#### **Lenten Supper & Study Begins**

Join friends from Lincoln Park and the community during Lent, for a four week SUPPER & STUDY SERIES, beginning Sunday, **February 28**, and concluding March 28. We'll watch Adam Hamilton's videos, 24 Hours that Changed the

World, which take us from the Last Supper to Gethsemane, the trial, and the Crucifixion. There will be no Supper Series on March 7 so everyone can attend the UMYF Spaghetti Supper and Worship.

No other 24-hour event in human history has had a deeper, more lasting impact than the last hours of Jesus' life. The Rev. Hamilton, pastor in Leawood, Kansas, at one of the fastest growing Methodist churches in the US, will challenge us to focus on how Jesus' Crucifixion has changed world history and how it changes us.

#### THE SEASON OF LENT

Lent is a season of 40 days, not counting Sundays, which begins Ash Wednesday, and ends Holy Saturday. Lent comes from the Anglo-Saxon word *lencten*, which means *spring*, and is a preparation for the celebration of Easter. Historically, Lent began as a period of fasting and preparation for baptism by converts and then became a time for penance by all Christians. The color is purple which represents somberness.

## **LENTEN WORSHIP SERIES An Old Twist On New Relationships**

Christianity is about relationships: our relationship with God and our relationships with others. Follow Christ along his Lenten way and discover how He reclaims us and all our relationships in this exciting, topical, hard-hitting series of services for Lent.

Ash Wednesday: *The Destructive Pattern of Escalation* is seen as troops overtake Jesus in Gethsemane and He stands before Caiaphas.

First Week of Lent: *The Destructive Pattern of Invalidation* is seen in the testimony against Jesus at His trial.

Second Week of Lent: *The Destructive Pattern of Negative Interpretation* is seen in the High Priest's reaction to the claims of the Christ.

Third Week of Lent: *The Destructive Pattern of Withdrawal* is seen in Peter's denial of his Lord.

Fourth Week of Lent: *The Secret of Not Having Unrealistic Expectations* is seen in Jesus' willing sacrifice.

Fifth Week of Lent: *The Secret of Forgiveness and Absolution* is seen in Jesus' opening of paradise to a sinner.

#### From the Pastor's Desk

I know, I know. You just celebrated Christmas and now must get ready for Lent and Easter. I would suggest we don't rush past Lent to get to Easter because we are just getting over Christmas.



Lent is a time of reflection, meditation, prayer and rededication. It's a time for all Christians to examine

their lives, evaluate priorities, and establish ties with God and others. For 40 days in the wilderness Jesus reflected on His relationship with God and the meaning of His purpose on Earth. His story in the wilderness also shapes our 40+ days of Lent. How will each of us honestly look at ourselves? How do we turn and return to God and to a life of faithfulness? How will the Holy Spirit lead us in Lent?

As I reflected on how I would approach Lent this year, I came across some great ideas developed by First United Methodist Church of Duluth, Minnesota. Perhaps one of these ideas may spark within you an opportunity to be open and led by the Spirit in a new way during this Lenten season as we search for peace and new life.

- † Set the alarm 15 minutes early to begin the day with a devotional reading and thanking God for the new day.
- † Read the Gospel of Matthew.

- † Have a beginner's mind ready for anything, open to everything.
- † Make a special prayer list, naming people you don't like.
- † Add to the prayer list people who are filled with hatred towards others.
- † Read a Christian book.
- † Share a journal.
- † Meditate on and sing a Lenten hymn each week.
- † Choose a scripture verse to think about each day.
- † Send five notes each week...Just be-
- † Visit people who are limited in their ability to leave home.
- † Attend worship each Sunday in Lent.
- † Attend the Supper Study series on Sunday evenings in Lent.
- † Attend our Maundy Thursday Evening worship.
- † Seek the sacred in the ordinary look for God each day.
- † Live more simply make a sacrifice and give the money away you would have spent on yourself.
- † Have a *moist heart* (Native American phrase for compassion.)
- † Pray for the Church universal, as well as Lincoln Park Community United Methodist Church.

The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ be with your spirit this Lenten season.

#### ADULT OPTIONS ON SUNDAY MORNINGS

**Lectionary Bible Study** in the Library at 9:50 am will be facilitated by **Bob Robertson**. The basic discussion guide, *Keeping Holy Time*, celebrates all themes of Christian life and faith through study directed by the Revised Common Lectionary and offers a systematic three-year study of the Bible. A brief exegesis of each of four weekly Scriptures examines the life-world and culture out of which the passages come, looks for unifying themes and intents of the texts, and invites communal study to consider our contemporary world and where God yet acts and speaks.

Living the Questions Pt 2, facilitated by Earl Hope, invites participants to hear top scholars explore the significance of Christianity in the 21<sup>st</sup> Century and ask what a meaningful faith might look like in today's world. This series strives to create an environment where people can ask lots of questions and re-vision Christianity's emergence in the world and in their lives. Upcoming topics include:


For children, our fully staffed Nursery will be divided in half (toddlers to age 4 on one side, and age 5+ on the other). For

#### William H. and Dorothy V. Auman Endowment Fund Established

In honor and memory of their parents Gary, Richard, and Clair Auman have established a designated fund of \$15,000, as part of the Church Endowment Fund, to be used specifically "for replacement, repairs and/or maintenance of fixed assets within the sole discretion of the Board of Trustees." The principal of the Fund will be invested separately by the Endowment Fund Committee, with the annual interest of the Fund reverting to the Trustees for physical needs "beyond the normal operating budget." At its meeting on January 18, Church Council expressed full appreciation for this generous gift.

## Significant Year-End Gifts Boost Endowment Fund

The principal in the Endowment Fund was increased from \$99,873 to \$126,488 by significant gifts, gratefully received, at year end 2009. In addition to the memorial gift of \$15,000 received from the Auman brothers, a generous anonymous gift of \$10,000 was received from a member, along with \$1,420 from several other members in amounts ranging from \$25 to \$500.

**ella**. **Dorothy Stradley**, who lived in England several years ago, captured our hearts with her tales.


**Sandi Rosencrans** read *The Teacup Story*, about a timid, impatient, curious
