

Reflecting on One Year of Ministry at Lincoln Park

It's already been one year! It feels like yesterday that I came to Lincoln Park for the first time. When I reflect on last year's ministry here, I give thanks to God and the Lincoln Park family. This has been a time of change and transition for Lincoln Park with the transfer of a be-

loved pastor who served the congregation twice, as associate and later senior pastor, the appointment of a new pastor, even a couple pastors, and Koreans at that! However, under the guidance and care of the Holy Spirit, we are overcoming the obstacles that once seemed too hard to bear in the depths of our hearts.

SunAe and I have been well received, and I deeply appreciate the love and acceptance from Lincoln Park.

As I said in my first sermon, since my ministry is cross-cultural/racial (Korean pastors serving an Anglo congregation), we need time to understand one another. I believe in building trust first and then proceeding with ministry and mission. For this, SunAe and I started visit-

ing members in the church family to get to know each of you. From July 2017 until now, we have visited around 92 houses and met more than 181 family members (over 90% of Sunday service attenders). We can remember your name and face, and we've appreciated

your welcome and hospitality. You know this means we know where you sit at church, so don't miss service!

SunAe started a new Wednesday Bible Study; now more than 10 people gather every Wednesday morning to study the Bible and share their lives. During Lent, SunAe provided a six-

week, evening Lenten Bible Study for those who work during daytime, with volunteers providing soup and salad. Each week, more than 15 people learned and enjoyed this unique study session. The response and feedback were very positive. As co-pastor, SunAe will continually focus on her teaching ministry and try to provide various Sunday school classes or Bible studies.

As promised, I spent one year observing and participating, and I followed how Lincoln Park ran. I did break my promise a little by tweaking a few things I thought did not need to wait a whole year (we celebrated our financial campaign, shortening it from a month to one Sunday; we reduced sending out envelopes from six-seven times to three times a year; we established the third Sunday of September as our Anniversary Sunday). You might be worried that now I am going to make big waves. Don't worry! After experiencing a full one-year cycle, there are a few areas in our worship order that I believe could, with consultation from our Worship Committee, benefit from some rearrangement or omission.

SunAe and I will also establish a visitation program for people who can't come to church but want to receive Holy Communion. Every odd month (January, March, May, July, September, and November), after Communion Sunday, the first Tuesday of the month will be set aside for this special visitation. If you contact Marilyn, our Church Secretary, we'll set aside a specific time to meet your request.

SunAe will facilitate and guide our **Praise Band Retreat, July 27-28**. A few members historically participated in the Experience Conference in Florida; this year we'll try something different. We are inviting a pastor and professional worship leader to come and lead a

weekend program for our praise band only. They'll evaluate where they are now and learn what to improve.

SunAe will also recruit and educate more volunteers for Children's Moment for both services. Thankfully, 19 new volunteers from both services have responded to this invitation; it will give more opportunities for people to rotate and rest. This will not only be a good lesson for our children, but also a path to developing teachers for children's ministry, as well as a way to invite more children to come to our church.

I also plan to start a sermon series this fall reflecting on Lincoln Park's mission, ministry, and future, based on my one-year observation. Many times, when we do the same thing over and over out of habit, there's a chance we might lose why we do what we do, or which is a priority vs. secondary. With a newcomer's perspective, I want to share what we've been doing well and how we can do even better.

God has been so faithful to our ministry at Lincoln Park, and we could not have had such a wonderful first year without our talented, faithful staff members. I want to especially thank Bev, Mark, Becky, Kyle, Marilyn, and Carl, who have each shared their God-given talents with this entire congregation. I pray that God will continually use SunAe and me this coming year, just as he did last year, for His will and His church, Lincoln Park. Thank you for your support and prayers; I look forward to serving God another year with you.


