




Our annual church picnic is still in the planning stages, but we are considering having it at a local park in September. Stay tuned for details in the next edition of the *NewsLinc*!

World Vision is an international organization that provides money and support for starving children around the world. The youth started their fast at school, after lunch on

The youth started their fast at school, after lunch on Friday. We met the other youth groups that night at the West Lawn playground, where we set up cardboard houses and had an informal worship service. Fifty-five people participated, and we caused quite a stir in the neighborhood! After a chilly night of sleeping (this youth worker does not recommend using a



\$9.99 sleeping bag for sleeping on cardboard outside!), we participated in a full day of service projects: raking leaves at a nearby Methodist Camp, collecting food during a scavenger hunt, and running bingo at Phoebe. The day ended with communion back at our church, and the breaking of our fast at the chili supper.

I've been blessed to work with our youth the past two years, but have never been so proud of them as I was at this event. Our teens made this event a priority in their busy lives. One youth finished her fast at work -- in a grocery store! We don't realize how blessed we are until the basics, like food or a roof over your head, are taken away. We knew these conditions were temporary. Usually at 6 pm we are eating dinner, and our beds are waiting for us at home. Others are not so fortunate. Our youth learned this valuable lesson along with the fact that *they* can make a difference in this world. I am humbled by their faith, enthusiasm, and commitment.

Mission Trip Summer 2009

Right now our youth are packing for our mission trip to Cincinnati. Sixteen youth and three adults will participate. We leave Sunday morning, June 14, and return Friday night on the 19th. We'll volunteer at food banks and homeless shelters, and work with children and the elderly.
