We're proceeding with Plans to Honor our Church and its 75 years of ministry. Thankfully, many members have been vaccinated, and our church has reopened according to CDC guidelines. So, on May 23, we invite you to a celebratory worship service! Our Bishop Peggy Johnson, who has served the Philadelphia Episcopal area for 13 years, will join us and preach, along with District Superintendent Evelyn Clark and some of our former pastors. There will be only one service that day at 10 am.

At this service, the Missions Committee will present a check for \$10,500 to the Bishop, the results of our year-long anniversary Well Project, providing 14 wells and clean water to countries around the world.

We hope that our Anniversary Booklet will be ready and available on that day for all those attending to take home! (More about our booklet on p.9.) Because of

Lincoln Park Church Has Reopened



Yes, Lincoln Park Community United Methodist Church is having in-person worship services along with continued streaming of our services on Facebook and Zoom.

We opened our doors on Palm Sunday with a combined service and a little over 30 persons attending. We had two services Easter morning with an attendance of 31 persons at the first service and

54 at the second. There are no plans at this time to discontinue the live streaming.

We continue to require everyone to wear masks, and the pews are marked to follow social distancing. The windows in the sanctuary are opened for fresh ventilation. We are also signing in everyone that attends for contact tracing purposes. The nursery remains closed. And any group that wants to



meet in the church should contact the office so arrangements can be made for proper cleaning.

There are still a couple of questions that are being asked:

- Is the church going to remain open as new cases of Covid-19 begin another upwards spiral?
- Should we return to a combined blended service

until our in-person numbers return to normal averages?

Unfortunately, as this edition of *News-Linc* goes to press, we don't have answers to those questions. If decisions about the worship schedule are made, a mass email will be sent to the congregation. If you know of someone that does not have email, please pass the information along, or if you don't have email, call a church friend if you're uncertain.

Dear Friends,



A Necessary Search

Unfortunately, our Church Secretary,

Marilyn Seiders, has to reduce her hours due to personal circumstances. At the SPRC's recent meeting. members agreed that our church cannot effectively function without regular secretarial help. After discusly decided the position of

secretary-bookkeeper warrants five days a week, Monday through Friday, 9-12, with a possible additional one hour once a week. Marilyn is happy to work one day a week and continue with bookkeeping.

Money, of course, is a predictable issue because of our tight budget. Among other things, the pandemic has placed all of us in difficult situations, especially relating to money. The salary we'd *like* to offer is not doable. At this juncture, we anticipate paying \$15 per hour with the possibility of increasing to \$16, if the eventual incumbent proves sufficiently competent.

The committee also felt it is better to hire a non-member for matters of confidentiality. Further, because of the posi-

tion's three hour work period, we anticipate potential candidates are likely to live a relatively short distance from our church. We also recognize that the eventual incumbent *may* occasionally have to leave the office to take care of personal sion, the committee tentative- Church Secretary business within the three-hour work period. Within reason,

the church can accommodate such a situation via make-up time that same or another day.

In addition to other avenues, we seek your help in finding qualified, motivated candidate(s) for this essential position. If you know of someone who might qualify and is interested in a nearby, part-time secretarial position, please give them our address and ask them to send us their resume with an introductory cover letter.

Thank you for your prayers and actions to help find suitable secretarial candidates. We'll all benefit from the eventual right choice!

That amount will purchase 14 wells for areas without access to clean wa-Helping Harvest ter. This is four more wells than we initially planned to provide. Thank you to everyone who so generously made contributions to this important cause. The price to build each well is \$750. Six of the 14 wells were purchased by individual people.

We should all celebrate this remarkable achievement, Bravo.

Our new Mission Project for 2021 is to collect money to provide surgery for poor children living overseas who suffer from a cleft mouth deformation. Each individual operation costs \$250. Can You See the Face of Jesus?

And the King will answer them, "Truly, I say to you, as you did it to one of the least of these my brothers, you did it to me." —Matthew 25:40 (ESV)

I have found that university gradua-

tions exude both hope and relief: hope for the future and relief at having finished the academic requirements. My son Justin graduated this past spring from LSU Health Sciences Center. With almost a thousand graduates, it was a long morning. Aside from seeing

Justin walk across the stage, the other highlight of the ceremony was the graduation speaker.

The graduation speaker was an alumnus and a physician. It was a captivating speech on many levels, but when he mentioned he was sharing a story called *The Face of Jesus*, my attention was fixed.

Jesus is not usually mentioned at state university graduations. The speaker shared with this group of new dentists, medical doctors, nurses, and allied health professionals the importance of seeing the face of Jesus in those served in the health-care field. He described the harrowing circumstances in which

they will find themselves tired, irritated, shorthanded, treating patients with selfinflicted illness, and depleted of compassion. He explained that in those inevitable moments, it is essential to see the face of Jesus in patients; each patient is someone's parent, spouse,

child, or friend. How profound!

Now, whenever my compassion is lacking, I try to see the face of Jesus in the person next to me, whether it's at work, at home, or out in the world, and give everyone reverence, care, and love.

Dear Lord,

Help us to see Your face in the face of our family, of our neighbors, and of those we come into contact with. May we honor You in the care we bestow upon others. Amen.


