
## **Worship with Us this Summer**

From Pastor Dave McMillan

On July 10, my first Sunday in the pulpit, my sermon is entitled *I Don't Know Anything*. This is both a personal confession and, I hope you'll agree, an acceptable starting point for us to begin our new life together.

Over the following four Sundays, I'll share a brief overview of where I'm coming from theologically. How we believe or think about God shapes the way we see ourselves, others, and the world. I'll use an old four-part gospel tract from my Campus Crusade for Christ days with a few personal modifications.

Towards the end of August, I'll begin a fourpart sermon series entitled *On the Road*. In this series, we'll look at how the good news of Christ spread in the early church, touching first disillu-



sioned and angry believers before reaching seekers and the unchurched.

We serve an awesome and gracious God. I hope everyone will make Sunday worship an integral part of your summer schedule.

## **Greetings From Pastor Dave**

When you receive this *News-Linc*, I'll be on vacation in Callaway Gardens, about two hours southwest of Atlanta. The McMillan and Mauger families, my mother's sister's family, have been meeting to vacation there for the last 40 years.

While I won't be with you for the first Sunday of July, I will share something about myself so you'll have some familiarity with your new pastor. I grew up in Havertown, Delaware County, with my parents and four sisters. Yes, I'm the only boy and the fourth-born. My father

passed away after a long battle with Lewy-body dementia in March, 2004. My mother is 79 and planning to move into the Maris Grove Retirement Community in Glenn Mills, PA, over the summer. Except for some macular degeneration, she is doing well.

I attended Haverford High School and graduated too long ago to remember. In 1983, I graduated from Penn State University with a Bachelor's Degree in Health and Physical Education. While I was there, I was involved with Athletes in Action, the athletic ministry of Campus Crusade for Christ. It was in 1982. on a Summer Project in Panama City,

Florida, along with 60 other college students working, learning and witnessing in the community, that I felt called to ministry.

has, by example and with few words, taught his children and grand-

children many life lessons.

- ☼ BE HUMBLE. Dad once went to a party and, thinking of the patio he was building in our backyard, remarked to the hostess: "Your pie reminds me of cement." He is quick to laugh at his own foibles.
- ☼ BE CARING AND DEVOTED. Dad has attended oodles of sporting and theatrical events, concerts, birthdays, anniversaries, and weddings. "Grandpa always asks how you're doing," says Douglas. "I always felt loved by him and never judged." Dad did countless little things over the years: He polished my shoes, made our oatmeal, pumped my gas. After my mother died, he made it a point to send us perfect greeting cards.
- BE A POSITIVE THINKER. My brother Bruce has a story that's telling of Dad's nature. "One day, my brother John and I played till dusk in a muddy area where a mall was being developed. When it was time to go home, I discovered I had lost a shoe—a brand new one. We trudged home, worried about what Dad would say, but all he said was 'John, grab a shovel,' and 'Bruce, bring that rake.'

And off the three of us went, at dusk, to find a brown shoe in a sea of mud. And darned if we didn't find it!" Bruce learned a few lessons that day: about positive thinking, persistence, teamwork, and that "love, forgiveness and grace are more powerful than anger and punishment."

- BE DETERMINED. In 1969 Dad suffered a heart attack, followed by two more, and had bypass surgery in 1985. All these years he's stuck to his exercise, mostly walking, and for him butter and cheese are "poison." My son Steve says, "Whether it's avoiding butter or fixing his plumbing with duct tape, Grandpa sets his mind to something and sticks to it."
- ☼ HAVE FUN. His grandchildren love to play cards with him. "How do I play this again?" he asks every time. And then "he crushes you!" says my daughter Christy. They enjoy his walks (with dogs) —by the river, at the beach, in any neighborhood. His easygoing demeanor makes him good company.

My brother John remembers Dad's bedtime stories which usually ended with the Air Force hymn: "Off we go into the wild blue yonder, riding high into the sky...Nothing'll stop the US Air Force!"
