

### 2020 Flea Market Opens May 15 and 16

Also, we might attract people on Friday night who are not available Saturday. For a presale admission of \$5, people can shop from 5-8 pm. Church members can avoid the presale admission price

# Don't Let Our Church Well Go Dry!

Thank you for supporting our *Water* for Life project with many generous donations. This project builds "clean water wells" in impoverished areas throughout the world. Imagine walking miles for water from a possibly contaminated river. Access to clean water improves health and prevents the spread of diseases. Each well constructed costs approximately \$750.

Since January our church has collected enough money for more than three wells. Yeah! What a notable accomplishment. However, wouldn't it be wonderful to make it an **EXTRAORDINARY ACCOMPLISHMENT.** 

Let's keep our well replenished with weekly or monthly donations. Our goal is to raise enough money to build 10 or more wells by the end of the school year on June 7. If church attendance is at 150 people per week, and each of us adds \$2 per week (or \$10 per person for three

### Holy Thursday Service: April 9 at 7 pm



# Nancy Dettra and Anne Wardrop Remember 60+ Years at Lincoln Park Church

Take a look at these two lovely ladies! They've been coming to church at Lincoln Park for over 60 years. Nancy Dettra, 88, and Anne Wardrop, 93, moved into the LP community in the 1950's with their husbands and lived there until they moved to Phoebe in the last decade. Their long standing friendship has been a constant in their lives.

Do you remember the Christmas Cookie project? These two women had the idea and put it into action. Every year, for a week or so after Thanksgiving, our church smelled of cookies -- chocolate chip, snickerdoodles, sand tarts, sugar stars and more. With the help of other women of the church, they'd package them up in coffee cans wrapped in red and green paper and sell them.

Over the years, Nancy and Anne have served at LP Church in many, many capacities. They joke, "We both have trouble saying *No*." Anne remembers being asked by LP's first pastor, **the**

**Rev. Mark Hostetter**, to be President of the Ladies' Aide Society. As a young mother, new to the church, she couldn't believe he had that much confidence in her, but said *Yes* anyway.

And, Nancy worked with **Jeannette Erskine** for years: meeting, greeting, and helping to bring newcomers at church into our membership. "It helped me to get to know so many people," says Nancy. [Editor's note: I believe I was lucky enough to be one of them. Nancy was the first person I met at LP before we joined in 1979.]

Every year, these two "great friends" meet to decide jointly what they'll do to observe Lent. One year, they decided to choose a different person to pray for every day. "By the time we got to Easter," says Anne, "we had a prayer list of 40 people."

Both Nancy and Anne speak very positively about their lives at Phoebe. In fact, when asked

have limited space to store them until then. The cut off date will be Sunday, May 10, to allow time for pricing.

The Flea Market will still have the same three goals: to raise funds for our budget; to be a mission to the community—selling useful items and homemade food, donating leftovers to charities; and, lastly, to be a social mixer for the entire congregation.

On Sunday, March 22, LP Church will join Holy Cross, Grace, West Lawn, and Mohnton UMChurches, to help feed hungry children and families throughout the world. *RISE Against* 



Hunger is an international hunger relief organization which dis-

tributes food and aid to people in need.

Since 2005, over 500 million meals have been packaged by hundreds of thousands of volunteers and sent around the world, through this organization. Its goal: to end hunger by 2030.

Our LP Missions budget will help purchase rice and packaging. On March 22, 50-75 volunteers are needed to assist in packaging over 10,000 meals of rice. For a video about the packaging process, see RISE Against Hunger.com. Any person can help, but heavy lifting will be done by those physically able to lift 25-50 lb boxes onto the truck.

Packaging takes place at Holy Cross UMC, 329 N 5<sup>th</sup> St, Reading. There's a sign-up sheet in the Wagner Room with; rides are available if you sign-up.

# Focus on the Shepherd

I am the good shepherd; I know my sheep and my sheep know me. John 10:14 (NIV)

While touring New Zealand, my wife and I enjoyed an excursion to a sheep farm. The farmer showed us his barn while explaining the various aspects of managing the farm. He also talked about the

different types of sheep and let us pet some lambs. But the highlight for me was a demonstration by Susie, a sheepdog, of her skills herding and guiding the sheep.

As we stood in light rain outside the barn, the farmer pointed to a flock of sheep- tiny specks in the pastureland, high in the foothills of the Southern Alps bordering his farm. The farmer said, "As I get older, I depend more and more on sheepdogs to make the five or six daily treks up the mountain to fetch the sheep." Using a small whistle, he sent Susie to the sheep. Directing her left or right with different whistle sounds, she rounded up the scattered



sheep and skillfully guided them down a mountain path to the area where we were waiting.

We watched Susie line up the sheep in front of the farmer, barking and nipping them into place. The preci-

sion with which she did her job and the obedience of the sheep held our attention, but was not the most astonishing thing. As the sheep stood side by side, their heads remained still with all eyes intently focused not on the dog, but on the farmer-their shepherd. The sheep never took their eyes off the farmer, even with the distractions surrounding them, a barking guide dog and two busloads of spectators.

Jesus said, "I know my sheep and my sheep know me." The sheep knew their shepherd from their guide- obedient to both, intent on one!

Lord, help us to keep an unbroken focus on You, our Shepherd, even in the midst of all distractions that get in our way.
