Congregation Meets for Lunch and Much More



Many of us gathered for a delicious "covered-dish" lunch, a dedication of the Davidheiser Memorial Kitchen, and an informational meeting on Sunday, January 6. We knew in advance that the topic of the meeting would be the United Methodist Church's upcoming General Conference (February 23-26). In St Louis, Missouri, 864 delegates from around the world will discuss and vote on

a controversial issue: church unity and homosexuality. The vote could have serious repercussions for many UM churches.

Jack Villecco and Richard Auman led the program, explaining the situation to about 60 people. I'll try to recap what we learned.

Perhaps you've heard of the Book of



Discipline for The UMC worldwide. It contains some rules that have been challenged (since 1972) regarding human sexuality. The current Book of Discipline states in 304.3:

- The practice of homosexuality is incompatible with Christian teaching. Therefore,
- self-avowed practicing homosexuals are not to be

certified as candidates, ordained as ministers or appointed to serve in the UMC.

- 161C states: the marriage covenant is shared fidelity between a man and a woman.
- 341.6 states: ceremonies that celebrate homosexual unions shall not

After Sermon Series, and Then What?

I hope you enjoyed the wonderful Advent and Christmas season with your family, friends, and church. I pray that you and your family are healthy in body and spirit, and that your prayers will be answered in this New Year. I also have great expectations for our loving God to continually bless Lincoln Park as we strive to do our best in Christ. January is

always a good time look back on what happened last year and plan for what we're looking forward to with hope and excitement.

For three Sundays last fall, I delivered a sermon series about Lincoln Park. As new spiritual leaders, Su-

nAe and I had faithfully visited almost the entire congregation, in their homes or ours, or at the Church Office (99 families and 192 people so far). We also attended all our church's worship events, concerts, picnics at parishioners' homes, fellowship breakfasts, lunch gatherings, committees, and meetings. We intentionally took only one Sunday off for vacation because we wanted to be entrenched in the church's daily happenings.

We listened, watched, experienced, heard encouragement, received feedback,

sometimes felt disappointment, and sometimes found hope. Because you have all been part of Lincoln Park for so long, SunAe and I realized that you may not see some of the things we have seen.

As most of you know by now, I have

written in my daily journal for the last 35 years every night, and many of my entries this past year include what I've seen and learned at Lincoln Park. The sermon series in the fall was a reflection of what I observed, experienced, and reflected

upon through these entries. It was an opportunity to honestly evaluate where we are now as a church, and move forward to restore, recover, and revive our church.

If I did not see hope for a greater future here, I would not have spent time and energy telling you where and how we can be better. I know some things were harder to hear than others, but I also believe that it was a necessary, albeit uncomfortable, reality check to be-

come more forward-thinking and forward-acting for our church's future. I truly hope that this series provided you with a fresh perspective for Lincoln Park

During this series, I also shared two visions that I believe God has for Lincoln Park. The first is that Lincoln Park will be an outward-focused congregation. Lincoln Park does an excellent job with inward ministry. Now it's time to balance out. Let us turn our eyes beyond our doors and reach out to our community with acts of love and the message of salvation in the name of Jesus Christ!

The second vision is that Lincoln Park will not be content with *Banker's Stewardship* but become a more disciplined congregation of *Christian Stewardship*. We are the body of Christ, not just any other social organization. Thus, I believe Lincoln Park can become a place that testifies to our faith in God's provision and our financial discipline based on the Bible. Godly financial integrity means not only collecting, managing, or saving, but also spending in a biblical way. Our money is not what we save, but what we spend.

WHAT ARE OUR NEXT STEPS?

We must have a follow-up plan of action to make our visions become reality. I would like to share a few focal points of the pastoral plan for 2019 based on these visions and the sermon series:

- † First, we need to invite family, friends, and neighbors to our church as often as possible. If you truly enjoy Lincoln Park, its people, its fellowship and hospitality, and its message each Sunday, it should be a natural and spontaneous act for us all to invite anyone around us to church. Don't worry about whether they'll come or not; our job is to invite, and God will take care of the rest.
- † Second, I continually encourage and ask for more members to step up for God's mission and ministry.

 Not just certain people changing hats each year; rather, more new committee chairs and members, lectors, Sunday School teachers, children's sermon teachers, Breakfast Sunday volunteers, devotion leaders for Men's Breakfast, and helping hands for the many fellowship events to come.

 Each and every one of us is called to serve, not to be served.
- † Third, we need to strengthen and support our Contemporary Service and Praise Band, not as a style of worship but as our future. We must seek the best way to encourage them spiritually and financially so they

Church Kitchen Consecrated in Memory of the Davidheisers

Harvey and Evelyn Davidheiser were remembered on January 6 in a Service of Consecration for our refurbished Church Kitchen. They were faithful members at LP Church for many years, always ready to serve, always ready to greet you with enthusiasm.

Harvey (1918-2007) served in the Army Signal Corps in the 40's and was a self-employed freight broker for 30 years. Evelyn (1921-2017) was a Penn State graduate and a Home Economics teacher.

Our kitchen has had a number of improvements through the efforts of **Cindy Kercher**, **Michelle Ringler**, and **Andy** and **Diane Boyd**. An upright freezer was purchased to replace smaller ones. Two fire resistant walls near the oven now improve fire safety. A closet adjacent to Memorial Hall was converted to storage, so countertops may be clear. A hot dog roller machine was purchased.

be conducted by our ministers...and shall not be conducted in our churches.

A recent update from our **Bishop Peggy A. Johnson** states that these rules have been debated and voted on repeatedly since 1972 but have remained the same, although additions have been included, like: We implore families and churches not to reject or condemn lesbians and gay members and friends.

In 2016, the UMC Bishops organized a diverse group of lay people and clergy as the *Commission for the Way Forward*, to prayerfully study the issues and develop recommendations. In February 2018, the Commission presented three possible plans to the Council of Bishops:

TRADITIONAL PLAN...affirms the current rules and philosophies in *The Book of Discipline* about homosexuality, including the ban on same-gender marriages/unions and ordination of homosexuals.

ONE CHURCH PLAN...removes all of the restrictive language in the *Book of Disci- pline* about homosexuality, ordination, and same-gender marriages. It also protects the rights of clergy who feel they cannot perform these marriages or ordain LGBTQ persons.

CONNECTIONAL CONFERENCE

PLAN...replaces the current five US (geographical) jurisdictions with three

branches: Traditional (Conservative), One-Church (Unity in Diversity), and Progressive (Liberal). Each would have its own Book of Discipline. The three Conferences would have one core of shared doctrine and services.

- First, pray for the future of our church as a denomination, especially from 2:23 to 2:26 am or pm daily, using resources from UM-Prays.org.
- If possible, engage in a weekly Wesley Fast (after dinner on Thursday until noon on Friday.)
- Study Scripture, books, and articles on this subject.
- Discuss the issues with our pastors, leaders, and friends at church.
- Form your own opinions.


