The Rev Dr Quentin Wallace Appointed to LP Church

A Conference announcement, on February 12, both appointed and described our incoming pastor: Pastor Wallace enjoys drama, music, community outreach, and most of all preaching the uncompromised word of the Lord.

His passion for music, drama, and community out-

reach began in 1998 when he founded a Christian ministry theater production company. Since then, he's written, directed, and produced gospel skits and stage plays.

In 2001, Wallace became both an oncall weekend chaplain for Reading Hospital's Emergency Team for Crisis Intervention and Associate Chaplain at Albright College.

Then, after earning a Master of Divinity degree from Eastern Baptist Theological Seminary, he received his first appointment in 2003 to New Beginnings Community Church in Read-



ing. In 2008 he became pastor at St. Matthew's Church, with a half-time assignment at Calvary UMC, Wyomissing.

For the last eight years he's been assigned to Covenant Church in Lancaster. While there, Pastor Wallace earned his Doctor of Ministry in Contextual Leadership

Dear Friends,

Already, we're in the Lenten season, which began Ash Wednesday, February 22, and will continue for 40 days. We don't find the observance of these 40

days of Lent in the Bible. However, we do read about Noah, his family, and the animals being in the ark 40 days, thus saving them from the flood.

We know about the 40 years the Israelites wandered in the wilderness before they were led into the Promised Land. And,

we also know about Jesus being in the wilderness for 40 days before He started His public ministry.

Lent is a time of self-examination, providing opportunity to turn our hearts and minds toward God. The word Lent actually comes from the word Lengthen or Lencten, which refers to the lengthening of days in spring. Interestingly, Lent and spring have similar meanings. Like spring, Lent gives way to new life.

In Hebrew tradition, the number 40 implies a sense of completion. Lent ends with the celebration of the Easter. For early Christians there was much joy when they gathered for the Easter celebration.

By now you must have heard about my plans to retire from active ministry this June. After 38 years as an ordained Pastor, I feel a need to slow down, take a

break, and do some things that I've always wanted to do. Due to the busy life of ministry settings Christy and I have been in for many years, we've not seen or spent time with some of our close

at Palmer Theological Seminary, Eastern University.

He received his first ordination in 1999 as an itinerant deaconate in the Philadelphia Annual Conference of the African Methodist, and then three years later he was ordained as an itinerant elder. In 2010 he became an elder in full connection with the Eastern PA Conference of the UM Church.

Pastor Wallace has served on a number of committees including District Conference on Ministry, the Cross Racial/Cross Cultural Team, and the ICare team. Currently he serves on the Board of Ordained Ministry and as an Assisting Elder in the West District.

Our new pastor is married to **Dr. Brenda Ingram-Wallace**, a psychology professor and Vice President at Albright College. They live in Spring Township with their three adopted children.

Pastor Wallace will assume his duties at Lincoln Park on July 1.

Here's Another Opportunity for Helping Others: Hannah's Hope

Hannah's Hope is a transitional housing program, a Christian Ministry serving homeless women and their children in Reading and Berks County.

When you give to Hannah's Hope Ministries, you help a homeless mother stabilize her life, support her children, learn new skills, and gain much-needed hope for a brighter future. Their pro-

gram leads clients through a 12-18 month period of training and support. They provide assistance including: job seeking and training, literacy, and budget creation. Clients work with a case manager on life skills, stress management, Bible studies, and more.

Located on Upland Avenue, Reading, Hannah's Hope provides a beautiful setting for women wanting to make changes for a lifetime. They offer each family a private suite, including their own bedrooms and a bath. A large, open-concept



gathering area has a living room and dining area, where families congregate for weeknight family dining and programming for adults.

We at LPCUMC have supported this ministry in past years and have been advised again of some specific needs we can help them meet.

We're collecting:

- † 20+ pillows
- † 20+ pillow protectors
- † cleaning supplies
- † paper towels
- † and toilet paper.

Cash donations will be accepted as well. Already underway, our collection will continue into April. Donations can be brought to the Wagner Room at the rear of the sanctuary where a box is provided for supplies and a spot is available for monetary donations.

