

Coming Out of Lenten Bible Study

Whenever I offer a short-term Bible Study, I pray that God will bring those who want to learn, so they may desire more of the Word of God and live bearing much fruit of the Word, in Christian discipleship. I'm grateful that 12 to 20 people gathered every Thursday night during Lent to share a simple meal,

watch a DVD lesson on *The Path to the Cross* by Ray Vander Laan, and learn and discuss the lesson in detail. I want to say to those who prepared soup and salad each Thursday night: *Thank you!*

As I received positive feedback from those who attended, I gave thanks to God for the opportunity for us to learn the Word with new insight. Still, a question remains: So what? If you're a lifetime member of a church, you've probably attended many Bible studies (or maybe none?). The number doesn't really matter, but what matters is the changes the Bible study brought into people's lives. It's a question of transformation or discipleship in your life as a Christian.



I want to share with you our last session of our Bible Study on discipleship. The English word "disciple" does not fully convey its biblical meaning. We can find it in the Hebrew word for "disciple" – *Talmid (Talmidim*, pl.). In

Jesus' time, the *talmid* willingly left home, family, and occupation so they could be with the rabbi (teacher), and learn how the rabbi lived and taught his understanding of the Scripture. Imagine Jesus' 12 disciples (*talmidim*) who listened to their teacher Jesus, memorized his words, watched him, followed him, and imitated his way

of living (his walk with God). Eventually, the *talmid* became a teacher who was followed by his own disciples (*talmidim*).

If we are asked, "Are you a disciple of Christ Jesus?" we should not understand the question as "Do you attend a church and do some good works?" but as: "Are you a *talmid* of Jesus Christ, an imitator of Christ?" If we want to become Je-

sus' disciples, we need to be with him all the time to learn from and follow

him, so that we can fully imitate him.

Even though we cannot be with Jesus physically, we are given the Word of God, the Bible, which conveys Jesus' teaching and life. Also, from the moment we confess Jesus as our Savior and Lord, the Spirit of God is with us and guides our walk with Jesus. Therefore, our way of discipleship cannot begin or be completed without reading the Bible. Only when we PSALM 119:105, NRSV

read and thereby know the Bible can we become true disciples of Jesus Christ, or in other words, imitators of Jesus Christ: praying as he prayed, loving as he loved, serving as he served, dying as he died, and living as he lived. For this holy and happy purpose of becoming disciples of Christ Jesus, we, the Lincoln Park Church family, gather together in the name of Jesus.


If we don't read the Bible, we won't know how to become a Christian disciple. If we don't know how Jesus walked with God, how can we say that we follow him? Ironically, there are many churches out there whose leadership is

not centered in Christian discipleship because they don't know how to follow Jesus. Why? They don't read the Bible, and they don't know what they don't know. Their leaders may be professional engineers, businessmen, or educators, who run their churches according to their own knowledge, experience, or common sense instead of the Word of God. Thus, it is not uncommon for such churches to lose their

identity as Christian disciples.

Lincoln Park Community UMC family! Do you want to become a true disciple of Jesus Christ? Do you want to serve Jesus as your Lord? Know first who Jesus is by reading the Bible. Without knowing who Jesus our Lord is, you cannot become his disciple, because you don't know where and how to follow. When we follow Jesus, Jesus is our Lord. But if we follow our professional experiences, we are our lord.

Do It For Grandma

My grandson Finn and I disagreed about this: shorts or long pants on a chilly day? I eventually pleaded, *Do it for Grandma*, and that did the trick. Later, when I had a minor kerfuffle with his cousin, Finn tugged my sleeve, *Tell him to do it for Grandma!*

My husband and I are blessed with nine grandchildren, whom we see frequently. We fill our calendars with their games, recitals, cherub choir performances, concerts, and days and nights of "hanging out" as we babysit. I never dreamed we'd be so lucky!

It's fun, but I also feel that we might have a bit of "pull" on these little and not-so-little ones. And, I'm surprised and touched when a small word or song we've shared seems to take root in their hearts and souls. For instance...

