I first saw the tall- legged Siberian Husky mix, walking with her retired companion, I did a double take. After turning off West Wyomissing Boulevard onto Jefferson Avenue, and unlike most dogs — who walk in the grass between the sidewalk and road—she was happily and intently strolling along the six inch wide curb, as if she walking on a balance beam. Now, in my 50's, every once in a while I still test my balance by doing the same.

Amused, I opened my window to ask her companion if he'd taught her this trick. He said he couldn't take any of the credit. "It was a practice she came up off across with all by herself."

On my way in to work another morning, at the intersection of Jefferson Boulevard and Cornell Avenue, I witnessed another spectacle. A large crow hovered 10 feet over the road, holding something which looked round, soft, and furry. I stopped and watched as he repeatedly lifted and dropped this object. Finally, I realized that what he was dropping was a mouse. It seems he was attempting to knock it senseless and make it his breakfast. Ever since reading *The* 

Adventures of Anatole the Mouse as a young boy, I've had an affinity for field mice. Opening my window made just enough commotion for Anatole to escape into the safety of a patch of groundcover.

The last sighting I'll mention from this past summer was of a more close-up and intimate variety. Exiting, late one night, out the back of the sanctuary onto Carlisle Road, I was greeted by a shocked and agitated-looking pole cat. I had ap-

parently startled him digging for grubs, and he had immediately taken up a defensive position. Freezing for a moment, I slowly retreated. Then, when we were both at a safe distance, my four-legged friend ran

off across the street and into a neighbor's backyard.

I'm all for surprises like these – even when the potential for minor tragedies exist. Today, we live in a world in which we leave little room for surprises. Working countless hours behind a desk, spending hours in front of a television screen or running from one planned activity to the next, we live under the tyranny of the expected. Such a life engenders a poverty of the soul

This ministry also provides gifts, reading materials and follow-up (by Samaritan's Purse ministry founded by Franklin Graham, son of Billy) to introduce children to Jesus Christ - in over 130 countries. An on-line feature allows one to trace where their box is going.

Over 100,000,000 gift boxes have been distributed through this ministry. Math buffs note – our all-time total represents about 1/125,000<sup>th</sup> of that total, an excellent above average response for one congregation.


