From the Pastor's Desk

And when the Israelites saw it, they said to one another, "What is it?" for they did not know what it was and Moses said to them, "It is the bread that the Lord has given you to eat." This is what the Lord has commanded, gather as much of it as each of you needs, an omer to a person. And the Israelites did so. Some gathering more, some less, but when they measured it with an omer, those who gathered little had no lack; they gathered each as much as any of them needed." Exodus 16:15-18

his story of the manna in the wilderness is a foundational story for understanding the way in which God provides for the needs of the community of his people and its journey through the world. It defines God's people as a community of stewards.

The Rev. Bruce Birch, Dean of Wesley Theological Seminary, mentions that the first of those qualities is discernment. The name *manna* comes from the Hebrew words for the response made by Israel. What is it, *manna*? Like Israel, we, too, stand surrounded by resources and often fail to recognize them for what they really are, namely God's gifts to provide for human need and to empower a community to serve those needs. The manna story urges us to the discernment that sees all of our resources as the gift from God, for the needs of God's world.

A second quality of the manna is equity. The distribution of the manna was related to need. No one was to have too much or too little. We must exercise stewardship over the gifts of God's resources in ways

that make resources accessible to those who have the greatest need. Resources are not to be hoarded. The abundant life is not the life marked by excess, but by enough, and enough for all.

The third quality from this story is the quality of mission. We receive God's gifts as God's stewards to enable our participation in God's mission, and plans for material security. As in the manna story, this requires ongoing commitment and engagement in receiving and using God's gifts. We cannot measure their use by our needs alone. The mission requires distribution and use of God's gifts for the sake of the mission, in a day to day, year after year, commitment to receiving and giving of God's gifts.

Sunday, October 26th is Consecration Sunday. I would ask that you take this time to prayerfully consider your stewardship commitment of your time, talents, and financial gifts towards Lincoln Park Community United Methodist Church for 2009. Together, we can offer the hope and love found in Jesus Christ to a lost and hurting world.

land.

The primary reasons that limit our construction options are township ordinance-driven. We already exceed current setback requirements, and township rules regarding storm water runoff dictate that we not increase impermeable surfaces, such as roofs and pavement.

Therefore, the sketch from Funk suggests putting a second floor on the Education Building. While this sketch appears to do much to achieve our goals, it also appears to be cost prohibitive, an estimated \$1.3 million, given our present congregation size.

So that the Church can continue to attract new members and provide suitable facilities for both worship styles, the Task Force will investigate ways to modify our sanctuary to serve both worship services.

What's More Important than Our Relationship with Christ?

"You can give without loving, but you cannot love without giving. And if your church is truly growing spiritually, it's getting more generous every year." - Rick Warren

The stewardship series we're using this year focuses on *all* our giving to the church, not just our financial giving. It's my hope that this will give us pause to reflect on how we're growing spiritually.

Are you doing more than attending church on a Sunday morning? Attending a church service is a vitally important part of our spiritual journey, but not all that we need to be concerned with.

If all we do is attend a ser-

vice, we are only relying

on one leg of our spiritual support system. Any good support system has multiple parts to it.

Think of your house, how long would it stand without more than one support? How strong do the walls and beams of your house have to be to hold it up? It's the same with our spiritual lives. We must have multiple parts to our support system. Worship should be central to every part of our lives, not just our Sunday morning lives. Study of the Bible needs to happen in groups and individually. Giving time to those who need us provides us with the opportunity to grow as well. And the truth of the matter is, the

more we grow spiritually, the more we can give of our time, treasure, and gifts.

Trust me; I know how busy our lives are, but is it too much to ask to give *two* hours on a Sunday morning to worship and to study? What in our lives is so much more important than our relationship with Christ? Family and God are the

central focus of our lives. The model we give our children and grandchildren is one they'll follow their

entire lives.

Finally, do you love the God that you come to worship? How much time, how much money, how many gifts you share with the church are a direct correlation to what your relationship with God looks like. Where does your relationship with God stand?

This month is about so much more than what financial commitment you're going to make to the church. It's a chance to evaluate our relationships with Jesus Christ. Where do we place him in our lives, and how do we demonstrate that in the way we live and give everyday?


Have You Read a Good Book Lately?
