Money continues going to the Clean Water Project, plus we have generously given to UMCOR in response to hurricanes, floods, and fires.


We've also sent financial assistance to nine local charity organizations, one national, and one overseas. A list of all the organizations that our church supported will be posted at the end of 2020.

Church Reopening: Ready but Waiting

When our Reopening Committee last reported on the status of church reopen-

ing, we were working to put a plan together. Now, the protocols have been established. The church has been cleaned, and the transition to in-person worship, while maintaining the livestream, is being developed.

To reopen our doors, we had two criteria. First, we needed to plan for accommodating worshippers in a safe manner. The committee now feels that 60 to 80 persons can safely worship in church, while maintaining social distancing. Secondly, we wanted to see a steady decline in the number of new cases. However, after a meeting on October 26, to consider the spike in COVID-19 cases this past week, we decided to wait and meet again in two weeks to review the situation. Perhaps we can consider a reopening in early December.

Hopefully, we'll soon be able to announce a date that we, as a committee, feel comfortable worshiping together in our sanctuary. When we open our doors, we'll encourage those who are in a high-risk category, are sick and/or have a fever, or feel uncomfortable coming to church at the present time to continue live-streaming the services at home.

When we do start offering in-person worship, we'll continue to have only one service, Sundays at 10 am. This is pri-

marily due to insufficient time between two services to safely and

properly clean the building. Therefore, for the present time, we will continue with the blended worship. Again we want to take small steps in our reopening.

The committee has put in place protocols and steps that should assure all those worshiping in-person that they will feel safe.

These are the safeguards we will require everyone to follow when coming to church:

- Proper wearing of masks at all times will be required.
- Temperatures will be taken of everyone with touchless thermometers, with one person recording names.
- Social distancing of six feet must be maintained.

We are also asking you not to arrive before 9:45 am and to use either the main front door, the door at the end of the driveway (near the lift) or the door along Jefferson Boulevard, lower level, near the ladies restroom. All other doors, including going into the Education Building, will remain locked.

Thankfulness, studies show, has multiple physical, mental and emotional



benefits. Psychologist Robert Emmons calls gratitude "fertilizer for the mind" because of its powerful effects.

He admits gratitude isn't always easy — especially when life throws us curveballs (see the year 2020) — but says it can be most helpful during and after difficulties. Emmons suggests reframing challenges using thankfulness-based language. Ask, for example: Though I wasn't grateful for the experience at the time, how can I be now? What lessons did I learn, and how did I grow as a person?

Throughout his letters, the apostle Paul reframes his extensive sufferings and urges us to do the same. "Give thanks in all circumstances," he writes, "for this is God's will for you in Christ Jesus" (1 Thessalonians 5:18, NIV).

I am so grateful for our wonderful church family. Thank you so much for all the cards, phone calls, flowers, and food I received. I am truly overwhelmed by your thoughtfulness.

I fell on August 22, fracturing my right tibia and fibula beneath my kneecap. The trauma caused severe blistering of my right leg...from my ankle to my knee. Because of the blistering, I had to wait three weeks before surgery could be performed. Two metal plates and screws have been inserted to hold the tibia secure. I have an immobilizer on the leg. It must remain straight until at least November 4, followed by an additional six weeks of non-weight bearing on that leg. A long time, but we're making it work. By the Grace of God, we're able to move forward and heal.
