fort to say "No More Malaria!" And, school supplies were collected all week to send to the Rev. Nick Camacho, a United Methodist Army Chaplain serving in Kabul and working with chil-

dren who don't even have pencils.

#### **Looking At Your Role in the Church Budget Process**

Budget

efore it's time for the church to plan a budget for next year, it might be helpful to clarify how this works. Just as we budget at home, the church will budget the needs and wants based on predicted funds. Of course, there are staff,

building and utility costs, as well as missions projections and programs the church plans and hopes to offer.

It is EXTREMELY important for the church to have an accurate estimation to be able to plan ahead. Total general projections are presented to the United Methodist Church at Charge Conference, on Saturday, November 7.

When you look at your financial situation for next year, try to get an overall sense of what you may be able to budget for the church for next year. Though we hope to incorporate several smaller fundraising requests into the budget, there

will still be some others throughout the year. If you plan to donate to several of those as well, please calculate that amount *separately* and *do not include* that amount into your pledge, which is SOLELY for the regular budget.

Planning If at all possible, please try to return your pledge card by Sunday, September 19, Commitment Sunday, so that projections can be finalized and a budget voted on by the Finance Committee and Church Council prior to our Charge Conference Meeting on November 7.

As always, your support of Lincoln Park UMC and its ministries are most appreciated. May God bless and nurture you in your faith journey.
