Church Reopening: When and How?

While we're all anxious to return to some normalcy, our Church Reopening Committee is working hard to ensure that,

when we do reopen, we'll have a safe church in which to worship.

When our guidelines are met and we feel comfortable with a date, the pastor will announce it during the Sunday morning livestream, two weeks prior to the date.

In early August, our committee emailed and sent letters about what the committee is doing to make the church and our worship experience enjoyable and safe. (If you have an email address and didn't get our email, please contact the Church Office, 610-777-1422, with your correct information. If you got neither email nor paper letter, again, please notify the Church Office so we can update your information.)

The church has been cleaned and sanitized, so it's important that any church group wanting to meet there prior to worship reopening must notify the Office beforehand. And, any outside group must receive permission from the Trustees. All groups are responsible for cleaning and sanitizing the area they use for meetings.

To set guidelines, the Committee used recommendations made by the Conference Cabinet and Chancellor, as well as directives from federal and state governments. Once we begin in-person worship, we'll take temperatures of everyone entering the church; social distancing and wearing masks will be enforced by

ushers and Reopening Committee; music and singing will be limited to soloists and instrumental selections.

Also, the blended 10 am service will continue as the sole service on Sunday

mornings until a procedure to clean and sanitize the sanctuary between services can be implemented. Our plans will evolve as restrictions are lifted and procedures need to be changed.

Even after we begin meeting in church for Sunday worship, we'll continue live-streaming the service for members and friends who are in a high risk category or who feel more comfortable at home. Our Bishop and Cabinet have recommended that streaming of our worship become a permanent part of our ministries. With that in mind, the committee has purchased cameras and equipment to enhance the online experience.

Dear Friends,

On September 7 we celebrate Labor Day, honoring and recognizing hardworking people and their contributions to the development and achievements in our country. Beginning in the late 19th century, as labor movements grew, a day was set aside to


responsibility to be small group leaders. In addition, we have the Agape Women's Circle, Grief Support Group, AA Group, Youth Group, Choir and Children's Ministry leaders in touch with their members. Also, our church committees meet regularly over Zoom.

Something new we've experienced during this pandemic is the involvement of our members who live far away in our virtual services every Sunday. Also,

I try to involve as many people as possible, especially our youth, to be part of our worship experiences.

Due to technical challenges, some of you have been unable to join the virtual services. I hope that this pandemic will end soon, and we can gather for worship and other activities and have our times of fellowship. The second Sunday of September would have been our big 75th

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anniversary celebration. We had great plans to make this event an extra special one. Unfortunately, we have to postpone that special event. We were, however, able to invite back our former pastors to join us and bring the message for this summer's virtual services. We thank our former pastors for joining us during this 75th anniversary year.

These are challenging times. I think of you often and keep all of you in you in my prayers. Since we don't know exactly how long the pandemic will last, I've been considering visiting our members by keeping social distancing and by wearing a mask. More Snippets of LPCUMC History

- † For 35 YEARS, FROM 1978 TO 2013, Lincoln Park Church had an active Quilting Group. Its quilts were sold to support the church and its missions in various ways, ranging from funding the purchase of new nursery room furniture and altar paraments, to making pillowcase dresses for girls in Haiti, supporting *Adopt-a-Village* in Afghanistan (2005 to 2012) plus other church and mission needs as they arose.
- IN THE FALL OF 1995, at the recommendation of the Board of Trustees, the Annual Conference approved borrowing funds to substantially renovate the church. By the fall of 1996 a capital campaign, *Growing in Faith*, had raised the required nearly half-million dollars. Then-Pastor Jack Buttimer described the campaign as the best organized... I have ever been part of. The renovations included installing air conditioning, and a lift to assist less able people to access both the sanctuary and Memorial Hall; installation of

a new three-manual organ with an associated speaker system; and conversion of the original parsonage next to the church into office space. All that work was substantially completed in 2000.

IN JULY OF 2009, the church's Vacation Bible School was based on the *Crocodile Dock* curriculum. About 65 children and over 40 youth and adult leaders participated. That same year the News-Linc reported that the Youth Fellowship had participated in a cancer walk, sung Christmas carols at the Highlands, created and run a Safe Halloween event, babysat two nights at the church to give parents an evening out, presented two worship services, participated in the Advent candle-lighting drama, sang in the Contemporary Service's Praise Band, sponsored two needy children in third-world countries, and volunteered at the **Autumn Auction!**

Nobody Loves Me!

We do not have a high priest who is unable to empathize with our weaknesses, but we have one who has been tempted in every way, just as we are- yet he did not sin.

—Hebrews 4:15 (NIV)

Nobody loves me! Nobody cares about me!

Years ago, my little girl - shoulders slumped and lips drawn into a severe bow - made her objections clear about the praise showered on her older brother. That moment during the 1970s is memorable and a tad humorous. But several months ago, when that same daughter's three-year-old lobbed a similar complaint, I laughed out loud. "Is anybody gonna say hooray?" she inquired after her earassaulting, unsolicited son's performance met with a mute response.

While it's obvious both mother and daughter took vernacular liberties, it's equally clear that, at an early age, they had grasped the human concept of pity partying and self-absorption.

That need for affirmation wears on us at times, especially when it pushes against the boundaries of control and is levied in a demanding way that shames us. Still, when we find ourselves feeling foolish about such needs, we can be solaced by the boundless love of our God Who, through His Son, was tested by the same undignified needs.

Since I'm aware of no other religion whose very definition of God is love, it's necessary that we remind ourselves of His sacrifice to feel what we feel, "yet without sin" (Hebrews 4:15, KJV). The Lord lowered Himself to understand each one of us perfectly, giving us the right to proclaim, "Yes, Jesus Loves Me" (Anna Bartlett Warner). Even when our grumblings and other failures prove childish and embarrassing, all it takes to face another day is to know that He understands and forgives.

Lord, though I need others' encouragement, help me to value Your empathy more than any other, for Your love for me cost You the most, and it never disappoints.
