

## Church Reopening: We're Hopeful

Finally, we think, there is some good news to report on church reopening. No, we don't have a date yet, but there are some good signs that we're seeing light at the end of tunnel.

The daily new cases being reported are now in the low 100's as compared to many days in January when the numbers exceeded 200. And, our congregation, especially our health care workers and older members, are receiving vaccinations. Also, according to CDC projections, everyone who wants a vaccine should have one by summer.

The major drop in daily new cases is a great move in the right direction; however, the PA Department of Health keeps Berks County in the substantial category, the most severe of the three.

While some area churches have reopened for in-person worship, the state guidelines for indoor gatherings have not changed. Our Reopening Committee and

#### **Tradition**

COVID-19 isn't stopping us from continuing the beloved tradition of a concert preceding our 10 am Easter service. As usual, we'll have brass, organ, and vocal music. The concert will last 20 minutes, beginning at 9:40.

Since we're social distancing, we won't have the five-member Berkshire Brass, but we *will* have two of them. So, our hymns will still be accompanied by brass and organ, and our own vocalists and a trio from Bell Choir will provide the seasonal music we all look forward to. After all, it's our tradition, and a great one at that!

#### **Behind the Scenes**

That's where you'll find me for our worship services. Members have asked where I am during the service. I provide an organ or piano prelude and postlude every week. (That's a reason to tune in early at 9:55 am and "stay" afterward to hear the postlude.) It's a good way to begin and end worship, perhaps offerimg a prayer of praise and thankfulness.

Most of the time, I accompany the special musicians, but, again, I'm behind the scenes. I schedule and sometimes write the script for our Children's Messages, and I am, indeed, thankful that so many adults and children have said "yes" to helping with this ministry.

Our Chancel Choir has been divided into seven groups who take turns singing the weekly hymns. The toughest part of the job for me is making videos of these parts for the service, which was a tough learning curve. When I goof, **Mark Villecco** pulls me through.

Like most of us, I prefer live music and can't wait until we return!

#### **Flexibility**

In my teaching career, I was asked



what trait was most important in a teacher. I answered *flexibility*. That quality applies to our children's educational

program. I'm keeping in touch with our parents and have been delivering props (and more) for our kids to use during Children's Time.

Our emphasis during Lent is saving money in Tootsie Roll banks we gave the kids for Valentine's Day. We'll collect their coins at Easter and donate them to the children's program at Hope Lutheran Church in Reading, which has an amazing outreach program for their neighborhood and beyond.

Pastor Mary Wolfe is excited that we want to help and has invited our kids to participate in programs once we're safe from COVID-19. Collecting a few coins is a simple way our kids can learn that they're not too young to serve, share, and make a difference in the lives of other children.

#### Dear Beloved,

On February 17, Ash Wednesday, the church entered into another Len-

ten season. In 325 AD, the Council of Nicea established Lent as a holy season to be observed by the whole Church. The season always begins with Ash Wednesday and concludes the Saturday before Easter. In the UM Church, like other denominations, the 40 days of the season do not include the six Sundays of Lent. Sundays are considered "Mini-Easters" as we cele-

brate the joy of the Resurrection of Christ.

It is also significant that, in the Bible, 40 is an important number, associated with anticipation and preparation:

- Moses waited on the Mt. Sinai for 40 days to receive the Law,
- Israel wandered in the wilderness for 40 years before entering the promised land,
- Elijah walked 40 days to meet with God at Mount Horeb,
- And, most importantly, Jesus fasted for 40 days in the wilderness before His temptation.

During Lent, we're encouraged to observe the penitential practices of

prayer, confession, self-denial, fasting, and almsgiving for 40 days. The Latin

name for the season, *quad-ragesima*, is also significant, as it means *40 days* of penance. The word *Lent* comes from the word *Lencten*, which simply means *spring season*. In a real sense, Lent can be a 40-day springtime for the soul. A time of planting, nurturing, and experiencing God's love and care.

Lent is also seen as a time of year to declutter. We try to put down or put away some of the things that we think we don't really need or are not really important,

so that we have space and time for listening to God and learning more about Him. So, when we give up certain things for Lent, it makes room for God! We give up something to take up something. May God help us to practice the five penitential practices during this Lent.

This year Easter is on April 4. As we know, Resurrection Day is one of the most important days in the life of the church, which is the foundation to our Christian existence. Without the death and resurrection of Christ, we would have no church, there would be no reason for ministry, and we would have no message to preach. Resurrection is the

foundation of the hope that we cherish and of the faith that we passionately proclaim when we get up on the Easter morning and say, *He is risen! He is risen indeed!* Celebrating the resurrection of Christ is the most joyful experience for us Christian believers.

## Excerpts from COVID-19 Conversations: Kara Powell on Innovative Youth Ministry

Powell concludes, "What I think beats at the heart of next gen minis-

and parents alike have expressed the struggle they face when ministering to children and youth in a time of social distancing. For pastors, figuring out how to keep children and teens engaged while doing church from a distance has been a challenge. For parents, finding the balance between work, childcare, school, and screen time in the midst of a pandemic is often a daily battle.

Kara Powell, Executive Director of the Fuller Youth Institute, discusses the unique challenges pastors, parents, and teens are currently facing. "Half of pastors (47%) agree that ministry to kids and youth is the largest challenge they face right now. I've spent a lot of time talking to youth leaders, and I think one of the biggest mistakes that we've made in youth ministry [right now] is assuming we could take what we were doing in-person with young people and drag-and-drop that into Zoom," says Powell. "You can't take an in-person experience and try to exactly duplicate it on Zoom."

try, and really all ministry, is innovation. Let's really understand. Let's empathize with what our people are going through, with what our young people, children, and parents are going through, and then let's experiment with different ways that we can respond to those needs."

Another way for churches to minister not just to teens, but to their parents as well, is through webinars, Powell says. "Research shows, across the board, that there is no more important influence on a young person's faith development than their parents. [Pastors, your] influence can best be leveraged when you equip parents who have, in general, far more time—especially during the pandemic—around their children and their teenagers. A lot of creative churches are doing parent webinars, and, I'll tell you, I think many of them are seeing greater response from parents, especially if it's a specific topic that's very relevant to parents [right now], like anxiety, technology, and how to have better faith-related conversations with your young person."

#### Lincoln Park's Book Club Recommends Reading



Not all UM congregations can be as proud as we are of this accomplishment.

• As importantly, we continued to provide full compensation to our dedicated church staff, and to all our services providers. This is because, in addition to your generous contributions, we were able to borrow from our own accumulated savings. I know that with your prayers and renewed commitment during 2021, we will pay back the "loan" we made with those faithful stewards of our past.

You may wonder why you haven't received your 2021 offering envelopes.

That is due to a failure on my part to make sure that they were ordered in October, 2020. I apologize and want you to know that they'll be delivered to you by the end of March. Please continue

to use your "leftover" 2020 offering envelopes until then.

We can't predict what 2021 will bring. Some of us may experience serious hardships. What we can be certain of is that our congregation will continue to be faithful to God.

**Rob Renfroe**, President and Publisher of *Good News*, wrote in an email on December 26:
