


team who went to Nationals. Their team finished 23 out of 48 teams. He also bowled in singles and had a 242 in one of his games. Debbie says, "He only just fin-

did it. Watching this brought a longing to my heart. God's Word tells us He has specific work for each of us - work He's predestined for each of us. His holy hands reach for ours. What a glorious thing!

The Lord Most High considered my abilities. My passions. My short-comings and His own strength. He allows me to be part of His beautiful plan. No matter how grand or small, He calls me to do specific work-of-the-Spirit.
