
Baptism

As Jesus looked up, he saw the rich putting their gifts into the temple treasury. He also saw a poor widow put in two very small copper coins. "Truly I tell you," he said, "this poor widow has put in more than all the others." Luke 21:1-3 (NIV)

he flood of e-mails that day told a story of over-whelming human need: a devastating famine in Africa; severe flooding in one part of the United States and a drought in another; two local school-children murdered; unemployment up, poverty up, hunger up. Just reciting the mournful list to a friend left me exhausted and, worse, feeling helpless to make any difference.

"I wish I could do something about all this," I said. "But I'd need 10 million dollars to have an impact, and I don't have 10 million dollars."

"Do you have 10 minutes?" she replied.

"Well, of course. But for what?"

"To write a card to someone grieving. To make a small donation to an organization that can help someone. To pray for those on the front lines." She paused. "I don't have 10 million dollars either, and I know I can't solve all the big problems of the world alone. But I can do something today in just 10 minutes, to answer one specific need. And, if we all answered one need..." My friend was right. Too often I've fallen prey to the idea that only lots of money can make a big difference in a troubled world, and so I've done nothing. Now, instead of my 10-million-dollar lament, I try to live by her 10-minute rule.

How about you? Could you give 10 minutes today? And tomorrow? And the next day?

You have blessed me with much, God. Help me to give back today and every day. Amen.

2014 was a good year at Lincoln Park UMC. Except for a couple of snow cancellations, we were able to worship together every Sunday at the 9 and 11 o'clock hour.

Over the year, we celebrated several special services including Baptisms, a Rite of Confirmation, a Family Day Service, an Anniversary Service (with our District Superintendent, the Rev. Dr. Anita Powell) and an end of the year Love Feast.

There were ongoing programs at the church, including our Sunday School for all ages, the Potter's Wheel class for children 6-12, a Confirmation class, United Methodist Youth, the Agape Group, Monday Bible Study and exercise class, a book club, men's bowling team and breakfasts. Short term programs included *The Long Goodbye*, a five-part series on issues surrounding the end of life, Saturday evening dinners and worship experiences, and a wonderful church music camp ending with Friday evening and Sunday morning performances!

There were also single events including a church golf outing, our annual Church Picnic, and a Christmas Dinner and Celebration.

Once again, our

congregation was active in mission and outreach. Our Youth took a summer mission trip to Washington, DC. Twice a month, our volunteers served lunch at the New Journey Soup Kitchen at South 6th Street in Reading. Every other month, we prepared and served dinner at Opportunity House, a homeless shelter for men, women, and children, on North 2nd Street. And on the third Sunday of every month, our women's Sunday School class prepared homemade soup for the Mohnton Food Pantry.

In November and December, our Mission's Team collected groceries for the New Journey Food Pantry, 49 shoe boxes filled with children's items for Operation Christmas Child, gifts for families in Reading through the Salvation Army Angel Tree ministry, and a workday with Habitat for Humanity renovating

A grateful thanks to the congregation for your faithful financial stewardship of our church. While our commitment to the church includes our prayers, presence, and service, our financial gifts are an important sign of our love for God and God's Church.

For the year 2014, our actual income was \$293,600 representing 101% of what



was hoped for. Our actual expenses were \$281,110, representing 97% of our expected expenses. These

totals left us with a balance for year 2014 of \$12,490.

I hope you are as encouraged as I am by the ongoing financial faithfulness of our congregation. Our financial sacrifice makes possible our life and ministry together in this place and beyond.

May God continue to open our hearts and hands in the coming year.

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The mother hasn't been working, since she cannot find affordable child care. They hoped to receive warm clothing for the family and toys for the children, including a boy 11, girl 8, and girl 6-years old.

Another family consisted of a single parent with nine children, ranging four months to 21 years. The child care problem, along with the need for winter necessities and some surprise toys for children, was the same as for the first family.

The response of our church at Lincoln Park has always been generous, and the Salvation Army has appreciated that they've been able to count on us to help some of the larger and most in-need families on their lists.

All gift tags were taken, including 10 leftover, which were later taken and gifts obtained. Some funds from Missions Designated Offering were used to cover extra expenses.

A special thanks to our members for being timely in bringing gifts this season; stragglers were few. Gifts were transported to the Salvation Army by church members and were distributed by the Salvation Army the Saturday before Christmas.
