things that are out of the realms of human logic or out of our comfort

zones. In the early 1900s the experts said it would take thousands of years for humankind to fly. Less then five years after that statement the Wright brothers were flying their plane at Kitty Hawk, North Carolina. Nearly 70 years later a man was walking on the moon.

We are fascinated with the "incredible," whether we truly believe or not. We can come face to face with the bizarre, the supernatural, and still not believe. This kind of thinking is similar to

the reaction to the resurrection. About 2000 years ago Jesus did something no other human being has ever done, except Lazarus. He rose from the grave. Yet despite the fact that his disciples and a great multitude of people socialized with the

> risen Christ, the majority of the world failed to believe

Two thousand years after Christ did the impossible, the unbelievable, the majority of the word still does not accept his resurrection. Why, despite countless evi-

dence that leads to Christ's resurrection. does the majority of the world turn to other sources to find eternal life? Perhaps it's because many Christians don't lead resurrected lives

but has l'ISEN.

The best way to experience Christ's resurrection today is to see it in His 21st century disciples. Are we living victorious lives over death and worldly evil, or have we allowed sin to defeat us? Do we try to play God and rule over the

SUNDAY CHURCH SCHOOL AND MORE - A LOOK BACK

its earliest roots, the Sunday School served for more than religious instruction. We often forget that Robert Raikes, credited as the primary founder of the Sunday School movement in the mid-1700's, started the first school for children of chimney sweeps who learned to read and write by reading and copying from the Bible. In the days before child labor laws, when children worked six days a week, Sunday Schools were a way to control children's activities so that the tranquility of the wealthy was not disturbed on the weekend. Children were gathered together to learn proper behavior and enforce cleanliness.

It was in the early 1800's that Sunday School became more religious in nature, teaching church doctrine and morals rather than basic reading and writing. Its late 1800's success was closely connected to its providing education while enhancing the culture of working-class life through adding music and service of song, sewing classes, bazaars, concerts, dramas, cricket and football clubs, and societies for mutual improvement and excursions to the seaside.

As in its earliest roots, Sunday Church School today, though quite differently,



seeks to shape the culture in

which we live and affect the way we Christians see the world, even as the church competes with many other choices, distractions, and opportunities for its children, youth, and adults. This dual emphasis on Christ and culture remains the focus of what LP offers on Sunday mornings at LP - opportunities for our children, youth, and adults to learn and grow in the faith and know its stories and heritage.

At 9 am, younger children leave Contemporary Worship after the Children's Message for Children's Choir and Bible Story Time.

During the 10:10 am Church School period, options for all ages are offered:

- → Children 3 years through 6th grade have graded options using Faith Weaver curriculum resources.
- → Youth in 7th-12th grades wrestle with Bible stories and their application to real life.
- → Adults can choose from three different options:
 - Lectionary Bible Study for a disciplined reading of the



ing job and is always welcoming to our group - never too busy to answer questions and always ready to direct our efforts.



Worship Leader Minute for March 2008

Leader

Isaiah 41:13 (New American Standard Bible) For I am the LORD your God, who upholds your right hand, Who says to you, 'Do not fear, I will help you.'

Have you ever had something come at you at all different angles over and over again? That has been happening to me recently. This verse or something like it has been popping up in multiple places in my life recently. It has been in articles that I have been reading, in conversations I have had with unlikely people, and even in my trom (dreams! It has me thinking about what God is trying to tell me. I think that people find it Worship very easy to live in a sort of fear; the fear of the unknown,

fear of change, fear of death,

fear of living, fear of failure, fear of losing someone or something, so many things to be afraid of...but that is not what God wants us to do. God wants us to live for God and with God in the confidence that God is right there with us in whatever we do

As I contemplate the lesson that God is trying to teach me, I am struggling with what is healthy fear and what is just "foolish" fear. What is it I should really be afraid of? Bill and I have been dealing with a school problem with one of our children recently, and we have been afraid that we were not going to be able to get the help that our child needs. We

were so afraid that we stopped listening, and that is where the fear overwhelmed us. We stopped listening so we couldn't make good decisions, we couldn't say the right thing, and we were being unsuccessful with getting our child's needs met. When we realized what was happen-

> ing, we changed strategies. God was with us holding our hands and we just had to trust that God was going to help us to do the best we could for our child. When we started to listen, we were able to take a step back and make better decisions, and

contribute more productively to coming up with a solution for the problem. You see, fear keeps us from "hearing" what others are saying, and it keeps us from taking the steps that God wants us to take

It is not easy to let go of fear. It is hard to trust that God is there holding our hand, but like all things it only takes faith the size of a mustard seed to take the first step. When you decide to focus on God and not the fear, letting go becomes a little bit easier


Thought to ponder: What am I afraid of? How can I begin to let go of the fear and hold onto God?

More information will follow about training dates and donations. We look forward to seeing old and new friends this year. Spread the word that all are welcome!


Learn About Classroom Discipline and Management
