

The season of Advent challenges us to fulfill John the Baptist's exhortation:


Prepare the way of the Lord. Advent is the time to make ready for the coming of Jesus Christ.

Unique Opportunity for Endowment Giving

Again in 2008, donors who are age 70½ have a unique opportunity to make gifts from a traditional IRA or Roth IRA.

If made before December 31, 2008, IRA donors may give all or portions of their mandatory IRA withdrawals (up to \$100,000) directly to charity. While there is no income tax deduction, donors who make gifts directly from their IRA will not increase their adjusted gross income, and so avoid a higher level of taxation.

If you must make mandatory withdrawals from these types of plans and have accumulated more than you need in retirement, this gift option in favor of Lincoln Park UMC Endowment Fund should be of interest.

I sn't it remarkable that in one small congregation there can be such diversity? We are tall and short, fat and thin, young and old, introverts and extroverts, and yet we're all members of one fellowship who manage to accommodate each other in our Christian journey.

The gentleman I wish to tell you about is a man of the "old school," always polite and considerate of others. (He still prefers to see a lady into his car and closes the door as she is seated, or will hold your coat as you struggle into it.) He greets everyone with ease and can engage you in polite conversation, and he always shows up for church in suit and tie.

He and his wife were born and reared in Sharon, PA, where he graduated from high school, and then graduated from Washington and Jefferson College in western PA, in 1941. He stayed on at W and J as Secretary of Admissions for eight years, though he spent $2\frac{1}{2}$ years of that time in Army service during WWII.

Later he earned a master's degree in psychology and a doctorate in higher

education from Penn State, where he served for 10 years as Assistant Dean and later Associate Dean of Men. In 1959, he was named Director of the newly established Wyomissing Center of Penn State, one of 14 centers of the college established in the Commonwealth. Under his leadership, the center grew into what is now Penn State Berks Campus.

He and his wife were married in 1941, have three children and six grandchildren, most of whom were able to gather this year to help celebrate their 66th wedding anniversary. What a milestone!

As a member of Lincoln Park Church he's served as Lay Leader, Chair of the Building Campaign for the Education Building, Stewardship Leader, and in recent years as chair of the Endowment Committee. He'd be happy if there were a way to improve our parking, or add space to our buildings, but those things must wait for the moment.

His vision for our church is that people give of their interests to a *total* church, contemporary and traditional, and continue to grow with enthusiasm as a *united church of God*, seeking and sharing Christ, with respect and support for any committed form of worship and service within and beyond our membership.

Medical Mission Outreach Memorable and Rewarding

was my privilege to join a Christian medical team serving those living near Zalantun, Inner Mongolia-Northern China, from October 10-24. The approximate distance of travel was 10,000 miles from Harrisburg, PA to Inner Mongolia.

Our team included six doctors, one PA, two dentists, two pharmacists, four fourth -year medical students,

one surgical resident, one registered dietician, four nurses, one team leader and four logistics personnel. We were joined by several Chinese doctors and our interpreters at Zalantun.

The people are hard working farmers, with much of the labor done by hand. We were greeted by smiles, banners, and welcoming speeches by clinic officials. Our patients were kind, appreciative, and orderly, and there were always enough people to keep our team busy.

Medical needs included hypertension, diabetes and dental care. We had a portable ultrasound machine which was very popular.

As the clinic continued, many children would come on their bicycles or on foot to see and interact with our team. Some of the team would engage in playing,

learning or teaching games. The children could speak some English, and delighted in saying *Hello*, then with post card or paper and pen would ask each of us, *Write your name please*.

Our team shared the Lord's love for the people of Inner Mongolia and helped lead several to accept Jesus as their Savior. Six Chinese Bibles were inscribed

with words of encouragement by our team and given to six of the Chinese doctors who wanted to know more about this Lord we love and serve.

Through our work we

were able to demonstrate firsthand the joy of Jesus in our personal lives.

Our medicines were adequate for the duration of the clinics. The \$400 given to me was left in the care of the Christian organization, SHIC, which provides aid in times of disaster, including food, blankets, cots, or tents.

We had one day to see in and around Beijing, a city of 16,000,000. We walked on The Great Wall and visited a Jade and Silk factory.

Thank you for your gifts, and especially your prayers, which made His work possible. This trip was one of my most memorable and rewarding.
