#### From the Pastor's Desk

#### Lessons Learned

On my last Sunday with the folks at Hibernia UM Church, we gathered beneath a pavilion for our annual church picnic. I shared, with a hint of amusement, that after 11 years as their pastor, I could write a book. After I finished speaking, many encouraged me to do just that.

Well, over the next several months, I'd like to beg your indulgence, as I share some of their stories and the lessons I learned. I've decided not to use fictitious names because I feel it would detract from the intimacy we shared. But understand that these are my own ruminations, not necessarily theirs, and that each person has a few stories on me as well.

There's no doubt where I should begin. Every week **VIVIAN** reminded me and the women in our Bible study that she was the oldest church member. And every week we'd remind her that she was second oldest, bested by two weeks by her long time friend, Jane Wagner.

At 91, except for a hernia and colostomy, the result of a botched colonoscopy,

she was as spry as a spring lamb. Weekly, in morning Bible study, she threatened to prove her vitality by standing on her head in the corner of the room.

Vivian grew up on her family farm, adjoining the back of our church property. At 13, her older brothers having left home, she was taken out of school to

"harrow fields, cut and bail hay, and milk cows." It was a decision she never regretted. She took pleasure in the work and the outdoors and attributes her longevity to its healthy benefits.

Vivian had three loves in her life. She lost the first in a car accident when she was 18. Possibly reeling from

her loss, or for reasons she could never put her finger on, she soon married a man almost 20 years older, whom she always defends as a "good man," but with a drinking problem. She spoke of going without money and walking along train tracks to find coal to keep her two children warm. One Christmas, he came home without any pay, after stopping at a local bar. It was more than she could bear

Her third love was Myron Ireland whom she met in New Jersey while visiting her sister. Myron was the oldest of four boys and two girls. After the loss of his father, he went to work to support his family. He was in his late 20's, a World War II veteran, when they met. By Vivian's account he "had never been with a woman.". She declared to me with amusement, "I taught

him everything he knew." She hit Myron once in 61 years of marriage; he called her a dirty word and she slapped him across the face. Stunned, he never used the word again.

They shared a good **Blessings From Above** long life together, for which she was grateful, especially for being able to lie with Myron in their bed, fondling his hair, as he passed from this or the life into the next.

By now, you can tell that Vivian was free with her feelings and ruminations. Touched with a slight case of dementia, she shared many thoughts again and again as if for the first time. One morning in Bible study, we discussed the Apostle Paul's missionary journey to the Gentiles, "the uncircumcised."

Vivian couldn't understand why any man would be circumcised. She assured us that her own son was not circumcised. She had promised herself, after holding her nephew as he was circumcised by a doctor in her sister's home, that if she ever had a boy, she would never put him through the agony. Over the next several weeks, every time circumcision was mentioned in the Bible, she would return to her stories and protest of such a barbarous act.

There are other stories I could share about Vivian —

- like the time she altered my suit pants, and my crotch ended up at my knees
- or the times she'd interrupt worship, as the Spirit moved her, to recite a poem or announce to the congregation that she was leaving early to put a roast in the oven

for company coming by later that afternoon

- or the times when her nerves got the best of her and she'd have to leave church
- or the days she brought me fresh eggs or tomatoes, or cooked potatoes and onions, and placed them at my back door when I wasn't home.

But, these will have to wait for that book I'm working on.

What Vivian taught me is that life is about being fully human. St. Irenaeus said (in the second century) "The glory of God is a human being fully alive." Vivian's dementia had erased what little

#### Our Annual Stewardship Campaign: Nurturing a Generous Spirit

What is "Stewardship?"

One of my favorite authors, Wendell Berry, who still farms along the Kentucky River with a team of horses, says "stewardship is leaving the land entrusted to you in better shape than you received it."

