





Continuing March 14, 21, and 28, our church will offer a seven-week study you won't want to miss. In ***24 Hours That Changed the World***, Adam Hamilton will guide you through the last 24 hours of Jesus' life. The study is designed to help you experience and understand the significance of Jesus' suffering and death in a way you never have before.

Whether you are a long-time Christian or curious about the story of Christ's crucifixion, you're invited to join us on this inspiring journey. The study includes:

- † *24 Hours That Changed the World*, a book by Adam Hamilton
- † *24 Hours That Changed the World: 40 Days of Reflection*, a book of reflections
- † *24 Hours That Changed the World: Video Journey*, a DVD with sessions filmed in the Holy Land

The study is based on a sermon series of the same name featuring Adam Hamilton, founding pastor of the United Methodist Church of the Resurrection in Leawood, Kansas. During the original series, the Church of the Resurrection dramatically increased the number of people attending worship.

As part of this event, we'll make an extra effort to invite members of the community to participate. "Since the final 24 hours of Jesus' life are so central to our faith, we're asking you to invite people in the community to join us," stated **Earl Hope**, Lay Leader and series co-facilitator. # From the Pastor's Desk

From Pastor Jerry McGrath

*Do your best to present yourself to God as one approved by him, a worker, who rightly handles the word of truth. 2Timothy 2:15*

**T**hroughout my career as a pastor I have heard many interesting comments about both preaching in general, and my own preaching. There were times when I felt I presented a powerful, spiritual message only to hear people say, *It was okay*. On other occasions I felt I bombed in a message, but the responses were: *Really powerful; You made my day; Wow, that really challenged me*. Often a sermon or message will transform some people, but do nothing for others.

Everyone seems to have an or her own idea about what makes a good sermon:

- ▶ Keep it short
- ▶ Entertain me
- ▶ Have plenty of Scripture
- ▶ Make me feel I have to respond by doing something good when I leave worship.

So, what makes a good sermon?

In *THE CHURCH HERALD*, Jackie Smallbones wrote an article, *Pulpit and Pew: Sermons that Satisfy*. She says some people think the preacher is responsible for the sermon being good. If listeners are to

get the most from sermons, preachers are totally responsible. Good preparation is crucial. Preachers have the awesome responsibility of delivering God's message to His people.



Other people think listeners are responsible for getting the most out of the sermon. The listener can't blame the preacher. Listeners are responsible for concentrated attention to the preacher

Ultimately, Smallbones concludes that getting the most from the sermon is neither the responsibility of the preacher nor listener. It is all up to the Holy Spirit, a gift of God's grace. When both preacher and listeners are open to God, submissive to the indwelling Spirit, God speaks, and sermons are effective. While preachers should prepare and then preach their hearts out, and listeners should pay keen attention, ultimately our task is to let the Holy Spirit guide us. Then, and only then, will sermons be effective and our lives changed.


# *Three Simple Rules for Christian Living*

These materials examine John Wesley's blueprint for ways of living which mark our corporate and individual lives as Christians. The series invites us to a radical change of direction by practicing these simple rules which have the power to



change the world:

## Missions Committee Reports Successes

Our Christmas ministries were a success thanks to your support. About 50 shoe boxes for children -- from several of over 130 countries -- were prepared by you and sent through the **SAMARITAN'S PURSE - OPERATION CHRISTMAS CHILD** ministry, led by Franklin Graham (son of Billy). This ministry also helps children hear the Gospel.

Through the **SALVATION ARMY'S ADOPT-A- FAMILY** program, we provided gifts for three families. All gift tags were taken and presumably all gifts obtained, although the last collection Sunday services (December 20) were cancelled due to snow. Many gifts were brought to the Church Office the following week and eventually got to their des-

tinations. Funds of \$320 given into Missions Designated Offering Account were used for \$50 gift cards to Redners - two for each family, with \$20 going for one of the gifts.

Note that about 70 families were served in 2008, so that, assuming the number was similar this season, our serving of three families represents a high percentage of total service for any single organization. The Salvation Army has acknowledged us as one of their most faithful supporters for this ministry over the years.

Thanks to those who "went the extra mile(s)" quite literally to make sure the gifts got to the church on time.
