Children's Sunday School will begin Sunday, September 16, 10-11 am, in the Perkins Education Center. Children K-2<sup>nd</sup> Grade will meet in Room 201, 3<sup>rd</sup>-6<sup>th</sup> in Room 204, and 7<sup>th</sup>-12<sup>th</sup> in the Youth Room. Preschoolers up to age 4 will meet in the Church Nursery. Parents are asked to drop off and pick up their children from their class. Please keep our children and their teachers in your prayers as we begin a new year.

### **Adult Sunday School**

This fall, we begin with three Adult Sunday School Classes. **The Lectionary Class**, which meets in the Library, reads and studies the Bible lessons given for each Sunday of the Church year. **The Women of Faith Class** meets in Room 203, in the Perkins Education Center. And, the **Contemporary Bible Study Class** will discuss the Adam Hamilton Series, *Making Love Last Forever*, in Memorial Hall. As the year goes on, we hope to expand our Adult Sunday School programs to interest as many folks as possible to deepen their walk of faith.

### From the Pastor's Desk

### Belonging

vacationing in August with family in Ocean City, NJ, my second eldest sister Sandy and

I were the first up in the morning. Not wanting to wake the others, we took our coffee and books to the front porch.

A member of Bethany Presbyterian Church, she was reading the Westminster

Confession of Faith drawn up by a puritan clergyman in 1646 to reform the Church of England. For over three and a half centuries various denominations have used this confession as their standard of beliefs. Heavy shore reading... right?

Sandy was reading the Westminster Confession because her congregation recently voted to part ways with the Presbyterian Church USA over the acceptance of homosexuality. They are now in the process of aligning themselves with a more conservative denomination called the Evangelical Presbyterian Church. For her congregation to become part of this new denomination and for Sandy to remain an elder in her

church, they have to pledge their fidelity to... you guessed it... the Westminster Confession.

I, on the other hand, was sitting beside her reading a book by Diana Butler Bass entitled *Christianity After Religion: The End of Church and the Birth of a New Spiritual Awakening.* In her book, Bass explains the alarming downward trend in

> church membership and attendance in America and the growing number of people who are now identifying themselves as "spiritual but not religious."

Rather than despair, she believes that this change in American religious life is part of a new great interreligious

spiritual awakening leading toward personal and cultural transformation. One reaction to these changes in American religious life, she cites, has been for some denominations to splinter, with the more conservative factions circling their wagons around accepted "right belief" or orthodoxy i.e....The Westminster Confession.


Unfortunately, she feels this approach

holds little hope for reaching young people and the "spiritual but not religious" for Christ. For centuries becoming a member of a church required "right belief," followed by "right practice," followed by formal acceptance into a religious community.

But, for the majority of young people today and those who consider themselves as "spiritual but not religious," the way to faith in Christ has now changed.

No longer are younger generations and the "spiritual but not religious" satisfied with being told what they should believe. With many world religions and philosophies to choose from, they want to know why they should believe what the church is telling them. What difference will it make in their life and the world?

Whereas church growth used to follow

faith in action as it is lived out in everyday life. Then the time may come that they may be ready to ask, "Tell me again what it is you believe?"

This way of coming to faith resonates with the Gospels. When Jesus called his first disciples Peter, James and John, he didn't ask them to take a test on the Westminster Confession. Jesus said "Follow me and I will make you fishers of men." It wasn't until they had lived together for some time, and not until after they had observed him preach, teach, and heal the sick, that Jesus finally asked his disciples, "Who do you say that I am?"

### **New Pew Bibles!**

In 2 Timothy 3:16,17 we read, "Every scripture is inspired by God and is useful for teaching, for showing mistakes, for correcting and for training character, so that the person who belongs to God can be equipped to do everything that is good." In the words of our Methodist patriarch John Wesley, we are a "people of the book." A careful reading of the Bible is foundational in understanding who we are as Christians and how we are to live in the world. Without this foundation, we are like a ship without an anchor.

For this reason, I am pleased to announce that on Kick-Off Sunday, September 9, we will dedicate new Pew Bibles during both worship services. Two copies of the New Common English Bible will be placed in each pew for sharing and following along during morning worship. Additional Bibles will be used for our Sunday school programs. These Bibles have been purchased from the Memorial Fund in loving memory of **Norm Dettra** who loved the Bible and faithfully taught the Adult Lectionary Sunday School Class for many years.

### **Sanctuary Renovations Update**

The Trustees are now acquiring additional estimates for sanctuary renovations including: mounting a retractable movie screen and LED projector to the ceiling, floor speakers to the walls, placing flush microphone jacks and outlets behind the communion rail on both sides

of the chancel area, and running all wiring under the floor to a new media center in the back of the sanctuary.

These changes will make our sanctuary safer and the front of the sanctuary less busy to the eye, improve the flow of worship during the early service, and reduce time in transitioning to the second service. Once the Trustees have had the opportunity to review the estimate costs, a decision will be made as to the best way to raise funds. Please stay tuned.

I clung to my mother's skirt, thinking that a fight was going to break out, not really understanding why everyone in the store had burst out laughing. Every time someone would ask for the skirt steak, he'd say, "With or without?" "With or without pleats, of course!"

And then there was always the "chicken feet" routine. When a woman, probably planning to make a hearty soup, asked him, "Do you have chicken feet?" he'd act offended and proclaim, "My feet are perfectly normal."

"You're always so good-natured," I remember my mother telling him. "Hey, I thank God every day for this dream job," he said. "In what other job could a man who looks like me be surrounded by women all day and go home to a steak dinner every night?"

Women (who always did the shopping then) would come in with worry lines creasing their foreheads and crumpled grocery lists written on the back of coupon-stuffed envelopes, but they seemed much more relaxed when they left.

Maybe his jokes weren't new, though they were new to me, but that butcher was an inspiration. He liked people and he showed it, and he helped people who had to count their pennies get through rough days. One of God's helpers on earth, I'm sure.

God, remind me that I don't have to be in a helping profession to help someone. In any job- or none- I can be a helper and a healer.


