UMC Delegates Choose Traditional Plan

On Sunday morning, March 3, **Pastor KyungMo Koo** spoke to our congregation about the controversial decision voted upon at the UMC General Conference in February. Delegates from all over the world voted on proposals to change its current rules prohibiting the ordination of homosexuals and the performance of same-gender marriages by UM clergy. The vote (438-384) favored the Traditional Plan, reaffirming the current bans against ordination and marriage.

It was a very hard decision said Pastor Koo, For some there's been disappoint-

ment while for others there's relief. As always, UM churches welcome all people to their fellowship, sharing communion and lay leadership. Pastor Koo suggests "It's time to accept and to pray for our unity."

Preparing for Young Mothers' Spiritual Retreat at Lincoln Park Community UMC



To be a mother is a holy vocation. To provide our children with well-being, it's not enough to offer material and physical feeding; we mothers are also

responsible for raising our children through spiritual nourishment. However, to fulfill this task, mothers must be *spiritually charged* enough to share with their children. That is the main reason we're offering a spiritual retreat for young mothers.

Young mothers with babies and toddlers need special attention from the church family regarding their faith formation. Be-

cause their priorities lie with children and family, most of them find it difficult to attend adult faith formation programs, such as Adult Sunday School or other Bible classes. Therefore, one session a week for four weeks (each lasting two hours) will be appropriate for their spiritual retreat.

Why young mothers? Becoming a mother doesn't end at the delivery room. Rather, to give birth to a child is to begin an endless job; a *hands-full*

and *mind-full* job. That means there's no time for a break from motherhood. The endless business of forming a child makes mothers exhausted. Especially when a baby regularly wakes up in the night,

doesn't eat enough, or is constantly crying, mothers need a break. Mothers are aware of their need for continual faith formation as they find their babies the fountain of prayer. However, they have all kinds of excuses that are accepted and justified, and therefore, such development is neglected until their children grow up. That means that the

church is consciously negligent of young mothers or new mothers' spiritual nourishment. We as the church are to be accountable for their continuous spiritual growth, so that they will impact their children without waiting for them to grow until kindergarten, where they may be educated by people other than mothers.

Therefore, a spiritual retreat for young mothers would address the dilemmas: the

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need for physical rest, concerns about the baby, and spiritual hunger. There will be a praying time, sharing time, drawing time, and a Q&A with a local pediatrician.

A big challenge for mothers is finding proper babysitting to join any faith formation or spiritual retreat program the church offers. To address this, I'm offering church members an opportunity to volunteer your time and energy for babysitting, so that mothers may have a carefree time in a safe, sacred space.

The church as a community can show affection and care for these mothers: by babysitting during the retreat for four Saturdays in April; by preparing snacks and materials for the class. Sign-up sheets will be at the back of the church.

Also, other volunteers are welcomed for photographing, clean-up, pedicures, and more. If you cannot physically help, you can all intercede for this special spiritual retreat. Please pray that we as the church can help young mothers find their vocation in being mothers in Christ.

To become a mother in a Christian community can be a profound opportunity to learn about God's loving care for people and God's dream for each of us. Thus, not only young mothers, but we also can be nurtured as a whole body of Christ. To nurture young mothers is investing in the future as mothers become loving conduits for their children to grow in faith.

Having said this, I ask for your support and prayer for the success of this **Young Mothers' Spiritual Retreat**. This retreat is not only for all mothers of babies and/or toddlers in LPCUMC, but also for young mothers in your family and among neighbors.

We were saddened to hear of the passing of **Bruce Meckes**, husband of **Elaine** and father to **Melissa** and **Scott**, also on January 29.




