

Let Us Pray "Together!"

Would you join me a word of prayer? Let us bow our heads. Let us take a moment for silent prayer!

These are the words we most frequently say or hear during church services. As Christians, we not only worship God every Sunday, but we also participate in fellowship activities, attend Bible studies, and join in various

mission and ministry opportunities. Before, during, and after such worship, activities, or events, we always pray. Why do we pray? Why should we pray? Who should pray?

Every time we do God's ministry or attend any meeting, fellowship event, or Christian education opportunity, we expect God's intervention, guidance, protection, and provision. Unlike other social groups, we are looking beyond what we do. We expect God's presence and the power of the Holy Spirit. For that reason, we pray and believe in the power of prayer. If we don't believe in God's presence and work, we don't need to pray.

But we do believe in God and His presence, power, and provision; so we need to pray before, during, and after whatever we do in the name of God. Prayer is not a ritual like the national anthem before a ball game. Prayer is asking for God's help as we carry out His mission and ministry.

The first thing I do every time I enter the church is pray. Before I meet or share anything with people, I meet God first. I intentionally take time to personally talk to and hear from God first. As a spiritual leader, I ask God to lead me,

guide me, and give me whatever I need to further His kingdom. We need that act of faith, too. So, I suggest that you not only pray before a meal or bedtime, but also try to pray first thing when you

come to church. Before you share a greeting or have fellowship with others, meet God first and take time to talk to God.

Although I am still new to Lincoln Park, I am leading worship, attending committees, and participating in breakfasts, luncheons, and other fellowship events enough to share my observations with you. Because I am new, I can see things you may have become accustomed to, ignored, or don't recognize. With respect to prayer, I was surprised

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by the culture that Lincoln Park is much too dependent on the pastor. The majority at Lincoln Park seems to perceive the pastor as the one in charge of every prayer. Surely, the pastor should be a person of prayer in his/her own journey of faith and should guide others to pray; however, it is a misunderstanding that the pastor is the only one who can or should pray at every meeting, event, or fellowship. The pastor's exclusive duty and role for the church is Word and Sacrament. Prayer is not in that category.

One of the biggest differences between Catholic and Protestant churches is the "priesthood of all believers." We don't need a priest to act as an agent when we confess and talk to God. The pastor is not a mediator between God and you; God desires to communicate with you personally, so you can talk to God anytime, any place, and on any occasion. I came here not as a professional praying person, but as a helper who can shepherd Lincoln Park to become a praying congregation. Remember, Jesus did not teach us how to preach, but how to pray.

My suggestion for you is that you try to lead a prayer, especially if you are a chairperson of a committee or a leader at any gathering. If it is new and hard for you, write down your prayer. If you're asked to lead and pray for the group, do not fear or turn it down.

Our church staff and praise band team have begun to pray together before services every Sunday. We need to encourage and support each other, be one body of Christ, and ask for God's help before we worship His name and glory. For Christians, whether clergy or laity, prayer is our major source of spiritual power and the proof of our intimate relationship with God.

I encourage all Lincoln Park members to pray in private, as well as in public. The pastor is not the designated one to pray.

Each and every one of us is God's child, whom He delights in and wants to hear from. Each one of us has the right and privilege to pray to God directly. So, let us pray "Together!"

Worship Leaders Attend Conference with Praise Team Members

Mark and I were fortunate to attend *Experience Conference* in September, along with two Praise Team members, **Jonathan Chadwick** and **Lindsey Villecco**.

Experience offers quality workshops for leaders, pastors, instrumentalists, vocalists, sound technicians, and other praise team members. Over 1,500 people attended this year, gaining access to the most current music and trends in Christianity today.

Throughout *Experience 2017*, we "experienced:"

- Five general sessions featuring compelling pastors, worship leaders, and inspirational speakers, plus seven artists and bands at the forefront of Contemporary Christian Music, sharing stories and new music.
- A night of *Worship in the Round* no projectors, lighting effects, backing tracks just a keyboard, a few acoustic instruments, and over 1,000 voices praising God!
- Five breakout training sessions with classes and guidance, including:
- **→** running effective rehearsals
- + crafting inviting sound, and
- → using the latest technology.

We shared stories with worship leaders from around the country -- our accomplishments, struggles, and insights.

We discussed keeping the focus on God amid the challenges and about creating unity within our team, church, and pastors. Finally, we were encouraged to spend time alone with God during our weeks, so that on Sunday mornings we'd be overflowing with worship!



From Lindsey Villecco

I'm so thankful for my involvement at the Experience Conference 2017. I learned cherished things: not only about techniques and skills, but also about drawing closer to the Lord.

I took away that if you're spending more time with your craft than with Jesus, there's a problem. I was reminded to focus on the Lord and grow closer to Him, and that the goal of a church needs to be about praising God. My goal will be to get people singing and praising the Lord.

It's important to know your congregation so you can sing words to the people who need them, based on their struggles at the moment. God wants and enjoys NEW songs – and I heard new songs great for congregational singing. I learned that the best worship is modeled by what the angels do: "Sing to God about God."

On Passing the Peace

Passing the Peace is a universal Christian term, practiced since ancient church times. Today, the UMC uses Passing the Peace in the UMC Book of Worship, in the UMC Hymnal, and in many resources on its official website:

Accordingly, the root of passing the peace is found in the Bible. As we say to one another, Peace be with you, we remember the greeting Jesus himself used with his disciples (Luke 24:36; John 20:19, 26), as well as his teaching for us to become peacemakers (Matthew 5:9; 2Cor. 5:20). Since the apostle Paul used in his letters Grace and peace be with you (Romans 1:7; 1Cor. 1:3; 2Cor. 1:2), the early Christians have used Peace be with *vou* as a Christian exercise to become peacemakers - followers of Jesus, the prince of peace. Therefore, Christian churches, regardless of denomination, have traditionally maintained this unique greeting in the order of Christian worship as The Peace or Passing the Peace.

Passing the peace might feel strange to some Christians, and some have abandoned the practice, opting instead for a more colloquial greeting, *Hi*, *how are you?* However, every act in our worship is



not just a simple ritual, but an expression with profound meaning, which can be a means of grace; passing the peace is certainly one such expression. Therefore please choose during this time not to fall back on the greeting: *How was your week?* but to share the peace of God, since we identify with Jesus who gave us his life to make peace with humanity (1 Cor. 1:20-21).

During the passing of peace, we may leave our seats, turn to neighbors, grasp hands, and speak the words, *The peace of the Lord be with you* and receive in return, *And also with you*. By the weekly exercise of passing the peace, when we extend our hands to one another, we acknowledge the peace that comes from the forgiving grace of God, and confirm our vocation to be peacemakers, just as Jesus Christ our Lord breathed upon the disciples, "Peace be with you."

Advent Is for Filling Up On Hope

We have this as a sure and steadfast anchor of the soul, a hope that enters into the inner place behind the curtain, where Jesus has gone as a forerunner on our behalf......Hebrews 6:19-20 (ESV)

A hush fell as the lights dimmed to near darkness and the speaker described the condition of the world the Baby Jesus would be born into.

God's people had long been oppressed by the Roman government. Those were dark days back then, full of hopelessness for the Israelites. The somber mood in the worship center deepened the sense of hopelessness. It seemed we could feel a fraction of what the Israelites had felt.