Thank you for helping these mothers get a fresh start.

active, and connected, with zoom meetings and virtual church services. He made many phone calls, giving heartfelt attention. Because we were isolated at home, he formed a group who called regularly to check in with other members.

Before COVID, Pastor Chris had offered ideas for our 75th anniversary celebration. Many (a banquet, for instance) had to be tabled, but some could still produce good fruit: Over \$10,000 was donated for the Well Project, providing wells and clean water to parts of the world in need. We did honor our history with a souvenir booklet. Archivist **Darwin Stapleton** wrote a thorough history. Pastor Chris asked former pastors to send messages for the booklet and also to tape virtual sermons leading up to the anniversary date that September. Former Pastors' pictures were framed and are now displayed in breezeway. The booklet also included members' well wishes, photos, and stories from LP leaders and Senior members.

Finally in September, 2021, we worshipped together in a special celebration of our 75th and 76th anniversaries.

Pastor Chris brought vibrancy to our congregation with new initiatives:

- Walkers meet each week, going through our community
- A new CARE Ministry provides a monthly meal to members and friends who need one, delivered personally by the committee.

The Missions Committee has flourished in these years, supporting local missions like Helping Harvest, Hannah's Hope, the Salvation Army, and, worldwide, like the Well Project and Operation Smile Train.

And, finally, Pastor Chris's steady guidance in thoughtful sermons has been much appreciated We thank God for the kind and gentle presence of **the Rev Dr Christopher J Kurien** in our church and wish him well in retirement!

Tax Time

It's the time of year when we must think about taxes. In Luke 20: 25, Jesus says *Give to Caesar what belongs to Caesar and to God what belongs to God.* Now you can do both. If you have retirement plan accounts and have reached the age of 72, you must take a Required Minimum Distribution (RMD) and pay taxes on the withdrawal.

But you can give yourself a tax break. The Internal Revenue Service says that IRA owners aged 70 ½ or over can use a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD) to transfer up to \$100,000 per year directly to a qualified charity such as Lincoln Park Community UMC.

Any amount processed as a QCD counts towards your RMD requirement plus reduces the taxable amount of your RMD. This will lower both your adjusted gross income and taxable income, reducing your overall tax liability, and it also helps pay your financial commitment to Lincoln Park Church.

ily as well as some identified friends and/or neighbors in need of a hot meal. Simply said, this is an outreach ministry to demonstrate that "we care."

On the second Tuesday of each month, we purchase, prepare, and deliver a meal to 17-27 people who would benefit from a CARE meal. Being involved in this experience is gratifying to those of us who help.

We continue to be grateful for **Alan Koeble** and his leadership and pray for his healing.



Super Bowl Challenge Scores a Win in the Battle against Hunger

We probably collected in just five days enough apples to make dozens of apple pies and potatoes to feed everyone in our congregation with good old Berks County potato filling. That takes a lot of apples and potatoes.

Five days before the Super Bowl, our **Conference Bishop**, **John Schol**, received a friendly challenge from the Kansas City area conferences to see which groups

could collect the most food for each area's food banks. Unlike most food drives, it wasn't about the number of cans or boxes collected but the total weight of food received. So, while all the food received was greatly appreciated, our congregation knew that a bag of potatoes or apples weighs more than a box of cereal. We met the challenge by collecting 257 pounds of canned goods and lots of potatoes and apples.

Here are other impressive numbers that made this Super Bowl challenge a super success:

- Number of pounds collected in two Philadelphia Eagles Conferences: 74,560 pounds
- More than 230 churches in the EPA and GNJ Conferences participated.
- Number of pounds collected from Kansas City conferences: 105,367
- Combined food collected: 90 tons in just five days.

Not unlike instant replays in the game itself, there was one call by a major contributor on the Chiefs' side when he registered his count in bags and not pounds. A clarification and adjustments were made.

Bishop Schol summed up the friendly competition: *The biggest team with the biggest score were the United Methodist churches collecting 180,000 pounds of donated food to fight hunger in their communities. Indeed, the most important victory that day was scored in pounds not in points.*
