Church Office. As I write this article sitting in my new office, let me say, everything looks beautiful and thank you everyone for all your great work! We have so many dedicated volunteers in our church!



Birthdays are unique because they celebrate who someone *is*, not what they've *done*. Henri Nouwen wrote, "It is more important to celebrate a birthday than a successful exam, a promotion, or a victory. Because to celebrate a birthday



means to say to someone, 'Thank you for being you.' ... On a birthday we do not say, 'Thanks for what you did, or said, or accomplished.' No, we say, 'Thank you for being born and being among us."

To rejoice over someone purely for who they are is an echo of God's joy over us. Some families celebrate "baptism birthdays" (anniversaries) by lighting candles, sharing scripture and prayer, perhaps looking at photos and recounting stories of that milestone event that marked the beginning of their faith life.

On a birthday, said Nouwen, "we lift someone up and let everyone say, 'We love you." In baptism, God lifts us to his very heart and declares,

"You are my precious child. I love you."

The kids enjoyed videos, songs, dances, games, snacks, treasure hunts, and crafts. They heard Bible verses and learned the three important things that God expects of us -- to love, to care, and to share.

And share we did! We delivered toys, coloring books, crayons, school supplies, and books to three local charities- Opportunity House, Mary's Shelter, and Women in Crisis (now known as Safe Berks.) Each delivery was met with big smiles and sincere *thank yous*.

Our second project of sharing was not local; we donated through the Heifer Project 12 flocks of chickens to 12 different families in the country of Bangladesh. Our goal was six and we doubled it! But it was Pirate Pete (Jack Villecco) and the beautiful Merrybell (Meigin Chandler) who taught us the true value of loving, caring and sharing. Pirate Pete believed that money, money, money was the only thing that mattered. But by the end of VBS, he was beginning to understand that friendship, helping others near and far, and sharing all that we have are much more important than having lots of money. Pete actually found that he liked having friends.

After four nights, the children, staff, youth, and parents bid farewell to the Great Treasure Hunt with the greater understanding that we are God's treasures on earth, and He expects us to love, care and share!



My oldest was in my belly the year 9/11 became more than a number. The day we watched in horror as one plane struck and then another. My husband and I were both released early from work. At home we glued our eyes to the television, bracing for another attack when we learned about the Pentagon and the crash in Pennsylvania.

The satellites went down, and I put my hands on my stomach as if I could protect the growing baby from the news that advised us to stock

up on supplies, water, and other nonperishable goods. I lay in bed awake that night, looking into the darkness, afraid of what the world had become and wondering what on earth that meant for us and the baby I was carrying.

My sons ask Where were you? What happened exactly? Why on earth did they do it? They ask about the heartbreaking posters of the missing that were everywhere. I tell them prayer was on everyone's lips and



radiating from our hearts. Prayer that somehow healing could come, that we were protected and loved, and that through the grace of God we'd get through this.

I tell them the answers to prayer came again and again in every kind deed, every selfless act. How even the next day strangers asked me about the baby growing inside me and meant it. Coworkers banded to-

gether in efforts to send supplies, start prayer chains, and find ways to help. I tell them that what happened after 9/11 is proof of God's love right here on Earth and the power of the human spirit, selflessness, and courage.

Heavenly Father, On this day of remembrance, heal our aching hearts with Your infinite light, which will

always outshine darkness.



Maria Shriver (journalist and daughter of Eunice Kennedy Shriver) lost one of her younger cousins this summer — Saoirse Kennedy Hill. After the tragic loss, she posted on Instagram some words that I've been carrying around in my purse and in my heart.

Why did the words touch me so? First, I always struggle with which words to say or write to people when they've suffered a loss — especially a tragic one. Shriver, in the first three sentences, expresses her sympathy with compassion and eloquence:

A brave young woman left our world yesterday. She left a gaping hole in the lives of those who loved her dearly. May God bless her. May God bless her parents during this unbearable hour and give them strength to make it through, she says.

And then in the second part, Shriver reminds us of how precious life is:

Life is fragile and heartbreaking. It turns upside down in a minute. Love your children, hold them tight. Love your family, hold them close. Love your friends, keep them near.

Finally, Shriver reminds us to be kind and caring to one another:

Be gentle with others, as so many are fragile and struggling. Actually, I think it's best to assume everyone is struggling, so treat everyone with love, tenderness, and compassion.

Her last line I need to repeat to myself and to you:

Actually, I think it's best to ASSUME everyone is struggling, so treat everyone with love, tenderness, and compassion.