Years ago I told **Jonathan**, our oldest grandchild, that when my sister and I heard an ambulance, we prayed for the people inside. Sometime later his Mom and I were travelling when we heard sirens. She said (proudly, of course) "Jonathan says he prays for people in ambulances."

And, when two-year-old Elin Jean

returned home after staying with us for a week, she asked her Mom at bedtime for the *Jesus Song*.

Recently I've been inspired by Kay Swatkowski's book, *A Grandmother's Prayers*. She tells of her visit to Notre Dame Cathedral in Paris with her husband and four children: She was touched by a path — well-worn by the footsteps of

"thousands upon thousands" of others who had circled that altar through eight centuries... "longing to find... to serve... to know God." She thought of her part in an "endless line of Christians... walking a holy path traveled by millions before us."

Swatkowki encourages us to think about our own spiritual heritage. Who was ahead of us in that line of Christians? I think first of my grandfather Edison Giles, who died when I was a toddler. I know little about him, but my mother said his favorite hymn was *Guide Me O Thou Great Jehovah*. He must have put his trust in God. Oddly, whenever I hear it, I am touched.

My Mother was also a great believer, who played hymns on the piano often, quoted Norman Vincent Peale, left me a desk full of inspirational material and many scraps of paper with encouraging

Jesus Is Our Master Gardener

I am the true vine, and my Father is the gardener. He cuts off every branch in me that bears no fruit, while every branch that does bear fruit he prunes

Pruning the roses in my backyard is one of my least favorite things to do. The rose bush that leans up against our

gardening shed is about seven years old. Some of the stalks are as thick as tree branches. I almost always prick my fingers on a few of the thorns when I'm trimming the bushes. Even with gloves on. And then when I go to prune the climbing rose that is against the fence, I tend to lop off the upper-

most branches awkwardly, and they fall on my head. So, I usually end up with a few scratches on my forehead.

But every year, I put on my thick gloves and go after it. Because I love

how the climbing rose blooms and cascades across the back fence. And I love how my rose bush begins to fill out with

huge, old fashioned, yellow roses at the first hint of spring warmth. I know that if I don't trim them back when it gets cold, they won't grow to their full potential when it gets warm.

That is what Jesus does when He disciplines us. He is trimming off all of the deadweight.

He wants us to flourish in every area of our life. The process of pruning is painful. We don't like it when Jesus begins to trim and prune and shape our lives using trials and daily circumstances. But we do want to become all that Jesus created us to be. So, let's let Jesus do His

LPCUMC is a church, not a social gathering. It means that we are a disciple-making community of faith in Jesus Christ. Church leaders at LPCUMC should be aligned with God's will, which you can find only by reading the Bible. When you don't read the Word of God, how can you say you know God's will? Without knowing which direction to lead, how can you make decisions for the church? When we don't know God's vision for us, how can we dare to say we are doing alright for God's church? Do you want to become Jesus' disciple? Let us take our first step by reading the Bible:

"We know that we have come to know him if we keep his commands. Whoever says, "I know him," but does not do what he commands is a liar, and the truth is not in that person. When my sister was sick with cancer, we went with her to Sloan Kettering and other hospitals for opinions and further surgeries. Once, while waiting for what always seemed to be bad news, my mother said, "I can't get this hymn out of my head," singing a verse of Be Not Dismayed, with its refrain, God Will Take Care of You. I'm glad she did because I'd never heard this hvmn that would comfort me in the months to come as my sister worsened and died at age 41.

I remember a snippet from a sermon by **The Rev. Don Zeiter** when he was pastor here in the 80's...he said he was always amazed when he'd find his grandmother on her knees, talking to God about the daily happenings in her life, trusting in God to guide her.

What an opportunity it is to be part of this endless line of Christians. We can give our grandchildren our love, support, and gracious words. We can tell our stories, and show them our trust and faith in God. We can say, Come along with us and get in line! And, if necessary, Do it for Grandma!
