

Our **Salvation Army Adopt-A-Family Angel Tree** will be up the Sunday after Thanksgiving – **November 25**. Gifts will be collected up to Sunday, **December 16**. We plan to assist two-three families, totaling around 10 folks.

The Missions Committee and Salvation Army want to thank our church family for their response to the Angel Tree last year. We helped two families, totaling nine individuals. One family was a widowed mother with three boys, living with her mother. The other was a newly single mother with three girls, one of whom had taken a job to help with bills. Gift requests were daily needs items like winter clothing, boots, simple toys or crafts for children, household items. All items placed on the tree were taken by generous folks who wanted to help make the season a little better for those whose needs are great. In addition, individuals who made donations for gift cards to Giant and Wal-Mart allowed these folk to make some choices of their own.


Grateful to God for the Nurture Committee's Ministry at LPCUMC

Last year, through the Committee on Nominations and Leadership Development, we re-formed the Nurture Committee as an umbrella committee for many groups that have led fellowship and car-

ing ministries at LP Church. Led by **Barbara Leas**, this Committee focuses on the ministry of nurture in fellowship, providing opportuni-



As our first project, before Valentine's Day, the Nurture Committee held a Sweetness of God's Love event. For this event, members of the committee met several times, planned, and shared tasks, while decorating the Memorial Fellowship Hall with colorful tables, making chocolate candies, hosting each table with games, bagging goodies for shutins, and managing the photo booth. We were open to any and all ideas: Linda Woll's daughter, Olivia, gave input that

was especially creative, and we were happy to be guided by this sweet teen's direction.

One memory that all the committee members hold dear is that a man named

Joe came to this sweet event. He had come to the first service that morning and shared his prayer request that he had only one week left to live, according

to his doctors. We invited him to come to Sweetness of God's Love, and he did. How Joe enjoyed the sweet cookies and lime punch, how he smiled every time he filled his cup and grabbed a cookie. He came back to church the following Sunday. He passed away after three weeks, but those of us who met him that afternoon at Sweetness of God's Love knew that even though not all the congregation came for this event, we had enough reason to share God's love that particular Sunday. The goodie bags filled with hand-made chocolates and candies were to be given to shutins. For that purpose, the Nurture Committee wrote cards and visited them to deliver God's love.

The Committee's second project was making *Welcoming Bags* for visitors. After compiling ideas and hearing the Worship Committee's input, researching prices for months, and receiving **Linda Mann**'s donation of pens with the church logo, **Barbara Leas** made the first 50 Welcoming Bags. Now, we're ready to make more as we're pleased to see the diminishing number of bags left over.

For our third project, *National* Night Out, in August, we updated our church brochure and made flyers for Anniversary Sunday, to invite the wider community to our church. Every time we met, a new idea arose. We painted stones with magnets, decorated a frame with weaving ribbons, did face painting ... Our enthusiasm grew as we received 240 bags of pretzels free from Sturgis Pretzels. Although the National Night Out was cut short by rain, the Nurture Committee felt grateful to the many church members who came out to meet the community. Above all, we were grateful because through the preparatory meetings, each of us enjoyed being on the committee as we built our relationships through the ministry events.

The fourth project of the Nurture Committee was celebrating our **Anniversary Sunday** in a special way: through a Puppet Show and Potluck Picnic. Though some of us were worried about the number of people who might come based on past picnic experience, we prayed for good weather and planned willingly. Thanks be to God, we had plenty of food that was all consumed. It was an event where we as the church gathered inter-generationally, from both Contemporary and Traditional Services. It was filled with laughter, relaxation, food, comfortable chatting, and drawing on tables and faces. This gathering of about 70 people was truly exciting and encouraging for the Nurture Committee's ministry.

The Committee's last project this year will be our **Christmas Party (on December 2)**, which has been led by **Beverly Perella** for many years. We began our preparatory meetings under **Barb**'s leadership as soon as **Bev** asked us to take charge.

I love each of the ladies on the Committee. Their willingness to serve the church with their best talent is evident, as we heard them say *I can* or *I will do* and *Let's do* or *I agree*, encouraging one another's ideas. Have you heard a comment at a committee discussion such as *That's an awesome idea! You're smart to think of apple sauce for a Christmas Party!* Yes, there'll be applesauce and other dishes along with Redner's fried chicken. We'll keep our tradition of Santa's Workshop,

Over the last few months, our ministry has been placing an emphasis on two areas: prayer and outreach. We've had several events specifically geared for our students to reach out to friends and invite them to our Summit Youth Ministry program. One very successful event was our annual trip to the corn maze.

We've also been placing a heavy emphasis on prayer through the fall semester. As a ministry we're completing a 4-week video series with small group discussion on the importance, practice, power and styles of prayer. This will lead into a *speaking* series on different prayers, and ways people have prayer through the Christian tradition. At the end of the small groups and the eventual speaking series, the kids are challenged to go into a time of individual prayer for a set amount of time. Our goal as a ministry is to move our kids from a prayer time of five minutes to near 20 to 30 minutes of prayer.

As for upcoming events, we have two coming in November and more.

NOVEMBER 2 - MOSAIC CONFERENCE Worship Night in Lebanon County. This is a no cost event.

NOVEMBER 16 - RE-VERB

I kept my eyes closed for a moment after waking. I wanted to savor the feeling of thankfulness. God had been healing me, and I had been learning to live with the changes and continuing pain from my fall. The journey since my broken collarbone and cracked rib led my husband, Charlie, and me to put our condominium on the market. We were better at trusting God and had accepted an offer for the purchase price, a blessing in our recession-struck city. Today, I felt a moment of bliss.

Then, Charlie walked into our room. "The buyer pulled out." "No!" I closed my eyes and howled in sadness and frustration. I could see the future we thought God had provided us collapsing into one big mess.

Another fall. Another mistake. Another accident. The doubts and depressing thoughts overwhelmed me. I was tired of trying to think positive. What

did God want from me? What was I supposed to learn from this?

I opened my eyes and saw Charlie seated on the edge of the bed, head in hands, his back to me. Abruptly, the packed boxes, the vision of Christmas

in the gleaming new apartment, my self-pity were all swept away. This man, who had done so much for me, loved me through everything, was hurting as much as —maybe even more than— I was. He counted on my faith to strengthen his.

I wrapped my arms around Charlie. "It's Thanksgiving time. We're together. And I can hug you with both arms. Who knows what God has planned for us next?"
