In the bulb there is a flower; in the seed an apple tree; in cocoons a hidden promise, butterflies will soon be free! In

In the death and resurrection of Jesus, we are reminded that hardship, distress, persecution, famine, nakedness, peril or sword do not have the last word



Trustees Gather Information for Possible Future Projects

Many thanks to Ron Schucker from the Trustees. He's been helping Carl Madeira trim trees, clean gutters, repair chairs and molding, paint, and clean windows and chandeliers.

Presently, the Trustees are gathering information concerning the placement of a restroom on the sanctuary level of our church. In December a gift of \$5,000 was given to the Memorial Fund, designated for such a restroom. In January, approximately \$1,900 was also made available for a restroom project.

Problems arise because our church has limited space. If we add something new, something old has to change.

In 2008, Arthur Funk and Sons, Inc. presented a proposal to build a second level to the Ed Building -- redoing its first level and the present Nursery rooms, and building a second level to the breezeway connecting the two buildings -- for a cost of one million dollars. Part of this proposal, not included in the price, were restrooms to service the new second level. In the diagram, two ladies' and one men's room were placed in the present Music

Director's office, next to the sanctuary, with doorways to the hall. If the proposal were ever implemented, restrooms would be necessary for state approval.

Another suggestion was to place a unisex restroom in the hall between the lift and the Music Director's office. An estimate of \$15,500 was obtained from Funk. The coat rack would be eliminated. This estimate does not include moving the painted glass window from the hall. The window on the entrance level is not the same size, and the cost of moving the painted window is not known at this time.

Estimates have not been obtained for some other suggestions such as: placing the restroom in the hall over the steps coming up from the lowest level, or plac-


ing one restroom in half of the Music Director's office. Perhaps members will have some new suggestions to give us.

Our United Methodist Church has been in the forefront in an effort against something we are, gratefully, not much affected by in our country anymore - that is - the disease MALARIA. Our Church is involved in a lofty goal, under the Global Health Initiative, called IMAGINE-NO-MALARIA, which seeks an attainable goal to eradicate this scourge.

One well known phase of this initiative is the Nothing-But-Nets campaign. Bednets - quite effective against biting mosquitoes - are made available to people. The basic unit of support is: \$10 buys a single bed net. That simple, that concrete, and yet it's an effective way to serve.

Putting God First In Your Life

God your focal point? Putting God at the center of things is difficult for anyone, especially someone in their teens, 20's and 30's. There's enormous pressure to excel in school, perform in sports, spend time with family and friends, get a good job, make money, volunteer for charity, drive kids to events, and then, on top of it all, put God at the center...REALLY! Are you kidding?

There isn't time in a day to breathe, let alone put God at the center. BUT, what if you did? What if you took a giant step back and put God at the center? Would getting to the meeting on time, petty arguments over where to eat, stressing out over a B+ versus a B, or making the basket during the game really make a difference? Would stresses go away?

We read throughout the Old and New Testaments to put God first and set aside our interests. It is God's will, not our own. The perfect example, in Matthew 16:21-23, is when Peter finally realizes Jesus' death was imminent. Peter was angry and said that will never happen to You, but Jesus knew better and said, you are not setting your mind on God's interests, but man's.

I don't always set my mind on God's interests. There has only been One who has set His mind on God's interests. He

lived a sinless life for the 33 years He was in the world. He knew He would be beaten, nailed, and pierced, yet He never lost focus. He bled from seven places so that our sins of the past, present and future, our failures to put God at the center of our busy lives, would be forgiven: that we would be made pure again through our belief in Jesus Christ.

I'm attempting to put God back at the center of my life by committing to follow through on the call, on God's interests, to worship with other young people and set legislation for the continuation of young people's ministry throughout the United Methodist Church at the Global Young People's Convocation in Germany. To do this I need to take that giant step back, set aside work for a week, and give up time with friends and family over the summer. I ask that you continue to support my efforts, my struggles, and my attempt to put God back at the center. I also challenge YOU to refocus and put God back at your center.

A Wilson HS Senior, Matt was chosen, with another student, by Wilson teacher **Katherine L. Hagee** (who is also a Lincoln Park Church member).

Katherine teaches Advanced Placement US History and AP psychology and is also on the Constitution Center's teacher advisory board.

Matt traveled to the Center in Philadelphia where they were connected by videoconferencing to students from across the US.

The topic was immigration -- legal and illegal, "enforcement, economic and moral issues, and who should be allowed to immigrate," according to Erin Negley of the *Reading Eagle* (from which much of this information was gleaned). The students did their own research to support their views.

Matt says, "Despite the many benefits, culturally and economically, that immigration can bring, we still have to address the basic biological fact that our ecological environment can only support a certain amount of people."

The discussion left Hope and others with a feeling of optimism. "It's a great opportunity for the kids," Katherine says, "What a cool thing to be able to expose these guys to."

In January Matt's Wilson High World Quest Team won 1st place at this year's regional competition hosted by the Greater Reading World Affirs Council. The win qualifies the team for the national competition on April 24, in Washington DC, at the National Press Club. Good luck, Matt!
