Making Advent Prayerful and Intentional From Pastor Christopher Kurien

Dear Friends,

Greetings to you in our Lord's name!

During November and December, we have a lot to remember and cele-

brate. We begin November with the observance of **ALL SAINTS SUNDAY**, remembering the Saints who have gone before us. At Lincoln Park, we have lost 13 of our saints in the past year. We remember them with grati-

tude, and praise God for their faithful lives and service to our church. Also in November, we'll have an opportunity to celebrate Thanksgiving with family and friends. While we give thanks to God for all his provisions, we remember many who feel the loss of loved ones who will not be at the Thanksgiving table this season. Life is always a mixture of joys and sorrows, and, sadly, we simply have to live with our realities.

On the last Sunday in November this year, we begin **Advent** — a season of anticipation and preparation. Advent comes from the Latin word *Adventus*, meaning *arrival*. St. Jerome, who translated the Bible into Latin used *Adventus* as the translation of *Parousia*, which in the New Testament is referred to as the *second coming of Christ*. So, Advent, when

first celebrated, was a period of preparation for Jesus' second coming. In time, however, the remembrance of his first arrival, his birth, began to take precedence over the approaching second

coming. And now, we spend the better part of two months "getting ready for Christmas."

How can we, as a church and as a people, reclaim Advent? How can we allow it to speak to our calm but weary

souls, rather than being one more thing we "have to do?" A prayerful and intentional Advent season tends to have a significant impact on our celebration of Christmas. When we observe Advent, some pre-Christmas activities are seen in a different light, perhaps becoming less important. Advent can help us slow down and pace ourselves. A slower pace makes us more aware of the promptings of the Holy Spirit, opening our eyes to that which is Holy around us; preparing the way of the Lord!

Of course, the Christmas season is the most spectacular season in the church's life. We await the birth of Jesus in a manger in Bethlehem and prepare to receive Him into our lives. How do we prepare ourselves for the arrival of the One we worship? What do we need to do to enable us to truly celebrate the birth of Jesus

in the world, and much more importantly, in our lives? Will we listen to the voices within us, echoing the message of the angels that God is with us, in us, and in our world? May we run to the stable of our faith to embrace the presence of God in our neighborhoods and in our lives so that we might live fully, love freely, and care for one another.








This Should Bring a Smile to Your Face!

Our *SMILE DRIVE* to provide facial reconstruction surgery for children overseas was an overwhelming success. The four-month goal was to raise \$2,500 to pay for ten operations. We were a little shy of that amount at the beginning of September.

After asking the congregation for a continued commitment towards this project, we received so many generous contributions that we now have enough money to purchase 16 surgeries at a cost of \$4000. Ten individual families purchased a full smile, and the remaining six were from all those who participated in this amazing mission. It should bring a smile to everyone's heart to know that Lincoln Park Church is so committed to helping those in need. Thank you so very much.

Our **HELPING HARVEST FOOD DRIVE** provided over 210 pounds of food to help during the pandemic.

November 21. You can use any regular size shoebox or similar size plastic container, or pick up a Samaritan designed box at church. You'll decide if your items and box would be best for boy or a girl. Also you'll choose the child's age: 2-4, 5-9, or 10-14 years. (These labels will be available at church, or you can attach your own label.)

Pack your box full of fun toys, hygiene items, and school supplies. No food or liquid items, please. The children are excited if their box contains one special item that they'll love. Also, each box

costs \$9 to ship, so any monetary contributions are also welcome.

If you don't feel comfortable shopping, Missions Committee members will also accept monetary donations to purchase items for your box or boxes. Please have that money to us by **Sunday**, **November 7**, so we have time for purchasing and filling the boxes.

Our goal is to have around 30 boxes to send. Maybe we can even exceed that!

Then you can choose that item **Due: December 12** (or items) and call us so your purchases can be taken off the list. After you wrap your gift, you MUST add a tag, stating the name of the person, plus the family number, to whom the gift goes. If it's for the entire family, it just has to have the assigned family number.

As with the Samaritan Purse shoeboxes, if you don't wish to be shopping in crowds, you can ask the Missions Committee to purchase your item for you. **If you choose that route, please have your money to us before November 28.** All wrapped purchases must be at the church (Wagner Room, or porch drop box) no later than December 12 for delivery to the Salvation Army. Thank you!

An Advent Meditation

Be Still and Know that I am God. Ps 46:10 From Dr. Michael Eager, Retired Physician, Member of West Lawn UMC

It was a typical Christmas season, like many before it in years past. The usual hustle and bustle had been going on for weeks, with Christmas shopping, choir practices, the obligatory social functions, and home decorating all managing to make the days of Advent a blur. Christmas cards arriving would sometimes refocus my attention on the real *Reason for the Season*, but then it was right back to all the distractions which inevitably dulled my appreciation for the joyful meaning of Christmas.

The Sunday morning Cantata was a thrill to experience as a singer, and the music resounded time after time in my head during the next week; it was one of the few true worshipful experiences I would recognize during the weekdays.

As Christmas Eve approached, our family began to gather, and the house was filled with laughter, hugs, and lots of great aromas as the Christmas feast was prepared. Finally it was time for the 7 pm Christmas Eve service, a beautiful time of carols and joyful worship of God in our festive sanctuary. Even then, however, the business of providing some of the music some-

how diminished what should have been the high point of the Advent season. The solemn candle lighting and strains of *Silent Night* touched my heart as ever before; however, the evening was not yet complete.

At the 11 pm service, I returned to church to participate in the traditional

brass ensemble, playing some of the more familiar carols at the onset of the service. After packing up my horn, I trudged through the snow to my car, making squeaking noises with my shoes in the frigid night air. The night was clear and cold, and many stars twinkled in the heavens as I

drove back home. My family was already in bed, so I parked the car and walked outside under the canopy of stars, not wanting the evening to end.

As I looked at my breath steaming upward toward the heavens, the absolute quiet of the night, combined with the beauty of the snowy landscape and the myriad of stars in the heavens spoke to
