Order for Sunday Worship and Bulletin to Change

Starting the first Sunday of September, the format of our bulletin will change. We currently use a four-page booklet format with inserts. After a year of observing and preparing, we've decided to switch to a six-sided format Bulletins without inserts. The font size will be the same, but we'll use our space more efficiently. Similar information will be together in one area, while unnecessary information will be omitted. If necessary, we'll include inserts

The first service will use the same six-sided bulletin, but with its own worship order. So far, the first service did not have bulletins but shared the same insert with the second service

For the second service, there will be a small change in worship order.

For better worship flow, we'll do Children's Moment, Sharing Joys and Concerns, Pastoral Prayer, and Passing the Peace at the beginning of the service. We will not do the Prayer of Confession.

Silent Prayer, the Word of Assurance. Instead, pastors will include the Prayer of Confession in their Pastoral Prayer. For the congregation's convenience, the Lord's Prayer will appear in the bulletin (in rotating versions each

If you have any questions, please feel free to contact the pastors. We'll go with this new format for at least one year, unless there's a huge problem along the way.

The **SUMMER MINI-CONCERT SEASON** has come to a close but leaves us with warm memories of the concerts. Our gratitude is two-fold: Thanks to our talented church musicians and guests from the community who shared their gifts with us, and thanks to our congregation for supporting the Concert Fund and attending the



programs. We had several new artists this summer and look forward to including more next summer. It's never too early to give me the names of additional solo musicians or groups. We plan to offer a few mini-concerts at 10:45 through the year.

A WORKSHOP FOR OUR BELL CHOIR will be held Sunday, October 14, immediately following the 11 am service. The workshop will be led by Ron Bellamy, a handbell artist from Lancaster. He's been a performer and clinician for Hand Bell Exploration, the Hand Bell Musicians of America, Solo/Ensemble Extravaganza, and has directed several massed ringing workshops. Ron is presently directing five hand bell choirs at four churches in Lancaster. Ron performed here at LP several years ago for a mini-concert. The afternoon begins with a lunch for our ringers followed by a two-hour workshop with emphasis on special ringing techniques.



A Solo Hand Bell Concert by Ron Bellamy will begin at 4 pm in the sanctuary. The entire congregation is invited and encouraged to attend. Let's fill the sanctuary. You'll be amazed at Ron's abilities. The question for the day will be *How can he possibly ring all those bells with only two hands?* Come out and find out!

Rebuilding and Strengthening **Our Children's Moment in Worship**

As I shared in my last column, since last July we've seen new teachers leading Children's Moment at both services. Previously, two teachers (Bev and Becky) took turns, with Kyle, Nancy/Lindsey, or **Betsv** helping occasionally. This year, Pastor SunAe recruited and educated

more leaders for Children's Moment for both services. Thankfully, 20 new volunteers have responded to the invitation, giving leaders the opportunity to rotate and rest. This will not only be a good lesson for our chil-

dren, but also a path toward developing teachers for children's ministry, and a way to invite more children to our church.

To equip new teachers, we've planned an introductory meeting to guide them and give instructions on September 9.

There may be concerns as we rebuild this special ministry, so I want to offer some answers and assurance. One concern is about lack of participation from children, despite having plenty of teachers lined up to grow this ministry. Some Sundays, no children show up, and I don't doubt that it will happen again. I

don't worry about this issue because it's a natural growing pain when we adopt a new system. If we wait until we have enough children to teach, we'll never see a day of having enough children, or we'll be unprepared. Just as we have our nursery and nursery attendants, we

first need to be ready for "Children started to the vision we dream of. and God will send us children near and far.

> Second, there's a concern among new teachers about what to teach. Ideally our Children's Moments would go along

with the same Scripture or lesson as the pastor's sermon. That way, we'd have a service that flows and connects through one theme. However, there's absolutely no reason to always match the Children's Moment to the pastor's sermon. Sometimes, the Scripture is difficult for children to understand or too graphic or violent. As long as we share a lesson from the Bible, whether it ties to the sermon or is independent is unimportant.

