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What I Learned Sitting in Front and Back of the Sanctuary

Our sanctuary is deep. If you're sitting in the very last pew, you may feel like you're in a different zip code than the first pew.



When I take a seat to listen to the message at the 9 am service, I'm typically right up front in one of the first five pews. When I'm running the mixer console and the computer at the 11 am service, I'm in the very last row in the corner.

When I'm up front, the sound coming from the speakers is clear and distinct. In the back row? Not as much. The farther back one sits, the more reverb (echo) they introduce between themselves and the audio source (the loudspeakers). Try moving from pew to pew each week, and I think you'll be surprised by how much difference your seat selection can make in what the worship service sounds like to you. If you're aiming for clarity, try sitting as close to the speakers as possible.


Our Charge Conference this year is on October 16, at 10 am. It will be an online, joint meeting with other area

A Different Mini Concert

Why tell you about a program that's already happened? I believe the words of these songs will inspire you to pray for God's peace.

Our minds are troubled and the world is filled with strife is a phrase from the song

Peace by Richard Nichols. It reminds us to turn to God. It is His world, and He can help us find peace in



ourselves, in our families, and throughout the world. It truly is a troubled time. Find these hymns in our hymnal or online, reflect on their words, and ask God for guidance to find the kind of peace He wants for us.