Friends, "stewardship" is not a dirty word. It's a good word that comes with both privilege and responsibility. The privilege is to have been entrusted with something by God...some gift, time, talent. The responsibility is to cultivate the gift and pass it forward as a blessing to those who follow us. I've never witnessed this done well without the possession of a generous spirit.

This year, we'll hold our annual stewardship campaign in September. All members will receive a letter with an *Estimate of Giving* card for the coming year, 2012. These cards will be received during traditional and contemporary worship services on **Sunday, September 25**.

Every year, our budget and programs are based on the amount of money which is committed through *Estimate* of *Giving* cards, as well as additional monies we historically receive through non-pledged giving. Having some knowledge of the monies we can count on will help us in prioritizing our ministries and outreach for the coming year, thus enabling us to be good stewards of the resources God has entrusted to us. While it requires an act of faith, every confidential *Estimate of Giving* card received is one more sign of our commitment to Christ and to the future of His Church here at Lincoln Park.

# Here's What Happened at Eastern PA Annual Conference

This year's Annual Conference did not have any of the voting issues that are sometimes vocal and political, but the voting for delegates to General Conference was time consuming. The theme of *Journeying with the Poor* was woven throughout the entire conference.

The keynote speaker, the Rev. Rudy Rasmus of St. John's UMC, Houston, TX, told of his early assignment to "rescue" a church on the brink of closing. His journey with the poor and years of struggle in a less than desirable community were a reminder that we have forgotten our mission beyond the margin. The Rev. Rasmus says there is one prayer the Lord always answers: "Lord, make me an instrument of Thy peace." Membership of that church today is over 9000!

Dr. Joseph Daniels, of Emory UMC, Washington, DC, was the key speaker for the laity session. He told a similar story of being sent on a mission to close this church, located in a drug-infested, gang-controlled community. Persuaded by a handful of faithful to stay, he began his journey with the poor. Now, 18 years later, Sunday attendance reaches 1200. Dr. Daniels believes the Lord uses His spirit, in the form of the poor and down-trodden, to see if Christians are for REAL:

- † Relevant,
- † Enthusiastic,
- † Authentic, and
- † Loving.

Conference attendees were part of specific projects for "journeying." One successful, ongoing project is the *Potato Drop*. UM Men work with growers and processors, taking potatoes that don't make the grade for market, and distribute them to food banks and soup kitchens. At Conference, bags of potatoes were given to attendees to distribute. All 50,000 lbs were taken!

In conjunction with STOP HUNGER NOW, we packed 10,000! high protein, dehydrated meals for schools and orphanages worldwide.


There were budget presentations, and Conference again made budget cuts where possible, holding the line where they could. You can be assured that our apportionments are used wisely.

There were no controversial voting issues, but there were sad ones. A vote was taken to close five churches in our conference. Loss of members, resulting in financial decline, was the overall reason. #### Labor Day: Is Some Work Dignified, Some Not?

For 40 years, the National Opinion Research Center has asked Americans to rate the

cans to rate the "respectability" or "prestige" of various occupations. Recent results give physicians an 86 rating out of a possible 100. Astronauts got

80. Homemakers came in at 51. On the low end were occupations like dishwasher, migrant laborer, and grocery bagger.

Work's dignity or prestige is not derived from the type of work performed, writes Stephen Colecchi. It is dignified because it "shares in the creative energy of God...Women and men are created in the image of a worker God."

Maybe a story says it better. "A refugee named Theodore would come every few months to wash our windows," says John Clayton of the

University of Massachusetts. "I remember his buckets... I remember

his thick Polish accent. One afternoon my mother called me to watch him at work.

'You see that man? What do you think he's doing?'

'Washing windows,' I suggested.
'Let me tell you what he's really doing: That man is putting two sons and a daughter through university!
You understand?'

I remember feeling a shiver. After that, Theodore seemed to me a kind of HERO."

This story was originally published in *The Chronicle* of Higher Education and then featured in Parish Publications in September, 1994. I find it still relevant in 2011. Food for thought!