Third, some congregants expect the pastor to be a part of Children's Mo-

ment. It would be a good contact point between pastors and children, and I fully understand this opinion. Yet, there is a big factor that we need to consider. As

pastors whose mother tongue is not English and thus, having strong accents, we are cautious about teaching children in a direct leadership role. Unlike adults, who understand our background and take time

to consider our speech, our children are innocent, honest, and straight forward. If they don't understand, they'll immediately respond with "What?" or eventually lose interest. SunAe and I have had this experience before, and we do not want to become any sort of barrier.

One of my favorite Bible verses is, Everything is permissible, but not everything is beneficial (1 Cor.10:23). If Children's Moment were for pastors to practice their public speech skills, we'd willingly do it. However, Children's Moment is for children. And for the sake of our children, we believe it's more beneficial for the church to work behind the scenes, preparing our teachers with good content and resources, and nurturing church leadership through new teachers.

Don't worry – SunAe and I take every opportunity to connect with our children and don't plan to stop, whether it be through VBS, the Valentine's Day event,

or a comprehensive lesson for parents and children on the meaning of Holy Communion.

I want to share a wonderful experience I personally had regarding Children's Moment. When I began at

my previous church 12 years ago, only five or six children came each Sunday. However, the congregation came together with a vision in faith for children's ministry. I recruited and trained willing teachers with potential, and, through prayer and active support, we experienced God's amazing miracle. Children started to come, followed by their parents, who brought friends, too. Eventually, our children's ministry blossomed. My last Children's Moment on Easter Sunday was unforgettable. I saw 26 little children run from the pews to listen to the children's sermon.


SunAe and I have the same dream and vision in faith here at Lincoln Park, and we are looking forward to your prayers and support for this precious ministry for the congregation to come.

In September we begin our fall kickoff. We'll meet over the Labor Day weekend and begin Sunday School on September 23.


From **Beverly Perella**, Children's Ministry Coordinator

As your spiritual leader, I'd like to share with you about worship and spiritual leadership as we make this change to our worship order. The ordained elders' - your pastors' - role and responsibility at the local church is the Word and Sacrament. We have learned, trained, and experienced for years how to preach, how to lead a spirit-filled worship service, and how to conduct the Holy Communion. Other administrative decisions (Council, Trustees, Finance, SPRC, or Mission) can be made by faithful, talented laity, but this Word and Sacrament belongs to the ordained pastor. Worship cannot be maintained or changed by personal preference or majority rule. That is not how church works and never has never been the case. We serve an Audience of One. Thus, please trust your pastors and follow their biblical, theological, and spiritual guidance in this area. Again, if you need any more clarity, SunAe and I can answer your questions.

The sleep of a labouring man is sweet... Ecclesiastes 5:12 (KJV)

When I was 13, I got my first job working for a local contractor. During those long, hot days hauling bricks, I gained a respect for craftsmen, an ad-

miration for those who labor, and a realization that when I grew up I wanted to wear a suit and work in a climate-controlled office.

Years later, celebrating the long weekend of Labor Day at our family's cabin, my feet were bare, and shorts and a T-shirt replaced my usual jacket and tie. The

kids were splashing in the lake, the sun was high, and a slight breeze was blowing through the pine trees. That's when the carefully laid concrete blocks that make up our cabin caught my eye. My grandfather had built this place 50 years earlier with his big hands and a happy spirit. Knowing him, I was sure he labored with a dream of all the good times his family would have here.

Labor. We all have our own style of work, and it's pretty amazing how it

comes together. Bridges and roads, skyscrapers and modest houses, plumbing, electricity, the cars we drive, the foods we eat, health-care workers, service in-

Today, I pause to give thanks for this concrete-block cabin and the road that brought me here, for the food we'll enjoy tonight and all the other amenities of the good life, which the labor of others

affords. And, as I walk down to the shore, ready to dive into the lake, I smile at the good news of Jesus's words: *Come...all who labor...and I will give you rest*. Matthew 11:28, RSV.
